
Message from the President:

Our March Meeting

Steve Morse made a return visit to speak to the 26 members and three guests, this time about little known gems that he did not cover in his talk last November: From DNA to Genetic Genealogy. This talk was called Hodgepodge and he pointed out all kinds of useful tools on his webpage: www.stevemorse.org – that's dot org, not dot com.



For those of you looking forward to our talk this month on Italian genealogy research, Steve mentioned the website Italian Genealogical Group (http://www.italiangen.org/) which you can use even if your ancestor is not Italian. this site has some death, marriage and birth indexes which I used several years ago to find my British ancestor's marriage. If you go down to Births, Deaths and other Vital Records on the One-Step Webpage, your results will include the Family History Library microfilm number which has the actual record.

Another item he mentioned which you might not know about, the Family History Library will provide you with

a photocopy from a book, microfilm, etc. for free. Their policy just changed in February and all copies will be digital now. For more information, see the item on this topic further down in the newsletter.

There is a whole section on One-Step Webpages for Calendars, sunrise, sunset, and maps. Here you can find Canadian Postal Codes, International Phone Codes, Latitude and Longitude, perpetual calendar, and calculating Easter. Calculating relationships, under the Vital Records section, was great fun. Press father three times and then press mother and then press sister. You will find your relationship to this person.

Steve Morse uses databases that are already online and makes it easier for you to search them. Check out his website for immigration and ship searches, census searching and more.

#### Websites for Beginners: USGenWeb - www.usgenweb.org

If you are a beginner, or even a long time researcher, the USGenWeb site is a webpage worth knowing and using. On their homepage, you are greeted with: *Welcome to The USGenWeb Project! We are a group of volunteers working together to provide free genealogy websites for genealogical research in every county and every state of the United States. This Project is non-commercial and fully committed to free genealogy access for everyone.* 

USGenWeb has been around since 1996 when a group of genealogists decided to create online resources for the various states. The organization is by state and then by county. Every state website is run by a state coordinator, sometimes with assistants. Every county website is also run by a coordinator. All of these people volunteer their time and you will notice that some counties are up for adoption – meaning that they need a coordinator.

Most of the state webpages will provide a list of counties as well as a map of counties which link to the county webpages. Some of the states and some of the counties are better and more useful than others. Take a look at the Allen County webpage in Indiana for an example of a nicely run county webpage. Right at the top they have all kinds of links which help you quickly find what you might need. Some webpages just give you a list of links to other webpages and are not especially helpful.

Good county websites will give you information and links to county newspapers past and present, cemeteries, obituaries, vital records, military records and census information. For a fabulous example of good cemetery

information, check out Gibson County, Indiana. Over 55,000 burials are listed, most with photographs. The burials are arranged by township and then by cemetery and are cross-indexed by the names of those buried.

There is also a USGenWeb Archives Project which provides actual transcriptions of public domain records on the Internet. There is a lot out there, from census records, Civil War soldiers and marriages to newspaper and tombstone projects. Volunteers have made public data available in a web format which is a huge help. This is searched by state or by county and these projects can be accessed from the main USGenWeb page, clicking on Projects and then on the Archives Project.

Check out the Tombstone Transcription Project and go to Merced County. There you will find that several cemeteries have been transcribed and some have photos. This would be a good site to search if you have not found your ancestor at Find A Grave. You can also sign up to be a volunteer, helping to add information to the website. There are other projects but information is scant in some cases.

The Merced County GenWeb page is maintained by John Reeder. Our society webmaster, Alma Stone, has a Merced Genealogy webpage also. Check her page out at <a href="http://www.mercedgenealogy.com/">http://www.mercedgenealogy.com/</a> and look at the difference between the two webpages. If you find that a GenWeb page for your county of interest seems to have a lack of information, search the web for the county, state and "genealogy" and you may find another webpage that is useful. Historical Societies and Genealogy Societies put up pages. Sometimes your area will have a regional webpage that has more information than GenWeb county you are researching.

A good genealogist does not rely on only once or two sources. Branch out and you will find that there are many good resources on web sites that are free. USGenWeb is on of those.

#### FamilySearch's Photoduplication Service

Can't get to Salt Lake City to print out an image you need? Sometimes when you are searching in FamilySearch.org, you will find an indexed record but no image. If you have the information about the image FamilySearch can provide you with a copy. You must provide them with an email address or have your items sent to a Family History Center where you can print them. More details about this service, where to send your request, what details you must include, etc., can be found at the FamilySearch.org blog. After you get to the Blog, search on photoduplication. The article will come up in a brief format, so click the title to see all the details.

Patrons should request copies by emailing their request to Photoduplication@familysearch.org. All requests MUST include the following information:

✓ Film or Fiche number, Item number, Name of Individual(s) referred to in the record, Title of the record, Name of parents, spouse, grantor, grantee, etc., Event type (Birth, Death or Marriage), Complete event date and place, Event place (county, parish, township, etc.), Volume or page number, Registration or Certificate Number, Any other information that will help us locate your record.

Oregon House Bill 2093 contains wording that, if passed, will restrict family members and genealogists from accessing records that have been previously available to them. In Section 33 of the proposal, ORS 432.121 will be amended to allow the issuance of records only "when 125 years have elapsed after the date of live birth, 75 years have elapsed after the date of death or fetal death or 100 years have elapsed after the date of marriage, domestic partnership, dissolution of marriage or dissolution of domestic partnership." **The deadline for input is April 8<sup>th</sup>!** NOTE: This proposal will change today's rules:

Death records become available after 50 years; Marriage become available after 75 years; Birth records become available after 100 years.
