

July Meeting


Visiting the Azores

Taking a Genealogy Trip

There is nothing like a genealogy quest to rekindle your enthusiasm, to make you buckle down and get organized and to find the gravestone, the church or the courthouse in the place where your ancestor lived. It takes quite a bit

of planning and is not always a relaxing pleasure trip. But the rewards can be great.




I have taken several trips and I will tell you from the start that I have almost always taken them alone. No one else has wanted to traipse through cemeteries, spend days going through local microfilms, or look through deeds at the courthouse. I have had some company on some of my trips. My older sister helped me walk through several graveyards in Indiana a couple years ago. And my daughter was with me when we spent four hours at the courthouse in Illinois copying as much as we could from a probate record file. This last was like winning the lottery as the probate file was not on microfilm and it told the sad tale of my ancestors' divorce — no way to know that

otherwise.

I went on a trip to Texas a couple years ago and spent most of my nights at the homes of cousins I had never met who shared old family photos and documents and stories. I was on my own at the research libraries and cemeteries, but enjoyed my evenings with my cousins. I went to Florida, Texas and Alabama on another trip where I visited with more cousins, found a family Bible I didn't know existed, took lots and lots of cemetery photos and pored through microfilms of old Pensacola newspapers for obituaries, births and marriages. My trip to Brooklyn, Connecticut and Catskill, New York, were all on my own except for a

visit with friends in Manhattan. More cemeteries, deeds and newspapers to comb through. Being by myself, I could spend as much time as I wanted.

I came home from each trip with loads and loads of photos and photocopies and notes, some of which I still need to deal with. Since then, three of the people I visited have died and I am so glad I did not put off my trips. There is nothing like seeing the town where your ancestor lived even though it is quite different now, with stoplights, fast food joints and motels.



Don't feel intimidated and don't wait for someone to go with you. Just do it! You need to plan in advance. Find out where the cemetery is and check to see if it is always open or has a locked gate. One I went to was locked on the weekends. Will the cemetery office be open while you are there? Does the courthouse have the records you want to see? Is there a historical society or a genealogy library? What days and hours will they be open? Does a local library have microfilms of newspapers? Do they have old city directories? Can you look at their catalog online before you go? I spent several days at the University of West Florida in Pensacola and realized that classes and finals had just finished. Their hours were

different but I had the microfilm readers to myself. I was lucky. They might have closed down for a summer break.

Take your camera, have extra batteries and cards. Take photos of the name of the cemetery before you take the photos – you will be thankful you did later on. Take a laptop or a tablet and a scanner if you can. Small clippers and a whisk broom can be a big help at a cemetery. A cemetery office usually has cemetery or burial records. I found out at a cemetery in Brooklyn that, even though the tombstone had only my great great grandfather's name and his mother's name on it, his adult son and an infant son were also buried there. It's worth paying for the records if you have to. Most of the things I found, photographed and copied were not on Ancestry, nor or FamilySearch.org. These are the things you can only find by going to your ancestor's city or town. So, get going!

A Woman's Maiden Name

Finding a woman's maiden name can sometimes be a challenge. Here is one possible way you might try. When I was searching for my ancestors in Bermuda, I came across a book published in 1993: *Early Bermuda Wills, 1629-1835*, by Hollis Hallet. It wasn't cheap but I bought it and am glad I did as it is out of print now.

This wonderful book indexes every name in every will and estate document with an emphasis on people, not property. At 692 pages, there are a lot of names. I was using this to find the father of my ancestor, Catherine, Trimingham Brent. Various family histories and trees had either left her out or had named her father as a Trimingham who had died before she was born or as the daughter of her brother. I knew she was born in Bermuda and that the family had been in Bermuda since the 1620s. In this book she was indexed under Catherine Brent, dau of John Trimingham who died in 1735. That was a Yes! moment but not my Aha! moment. That came a little later.

Because Bermuda was an island, the families there intermarried quite often and the family lines get quite tangled with the same names coming up over and over again – there are ten John Triminghams born before 1800. The usefulness of the index is that it notes the relationship of the person being indexed to the will or estate: a witness to the will, executor of a will, the widow of the deceased, the son-in-law, daughter, grandson, etc. With each entry the will book information is given. So before I even saw the actual will, I knew who Catherine's father was. It also helped me find who a widow remarried after her first husband died when she was mentioned in the second husband's will. A couple examples from this "worth the price" book:


Trimingham, Mary Jane, dau of late Deborah Murray (niece of Miss Angelina Perot)

Godfrey, William, mariner, Bite Finger Bay, Pembroke Parish, gs of late Richard Stamers (of Bite Finger Bay); ch: William, Edward, Lover, Peter

bro-in-law John Ingham, sis-in-law: Hannah Trout, Ruth Sherlock

exec: Col Francis Jones, Paget Parish

wit: Richard Stamers, Joseph Underwood, Benjamin Wood.



...and my daughter Catherine Brent... - the actual will that I found in Bermuda.

The moral of my tale – my aha! moment - is to look for indexes to will books and probate records that record every name mentioned. This is not always possible because often they are indexed by the name of the person who died, but if you are lucky, as I was, you may find that elusive maiden name.
