


Church to celebrate 185th anniversary

NORTH WEST — The North West United Baptist Church was organized November 3, 1809, when seven male and three female members were given the right hand of fellowship by the moderator of the churches of the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick Association.

Worship services were held in the homes of the members until the meeting house style church was built 1818-1820.

Records show that this church has always been a caring, sharing and hard-working group of people, emphasizing a "community church" rather than a "Baptist Church." Although not large in number, the church still carries on the work which began in 1809.

The 185th anniversary year of this church was celebrated throughout 1994, with the following events:





A NOTE FROM THE AUTHORS

Having the privilege to search the records of one hundred and eighty-five years of history of the North West United Baptist Church has been a learning experience and a great joy.

The church's early beginnings had only ten members and many were their times of struggle and hardship, but through the leading of the Holy Spirit, they overcame and carried on and passed their courage on to future generations.

Records show that this church has always been a caring, sharing and hard working group of people. Although not large in numbers, the church still carries on the work which began in 1809.

The North West church was built in meeting house fashion and was first called the "Meeting House". Many people today still refer to it as the "Meeting House".

Most of the information in this book is recorded in the records and minutes which are in the possession of church members. The originals, in some cases, are at the Acadia Archives.

It was very interesting to find out in our research that what kept the church and community together were the "fun times". People were inclined to remain member of the social get-togethers. This seems to be the "glue" that held the church as well as the church and community together.

The history of the North West United Baptist Church has emphasized being a "community church" rather than a "Baptist church".

Youth groups, Sunday School, Sewing Circle, and Women's Missionary Society are some of the groups who welcomed anyone in the surrounding communities who wished to participate.

The following Church Covenant was read at meetings:

CHURCH COVENANT

Having been led, as we believe, by the Spirit of God, to receive the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour, and on the profession of our faith, having been baptized in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, we do now in the presence of God, angels, and of this assembly, most solemnly and joyfully enter into covenant with one another, as one body in Christ.

We engage, therefore, by the aid of the Holy Spirit, walk together in Christian love; to strive for advancement of this church, in knowledge, holiness, and comfort; to promote its prosperity and spirituality; to sustain its worship, ordinances, discipline, and doctrines; to contribute cheerfully and regularly to the support of the ministry, the expenses of the church, and other benevolent objects; to abstain from our meetings, assemblies, and exercises, and to be zealous in our efforts to advance the kingdom of God, through his word.

We also engage to maintain family and secret devotion; to religiously educate our children; to seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaintances; to walk circumstantially in the world; to be just in our dealings, faithful in our engagements, and exemplary in our deportment; to avoid all tampering, backbiting, and excessive vanity in our dressings, and to abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating drink as a snare; to absolve from the same and use of intoxicating drink as a snare; to be slow to take offence, but always ready for reconciliation, and mindful of the rules of our Saviour, to secure it without delay.

We further engage to watch over one another in brotherly love, to remember each other in prayer; to aid each other in sickness and distress; to cultivate Christian sympathy in feebling and courtship, to carry out the spirit of this covenant, and remove from this place, we will as soon as possible unite with some other church where we can carry out the spirit of this covenant and principles of God's word.

There was no Meeting House or place of worship, but the meetings of Divine Service were kept in the dwelling houses of the brethren, 1809 - 1817 Rev. Joseph Dimock

Mr. Joseph Dimock, minister of the Baptist Church at Chester did attend to administer the Ordinance of Baptism and the Lord's Supper, divine Service being held by the Deacons and Clerk, until a man by the name of Mr. Robert Davies who proposed to be a minister of the Gospel came among us.

The Moderator gave the right hand of Fellowship to seven male and three female members as a church of Jesus Christ. Five of them being dismissed from the church in Chester as follows:

3rd The Council proceeded to ask such questions as are contained in the Articles of the several churches belonging to the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick Association, to all which satisfactory answers were given.

2nd The brethren appointed brother Joseph Falkenhime to speak for them and answer such questions as the Council may ask.

1st chose Elder Dimock of Chester, Moderator and Brother John Masters of Newport, Clerk.

A committee from the Baptist Church at Chester met at Lunenburg at the request of a number of baptized brethren in Lunenburg to council and assist in organizing a church. The Council formed.

