Garvin Family Cemetery - Part II

According to the *Historical Atlas of AL, Volume 2, Cemetery Locations by County*, the Garvin Cemetery, Brooklyn Road, is #121-SE in Section 36 of Township 5 North, Range 12 East.

The *Conecuh Headstones, Volume 2*, lists 9 unmarked graves and 24 identified graves; however, paying my respects at the old cemetery, I could only locate 18 of those 24. The last two, one in 1985 & most recently, in 1992, join their loved ones in this serene and holy place. Emma Catherine Jerkins Barlow passed away in 1992 & John Greel Barlow passed away in 1985. They both had ties to the early Barlow line that called Centerville & the Horton communities' home.

Families bound by ties older than our county, thicker than the books that record our history continue to visit the old burial grounds of their ancestors; keeping the cemetery clean and maintained, with fresher bouquets atop many of the graves.

The 1860 Conecuh Census show the families of Adams, Barlow & McCormick living in close proximity; and in the marriage records of the late 1800's a Barlow married a McCormick by a Garvin, who served as Justice of the Peace. Others who were neighbors that possibly married into the families were Fortner, Griffin, Hughes, Moore, & Padgett families, many of them in repose in this cemetery and others nearby.

Missing from the old cemetery plot was a couple of headstones that could have deteriorated or been moved by human hands; and not replaced. Cemetery preservationists encourage the old stones be kept if descendants wish to replace them with newer markers, to keep the history of the older stone.
