# Beginning Your Cherokee Genealogical Research



Speaker: Bob Ringo

Mr. Ringo, who is 3/32d Cherokee himself, will outline the steps the Cherokee researcher should follow. He has been researching his own Cherokee ancestry for over twenty years and has lots of knowledge and experience. According to Mr. Ringo there are numerous records of individual Cherokees beginning in the early 1800s.

His presentation will cover the importance of Federal Census records as well as the various Indian rolls that can assist the researcher and will help you get started by using examples from his own work uncovering Cherokee records.

Officers who were present at the meeting were sworn in during a short Installation Ceremony. A short meeting was followed by our program: Rosalie Heppner covered family group sheets and pedigree charts; Susan Benes spoke on census records as a major source of information; Michle Burroughs obituaries. certificates discussed death cemeteries: Anne Field went over the importance of writing down your sources of information; and Shari Stetson provided the introduction and the finishing up where she touched on the difference between online trees and genealogy software programs for your own computer. Packets for beginners were passed out. Those who did not receive a packet (we ran out) can pick up one at the main desk of the Merced Library. A drawing was held and the prize of a how-to genealogy book was presented to one of the beginners.

#### Looking for a new Editor!






The Family: Three Journeys into the Heart of the Twentieth Century, a new book by David Laskin, was written up in Parade Magazine this past December. Laskin, a journalist and author of other books, felt a need, as he approached sixty, to find out more about his Jewish roots. And he did. His grandfather's sister was not only the founder of the Maidenform Bra company, she was also forced to leave Tsarist Russia at age 19 for her revolutionary activities. She arrived at Ellis Island with almost nothing to her name but found work as a seamstress. The family came from a village in Belarus. One branch left for Palestine in the 1920s, one remained, and his branch ended up in the Lower East side of New York City. By 1920, the family had their own home in Brooklyn. #### San Francisco Burials Index

In August of this year, the California Genealogical Society and Library's blog page at CaliforniaAncestors.org announced the reprinting of **San Francisco**, **California**, **I.O.O.F. Crematory Records**. The book first came out in 2001 and is an index of eight registers of the now defunct Independent Order of Odd Fellows Crematory of San Francisco. The crematory was once located at the cemetery but was demolished in 1910.

The I.O.O.F., the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, is an organization of men and women who believe in a supreme being who have come together in their communities and follow the basic guidelines of friendship, love and truth in their daily lives, hoping to make a difference in the world. The organization began in 18<sup>th</sup> century England and in North American in 1819. Members belong to Lodges which aim to improve the lives of themselves and others, help those in need, extend sympathy and aid, and by organizing charitable projects that benefit the less fortunate.

Included in their good works is the directive to bury the dead and I.O.O.F. cemeteries are found througout the United States.

The cremation records are indexed, there are about 10,000 of them, covering the period from about 1895 to 1911. Abstracts give the deceased's name, birthplace, sex, date of death and age, place and cause of death and whether an obituary is available in the original record. #### **Doris Cochran Room Update**

Stephanie McLeod, our president, announced the **new rules for member use of the DCR** at our January meeting. If you wish to use the room you may come in on Wednesdays from 1-4 p.m. or Saturdays from noon to 3 p.m. If you need to use it at another time you can check with the library staff to see if there is someone who can be down there with you while you are there, or they will contact one of the Board members to see if one of them can be with you in the DCR. #### **Civil War Tree Project**


Along a highway stretching from Charlottesville, Virginia, to Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, a tree-planting project is taking place. The group Hallowed Ground is working to plant a tree for every soldier who died fighting during the Civil War – 620,000. The road from Charlottesville to Gettysburg is just one part of a larger route, with 108 trees that were to be planted before winter. Rather than building another monument, the group wants the trees to commemorate the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Civil War. A \$100 donation will plant one tree and people have donated trees to remember their ancestors who fought in this war.

Working with groups such as the National Park Service, Ancestry.com and Fold3, an interactive map will be created that will allow anyone to find a tree dedicated to an individual soldier by using a smartphone app. There will be a variety of trees – eastern redbuds, red sunset maples, willow oaks, cedar and more – very colorful. When completed, the project will be the largest man-made pathway of trees on the globe, streting 180 miles north to south over three states.

#### A Note from your Editor...

The states of New England are not the only states with records that go way back. Town records were kept in New England – births, marriages, deaths and other very useful sources of information – are available for most of the states in New England. If you have Massachusetts ancestors, like I do, count yourself lucky. I have ancestors from Louisiana and Florida going way back and am so thankful that the French and Spanish kept such wonderful records. Two of my ancestors came over from France in 1720 to help settle the new French territory in what is now Louisiana. They are on three censuses taken in New Orleans in the 1720s. They are also listed on the manifest of the ship on which they emigrated. The French and Spanish took turns ruling over this area and the Catholic Church records are very good. Baptisms, marriages, burials – the originals in Spanish or French – have been transcribed and abstracted in English and can be a gold mine of information. My ancestor's family, who eventually moved up the Mississippi River to the Arkansas Post, a remote outpost on the Arkansas River, are witnesses in many of the baptisms and marriages that were recorded. When I looked at some of the original records, I found that the daughters in the family were all able to sign their names while the sons made their marks. My guess is that the daughters were sent down to New Orleans to board at the Ursuline Convent and learned to read and write. The Arkansas Post was a pretty rough place, lots of hunters and trappers and maybe not the best place to raise young ladies. Charlotte Reynes, below, was my ancestor Marguerite's sister.