The above subscription was paid into the hands of George Hubley and Paulus Langille who were elected trustees to collect and expend the aforementioned subscription in building a Meeting House, place of worship, or house of the Lord, called or known by the name of Baptist, and that the aforementioned House is to be used, occupied, and enjoyed, for the worship and service of God.

The Reverend Joseph Dimock, pastor at Chester, made regular

the homes of the brethren. Dimock was a warm and affectionate man
who was equally liked by both men and women. He was accustomed to
preaching the Good News amid opposition and the threat of physical
harm.

From the time of the church's beginnings in 1809 until 1817,
the small group of believers struggled without a pastor.

Mrs. John Mader b. 1802 at North West d. 1896 at New Canada. (In 1828 she walked in company with others from North West to Horton, now Wolfville to attend the first Baptist Association held in the maritimes. In 1855 she moved to New Canada. She was one of the first settlers. She prayed in German, and her life was one strong in the Christian faith.)

On Mrs. John Mader's tombstone at Lakeside Cemetery, New Canada, is the following inscription:

These six women did not have a vote, but their presence was noted.

"So deep and intense was the interest taken in educational matters by some of the sisters of the Baptist churches of this country, that in 1828, besides the delegates sent from Chester to attend the Association, six sisters walked through the woods from Chester to Horton Road, now Wolfville, to be in attendance upon the promised land. The names of the other five towards the Promised Land because she conducted her sisters on nicknamed "Joshua" because he led them forward. Elizabeth Rock, afterwards Mrs. Edward Heckman, and Philibet Rock, afterwards Mrs. Elizabeth Lloyd (afterwards Mrs. John Mader (then Annie Emilio), Regina Lloyd (afterwards Mrs. Philip Corkum, of New Cumberland), and her sister, Philibet Spidle, of North West. These sisters were all kindly entertained during their stay by the late Judge DeWolfe, an Episcopalian." They remained over night with Mrs. Susanna Publicover, midway between Chester and Windsor.

History of the County of Lunenburg by M.D. Desbrisay, p. 285

Six unmarried women, members of the NorthWest Baptist Church, walked through the woods from Chester to Horton road, to attend this Association Meeting in 1828 and to pledge their support for a place of higher learning.

A result was the founding of Horton Academy and growing out of the need for theological instruction, Acadia University.

In the summer of 1828 at Horton, which is now Wolfville, Nova Scotia, a meeting was held to promote and carry on the work of the Baptist Educational Society.

BAPTIST EDUCATIONAL SOCIETY/FOUNDING OF HORTON ACADEMY

Paulus Langille and John Mader were ordained as deacons at the same time.

Mr. Maynard Parke came among us as a preacher and in August 1831 he was ordained and set apart to the ministry by Elders Joseph Dimock, William Chipman, Ezekiel Masters and Imm E. Bill.

MAYNARD PARKER was inducted on August 29, 1831. Money was raised by subscription to hire Mr. Parker.

The re-enactment of that "Historic Walk" took place in the summer of 1988 and is recorded later in this book.

PERSONAGE LAND AND HOUSE

The minutes state that Rev. Robert Daviess, a man not in good standing with the Association ingratiated himself with part of the church and for several years the church was "divided against itself". There is much written in the minutes of 1830 - 1838 Book 1, regarding Rev. Robert Daviess.

1830 - 1838 Rev. Robert Daviess returned to North West and Rev. Maynard Parker is still the minister.

On November 23, 1833 the church was opened. The occasion was marked by an inter-denominational preaching rally in which Maynard Parker represented North West. That was the beginning of North West's church planting activity.

The minutes also suggest that they valued the principles of political freedom and liberty of conscience as guaranteed under the Constitution of England.

The people of North West became church planters. In the summer of 1833 in cooperation with the "German or Scotch Presbyterians, Lutherans, Calvinists, Baptists and Wesleyan Methodists," they built and dedicated a Union church in Mahone Bay.

Mr. I. B. Worthy Lake resigned as trustee of the North West Meeting House and burial grounds and parsonage house and lot. Brother John A. Andrews chosen as trustee.

At a special church meeting on October 31, 1836, it was agreed that George Hubley and John Mader be appointed Trustees in place of Robert Davis and Peter Langille.

Fourty six (46) members were considered irregular members by the Council. These 46 forfeited their standing in the church connected with the Association by upholding and supporting Robert Davis who had been excommunicated.

