Ferdinand William Radue, Jr. (10) was a pharmacist. While I saw him quite frequently, I never really knew him too well. He was rather reserved in his manner, but did enjoy a good laugh. He lived and worked in many places in Pennsylvania and later in his life moved to New Jersey.
