## **At Our September Meeting**

Last month we were privileged to hear a presentation by Michael Gleason titled **Documenting Your Past**.

Documenting Your Past provides a searchable database of envelopes, letters, postcards, documents, checks, receipts and other items pertaining to our ancestors daily lives from the early 1800's through 1930.

The database is searchable by first or last name, date, town, or state. Each item contains a brief description and scans of the information contained within. Should you so desire, the original items are all available for sale, or for a fee, copies can be provided. Once an item is sold, the information is maintained in the database to allow future researchers access to the information.

They also provide a watch list you may sign up for that will automatically notify you should a name you are searching for be added to our database.

### What is Elephind?

Elephind.com is a search engine that operates much like Google, Bing, Yahoo and other search engines. What makes Elephind different is that it searches only historical, digitized newspapers. Rather than having to visit the web site of each collection separately, you may search for free across many newspaper sites simultaneously.

Some current facts about Elephind:

- 2,677 newspaper titles indexed.
- Two and a half million editions, from March 1803 to August 2013 included.
- The Elephind search engine has indexed 141,628,238 items from 2,677 newspaper titles including sites like Chronicling America (the U.S.'s Library of Congress) and Trove (National Library of Australia), as well as smaller collections.
- Many of the smaller newspaper sites are not well known and may be difficult to find with the usual search engines.

## Now Online: Official Records of the Union & Confederate Navies

We read a lot about soldiers in the American Civil War, but not much is said about the sailors in the navies of each side. Yet, maritime battles played a significant role in this war. If you have ancestors that you believe may have served in one navy or the other, here is a new resource to research: Official Records of the Union and Confederate Navies.

Fold3.com has recently added this to their collection. This collection contains the two navies' official reports, orders, and correspondence from the Civil War. It is great source for first-hand information about the Northern and Southern navies.

Originally compiled by the Navy Department, the Official Records of the Navies you will find this information in two series:

- Series I, 27 individual volumes which documents all wartime operations of the two navies.
- Series II, 3 volumes and an index includes with statistical data of Union and Confederate ships, letters of marque and reprisal, Confederate departmental investigations, Navy and State department correspondence, proclamations and appointments of President Davis, and more.

# WHERE TO FIND BRITISH ARMY SERVICE RECORDS

What you can find on Ancestry.com

British Army WWI Pension Records 1914-1920

This database contains service records of non-commissioned officers and other ranks who were discharged from the Army and claimed disability pensions for service in WWI. These were also men who did not re-enlist in the Army prior to World War II. The type of information contained in these records

includes: name of solider, age, birthplace, occupation, marital status, and regiment number.

British Army WWI Medal Rolls Index Cards, 1914-1920 (featured in last month's Snoop)

This database contains the Medal Rolls Index, or Medal Index Cards. The collection currently contains approximately 4.8 million people, which is nearly all of the total collection. The records can be searched by first and last name and Corps, Unit or Regiment. These cards were created by the Army Medal Office (AMO) of the United Kingdom in Droitwich near the close of World War I (WWI).



UK, Soldiers Died in the Great War, 1914-1919

This database contains information extracted from 81 volumes of soldiers that died in World War I. It includes over 703,000 individuals.

Information listed may include: name of soldier, birthplace, enlistment place, residence, number, decoration, rank, regiment, battalion, type of casualty, death date, death place, and theater of war served in.

This is a brief guide to researching British government and military records of the First World War. First World War records are wideranging and are kept in a variety of archives. This guide will help you gain a general overview of the main sources of the information that exists, and where to find it.

#### Military service records (c.1914-c.1920)

Search service records of British Army soldiers on Ancestry  $(\pounds)$ . Search and download  $(\pounds)$  a selection of service records for the Royal Navy and the Royal Air Force from Discovery, our catalogue. For further information on records of individuals browse our research guides.

• Cabinet papers (1915-1981) Search our Cabinet Papers website for documents concerning decisions and discussions before, during, and after the First World War.

Explore additional records of the Cabinet and its wartime sub-committees, through our catalogue, in CAB 38 and CAB 42.

• British Army unit war diaries (1914-1922) Download a selection of British Army unit war diaries (WO 95) for the First World War. The rest of the series, not yet digitised, can be accessed at The National Archives at Kew (see below).

Unit war diaries do not generally contain biographical information.

## What records can I find at The National Archives at Kew?

 British Army unit war diaries (1914-1922 Search WO 95 in our catalogue for war diaries from the First World War. These diaries were daily accounts of operations.

Find records of injured First World War servicemen online for the first time Over 1.3 million records from daily and weekly First World War casualty lists have been released online by **TheGenealogist**. This vast collection of unique records covers all ranks to help you discover more about your injured ancestor's wartime service.

The new records include career soldiers, volunteer Pals battalions, war poets and even a future Prime Minister, Harold Macmillan. The

collection covers both those who died of their wounds and those who recovered and returned to the front.

Details include:the name of the
injured serviceman,
his regiment and
rank, the date he
was registered as a
'casualty' and often
his home town or
place of enlistment.