In 1838, 46 persons forfeited their standing by supporting Robert Davis. It appears Mr. Parker's pastorate ended in 1838. Conference minutes state that there are 56 members on record at this time united with the Baptist Association.

Brother Obediah Parker, Lic., from Bridgewater presented a letter of dismission from the Bridgewater church and was received into the membership of the North West Church. He was voted in to continue as a Lic. of this church.



Candidates for baptism were baptized on the sabbath following the meeting and were received in the church that same Sunday, receiving the "right hand of fellowship". The Lord's Supper being administered after the preaching.

At monthly conference meetings people spoke freely of their hope in Christ. People related their Christian experiences and dancing at their wedding or someone else's wedding, etc., were received for baptism. Also, folks were excluded for adultery,

The Story of the original walk and its purpose has been well documented and is known far and wide, especially within our Baptist denomination. Let me only say here that those six new Christians from the North West Baptist Church, who so courageously braved the delegates meeting at the Baptist Association at Horton in 1828, to proceed during the following year for young men establishing for Christian ministry.


One of those highlights (recent though it be) worthy of our prayerful gratitude and indeed, a cause of great inspiration to us all was the historical Re-enactment of the Walk of 1818, observed in the Summer of 1988, in connection with the 150th Anniversary of the founding of Acadia University, first as Horton Academy, then Queen's College and finally as Acadia College.

Many are the highlights associated with the life and works of the people of the North West Church and of the community it served. To a considerable degree "what we have so graciously received" makes us what we are today.

In observance of the 185th Anniversary of the Northwest United Baptist Church it is most fitting to recall the events of times past and to give thanks to Almighty God for the faith and commitment of those who bequeathed to us "a goodly heritage."

The first organizational meeting was held at the Baptist Personage in Mahone Bay in 1987 and it was realized that the main thrust would have to come from the North West Church and from the Chester Baptist Church. The former, because the "walkers of 1828" came out of the North West Church; and the latter, because it was the founding Committee where: Rev. Dale Rose, those attending this ensure the success of the project. Those attending this Mahone Bay and North West Baptist Churches; Rev. Hazen Parent, a former pastor, Area 2 Minister at Large and a member, of the Convention Historical Society; Mrs. Myrtis Bertriniger, a member of the North West Church; and Rev. Bertrand Armstrong, Pastor of the Chester Baptist Church. Rev. Armstrong outlined the evolving plans for the Walk of Faith to take place in August of 1988 and secured its enthusiastic support, both morally and financially. In this summary I do not have the liberty to give the names of all whose individual efforts contributed to this year's success. And although I do not have the liberty to give the names of all who were involved in the planning, preparation, and execution of this year's walk, I can say a heartfelt "thank you" to the major stops along the route to Wolfville. And always on hand, either out in front or trailing just behind was our video Cameraman in the person of Doug Rhodenizer. Funny little incidents took place also, like the invitation to a wedding celebration just on the Windsor side of the Chanan Road. The ladies were showered with refreshments and were even greeted with a speech from the groom...and so it was on to Wolfville and Acadia University.

On Sunday it was worship time at the Chester Church at which time "walkers", all decked out in their lovely 1818 period dress, were presented to the congregation and in prayer, dedicated to the safe keeping of our Heavenly Father.

What a wonderful moment, after their marvel lloous send-off on the North West Mahone Bay side of the Bay, when the North West ladies disembarked at the Chester wharf on the beautiful clear day of Wednesday, August 20. There, they were joined by their Chester sisters and together proceeded up the hill to the Chester Baptist Church, where with family members and some honored guests, were all served a delicious meal courtesy of the ladies of the host church. Then it was on the road to the Valley. On that first day they made it as far as the Canaan Road, they all returned home for a good night's rest after a most exciting day.

Rev. Dale Rose accepted the picture and placed it on the back wall of the church as a historical memorial of the historical walk event. The names of those taking part and an account of the "walk" are on the back of the picture.





Records are available only since 1952. It is believed the North West Women's Missionary Society was organized May 19, 1912, so it is 82 years old.

Fun times have included picnics, pot luck suppers, corn boils, taking husbands or a guest out to dinner, and fun nights with members from Mahone Bay and New Cornwall societies.

Rev. Rob and Mrs. Sarah Patterson are Partmers in Mission for the pastorate. They appreciate and are very conscious of players and enjoy receiving letters and cards on birthdays and special days. They are a young couple who are in Nairobi, Kenya, doing urban youth work and leadership development.

