

Genealogy Super Candy, where Technology meets DNA and Family Trees

From the RootsTech 2019 Conference, submitted by Darel Scoggin

At the Salt Lake City RootsTech 2019 conference the Thursday 2/28/19 meeting opening speaker was Ancestry's CEO Margo Georgiadis. Margo is relatively new with Ancestry and she comes in with a technology background which was well demonstrated with all the new tools, bells and whistles, **the super candy for us Ancestry users.**

Margo's closing comment was: "The Power of this Ancestry Community and the Shared Passion for Discovery"!

Ancestry has:

- 20 Billion Records from over 80 countries
- 100 Million Family Trees with 11 Billion connections
- 15 Million DNA Tests: Soon will have more this number of people in their DNA network.

New Technology on Ancestry.com:

- 1. **My Tree Tags:** 20 tag options including custom tags, with ability for filtering and tags are searchable.
- 2. DNA is now easier to find family connections:
- a. New matches tools to sort, group and view with custom coding and labeling.
- b. Beta version of "ThruLines" the alternative to DNA Circles (ability to toggle between ThruLines and DNA Circles) **Check it out, Wow!**
- 3. Addition of 7 major areas, including: 12 States, U.S. Immigration records, US Naturalization records, U.S. Military record and WWII Draft Cards.
- 4. Soon launch **World's largest database of searchable Obits** with ability to find, read, and extract from Newspaper.com.
- 5. **Global Expansion:** 100 million new records from Denmark, Finland, France, Mexico and Norway.
- 6. **94 New Updated Ancestry DNA Communities**: for customers of African and Afro Caribbean descendancy.

If you listen and watch her talk I am sure you will get more than have I listed here.

How to Create a Bridge Back to Your Irish Roots By Lewis M. Ruddick

March Speaker: Lewis M. Ruddick: In 1981 my father gave me a very brief family history of my Ruddick surname and asked me to learn where our surname family came from in Europe.

This presentation is my investigative route taken to go back 330 years from Ukiah, California to <u>The Diamond, Grange Lower, Armagh, Ireland</u>, and touch my Ruddock family roots.

"I have been to and researched in Ireland twice. The Irish research tools leading me to those trips are a fair part of the presentation as well as how I identified Ireland as my objective. The specific tools are old fashioned library research, modern internet research and genetic genealogy. The latter two did not exist when I began my quest."

"On our first trip to Ireland I had not properly identified the location of my family and drove right past it. On the second trip the location above had now been identified and we were guided for one full week of our three weeks trip by a member of my extended Irish Ruddock family."

Lewis' family history includes his paternal side coming to California during the Gold Rush and his maternal side came from Nebraska and the end of the Great Depression.

"My great grandfather of the same name married a Miller whose mother was a Gann. During my considerable research I learned of the contributions of my huge Gann family to the great Central Valley of California and they are considerable. They range from leading wagon trains to California during the Gold Rush and supplying the "49ers" with freight, food and livestock to more recently being an active member of the State legislature."

Lewis is a Past President of the Genealogical Society of Stanislaus County. His personal career is 27 ½ years of law enforcement which began upon his discharge from the U.S. Army. He began his genealogical research before the internet and genetic genealogy.
