“Key Moments in Chula Vista History” by Dr. Steven Schoenherr

The program will focus at "Key Moments in Chula Vista History" from the city's origin in the 1886 vision of Col. Dickinson to the city's great leap in size with the 1985 Montgomery annexation.

Dr. Steven Schoenherr was born in Fort Wayne, Indiana, and earned his B.A. in History at Indiana University and his Ph.D. in History at the University of Delaware. He moved to San Diego in 1977 and taught in the Department of History at the University of San Diego from 1977 to 2007.

Schoenherr wrote his dissertation on Stephen Early, FDR's press secretary, and has written articles on Bing Crosby, Jane Addams, and the transistor radio; another project was a web page for the *Encyclopaedia Britannica* on the History of Sound Recording. He also produced a DVD history of the National Security Agency for Spysfest '03, a DVD set of films and images for the Hearst Symposium '05, and a DVD collection of Universal Newsreels from 1929 to 1967, including a 6-disc set on the World War II era.

Some of Dr. Schoenherr's publications have been multimedia productions, including video documentaries on San Diego's Gaslamp District and the Villa Montezuma; his World War II Seminar at the University of San Diego involved teams of students and produced the World War II Timeline website.

Now retired, Schoenherr recently co-authored a book on the history of Bonita for Arcadia's "Images of America" series. His article on "National City In Pictures" was published in the *Journal of San Diego History*, Summer 2008.

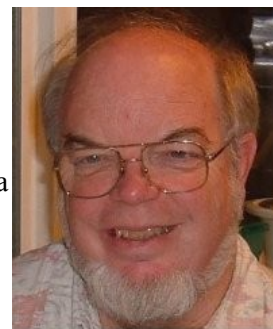

CVGS Research Group News by Randy Seaver

We had a record 18 attendees at the CVGS Research Group meeting on Wednesday, 11 January at the Chula Vista Civic Center Branch Library.

Randy started the meeting by discussing coming programs, the Spring Seminar, and the Family History Fair. He also asked for topic suggestions for an Intermediate Genealogy class (Genealogy 201). Three topics stood out - Citing Sources, DNA Tests, and Online Research. Randy passed out a handout with his "Best Of..." research tips by record types. There was also discussion of education via radio shows, webinars, seminars, conferences, and learning institutes.



Next on the agenda was each attendee highlighting one or two of their 2012 Goals. The goals described included (without names!):

- * Citing sources better
- * Research the next generation on my tree, and research the "dashes" (family history events)
- * Become better organized - my paper collection and computer files
- * Learn how to use my genealogy software program (Family Tree Maker, Reunion, RootsMagic, mentioned)
- * Publish my research to a DVD
- * Research a specific line (e.g., maternal grandfather's line)
- * Get my computer working again
- * Use my Ancestry.com subscription to find records of ancestors
- * Prove the line so I can join "Daughters of the King"
- * Increase my involvement in CVGS
- * Pick and use only one genealogy program
- * Add content and sources to my genealogy database
- * Put my research on paper into genealogy software
- * Scan, label and organize my pictures.
- * Dedicate one day a week on genealogy efforts.
- * Take the Genealogy 101 class
- * Attack and knock down my brick wall challenge
- * Do research at the FHL in Salt Lake City

Questions asked included:

- * What's the scoop on the 1940 U.S. Census? Answer: See January newsletter; images available on 2 April, FamilySearch/Archives and Ancestry will create separate every-name indexes, perhaps completed by the end of 2012.
- * For photo scanning, what resolution should I use? Answer: For printing, 300 dpi as a JPG is satisfactory. For archival purposes, 600 dpi saved in a TIF format is recommended.
- * How do I import a GEDCOM file into FTM 2011? Answer: The Help button is your friend, and there's a book to help you. Friends can help also.
- * Do programs have Research Logs? Answer: Yes, FTM 2012, RootsMagic and Legacy do - use the Help button. Or use a word processor for each surname or ancestor.

In the sharing time, the attendees said:

- * Virginia found a shaky leaf on Ancestry.com for her grandmother's marriage
- * Kevin's cousin sent information for two more generations, and Kevin found a third.
- * Mary Lou noted that members of some genealogical societies are permitted to go into their county records to research questions.
- * Ann went to Wisconsin to research, and shared research with an elderly cousin. She also found a 1906 divorce notice on a Clark county WI website.
- * Bobbie shared three books that have helped her research, one on DNA research, another on Acadia, and the third on Lake County IL resources.
- * Randy had success with the San Diego historical newspapers just added to GenealogyBank. He also discussed autosomal DNA tests and results.

The next Research Group meeting will be the second Wednesday of February, 8 February, at 12 noon in the Chula Vista Civic Center Library Computer Lab (note the location change, due to AARP income tax help).

January 25th Program Meeting Review

Randy Seaver was the speaker at the January 25th program meeting of the Chula Vista Genealogical Society. His topic was “Genealogy Is Fun! Seriously!” The audience of over 40 members and guests came prepared to laugh and enjoy themselves.

From the opening slides with really funny (and strange) names in vital records, to gravestone epitaphs, then several funny obituaries and wills, census records (names and occupations), and finally American and English place names, the audience could hardly believe what they were seeing and hearing. Randy showed some cartoon genealogy funnies, then Ti-shirt designs (and taking his shirt off to catcalls, revealing his “Genealogy is Like Sex” shirt), and introducing Chris Dunham's genealogy satire site, The Genealogue (www.genealogue.com). After several Top 10 lists, genealogisms and tag lines, he covered possible genealogy TV show themes, rejected conference topics, and a Genea-Man comic book.

Finally, Randy played the song “I Am My Own Grandpa” and demonstrated the relationships on a pedigree chart, ending in a sing-along for the ending chorus. He finished with reasons why he thinks genealogy is fun – citing on-site research, conferences, geneablogger meetups, cruises, teaching and working in local societies as fun experiences.

Before the presentation, Randy passed out Genealogy Bingo cards to the participants, and during the talk the attendees crossed off words in the categories of Names, Places, Relationships, Terms and Random words as they were said or read on the screen. Attendees were encouraged to shout “Bingo” when they completed their first line, but nobody completely filled their card (it was close, Shirley Becker fell one square short – the place was “Salt Lake City.”) **Who knew that genealogy could be so much fun?**

Randy also had a handout with genealogy humor sites (including poems, tag lines, stories, videos) and a list of recommended free and commercial online genealogy sites to help attendees with their research.

Social Security Death Index May Be Removed from Public Access

Due to purported identity theft issues, the United States Congress is considering bills to remove the Death Master Index (known by genealogists as the Social Security Death Index) from public access. At present, it is available for searching at a number of sites (Ancestry.com, FamilySearch, GenealogyBank, American Ancestors, Archives.com, etc.).

Judy Russell, who writes <http://www.legalgenealogist.com/blog/blog>, has several excellent posts about the issues, and the actions that genealogists can take to try to influence the legislation:

- [SSDI Call to Action](#) – what the issues are, and what we can do.
- [SSDI Hearings. OUCH!](#) - a review of the hearings at which genealogists were excluded.

Judy suggests these actions:

- We need to be careful to have our facts straight and not sink access to one type of record in order to save access to another. It might sound easy to argue "it's birth certificates, not Social Security numbers, that cause problems!" Right. And you know what would happen next, right? Right. We'd lose even more access to birth certificates.
- So... don't wing it! Get your talking points straight from those who've worked hard to get the facts for the genealogical community. The Records Preservation & Access Committee (a joint committee of the Federation of Genealogical Societies, the National Genealogical Society, and the International Association of Jewish Genealogical Societies) has an online guide you should carefully read.

Judy points out: "... remember that there ARE arguments on the other side of this issue. People DO have issues with privacy, they DO have fears and concerns, and we are NOT going to answer those fears and concerns with anything less than careful, reasoned arguments."

Cooperative Variant Name Project Announced

Ancestry.com, BehindTheName.com, and WeRelate.org announced an improved approach to finding variant names in genealogy searches. Up to now, most genealogy websites have had to rely upon Soundex to return variant names in response to searches. These approaches often miss variants that should be returned, or include variants that aren't very similar.

Ancestry.com, BehindTheName.com, and WeRelate.org have created an open-source database of name variants that is free for any website or genealogy software developer to use. Tested against pairs of names provided by Ancestry.com, it reduces the number of missed name variants by over 25% in comparison with Soundex.

How you can help: A large portion of genealogical expertise involves learning variant spellings for the surnames in your tree. **Why not share your knowledge with others?** By adding your variant spellings to the database, searches on any website that uses it will include your variant spellings automatically. **You can review and add variant spellings here:** <http://www.werelate.org/wiki/Special:Names>

In addition, we need people to review the changes that others have made to the database, to make sure that we have multiple pairs of eyes reviewing the names that are being added and removed. **You can review changes that others have made here:** <http://www.werelate.org/wiki/Special:NamesLog>

In addition to the database of name variants, the source code also includes a function to return the similarity score between any two names. This function has been found useful in duplicate detection.