Throughout the years, church services and crusade meetings were held. Very often missionaries spoke, other times local pastors from various denominations spoke, and sometimes soloists conducted by the members. Guest soloists provided the music as well as our own choirs, and members of the Mission Band.

At the time she had the longest standing membership as her grandmother, Mrs. Henry Berryinger took her to the meetings when she was in her early teens.

All members have Life Membership certificates and pins and most of the present members have Domination Life membership certificates and pins, all provided through the penny box. The first Life Membership certificate was presented to Mrs. Dennis Esenhauer in the 1940's. Agnes Spidle received the first Domination Life membership certificate and pins in 1973.

One night when we went to New Ross, Ozem Zitto took us by truck. It was fine weather when we started out, but during the evening it started to rain with no let up. While we waited for the rain to let up, Jeanie Veniot

Duncan also said that when Mr. James Joudrey died, Willibert's father, it was a rainy day and at the funeral, Mr. Allen had a flat tire so some of the young men had to patch the tire, and found a coal chisel inserted between the tire and the tube.

Duncan's first collection of Mr. Allen was when he and dad were working at the Lunenburg Foundry, building on a small room, and this man came along with an old car. I think it was a Chrysler Coup and it was all colors. He asked where he could go to buy some paint to paint his car, so Duncan sent him up to the Stedman's Store.

When Rev. George Allen came, we started to put on plays to raise money. The first I remember of Mr. Allen, he came to our home for supper and used to throw rocks down over the hill. He was good at that, too!

I can remember going back to Young People's meetings at an early age, before we had any electricity and only an old wood furnace. Willibert Joudrey was the janitor and lots of times there was no heat on, so we would have to stand around the furnace register and call down to him, go and get him to open the church. Then we would all go and smoke! "Let her smoke!"

The following are reminiscences of Beccher Spidle who is at present a Deacon at North West:

Many of those who were members of the Young People's group are still working in either North West Baptist church or other churches today. They remember the ministers who made a difference in their lives and the fun times.

The Young People's group was first organized under the leadership of Rev. Raymond MacFarlane. The first president was Olin Spidle.

Played the piano and we had a sing song. Late that night, Ozem went around the community and borrowed a guitar, Ozzie tarpaulin that leaked. We sat on the back of the truck with the leaky tarpaulin over us, and arrived home four o'clock in the morning wet and cold.

We always took extra passengers with us. Mrs. James Baugil liked to go to see the country. My sister, Grace, and Ray Young would play guitars and sing at intermission. One of the songs was "My Cross Eyed Gal She Lives Up on a Hill". One night my friend invited me stop and get it, until once it fell into the river.

On one of our trips to Blandford, Armond Falkenham drove us with his truck. We would all stand up behind us and crysler of some make with a rumble seat. We named it Henrietta. After our young people's meetings, we would dance under umbrellas, "Underneath the Old Umbrella".

I would also like to mention that Mr. Albert Dauphiné and Emry Dorey got on the stage and sang and fun times". His truck was a 1930's Model A Ford with dual wheel trucks around at the time".

Armond Falkenham remembered these outings as "Those were the times". In Armond's words, "There were not many dual wheel trucks around at fun times". He was a tall, stately young man with an umbrella." In her words, "The first time I saw Mr. Allen, he was at the church until her death in August 1994 remembered Young People's

Claudia Cook who remained interested in what was going on in and Rev. George Allen with fondness.

We held a mission Band picnic in the summer, at a beach or at someone's home.

One year we made a scrap Book of all the missionaries, where they were doing. We also made a village of moss and wood.

We learned about missionaries and their families and the countries they were serving in. The Women's Missionary Society supplied the Mission Band program material and supplies.

On the Sunday that Mission Band was held, the Sunday School offering was given to Mission Band.

I was a Mission Band Leader from the Fall of 1968 until March 1981. At the time, three classes ages seven to twelve attended Mission Band one Sunday a month during Sunday School time.

Dot Lantz gives her recollections of her term as Mission Band leader as follows:

Miss Leota Conrad, Vice. P.; Myrtis Bertringer, Secretary and Anna Véinotte, The Officers were: Miss Annie Herman, President; Miss Langille, Treasurer.

Leaders of the new group were: Evelyn Véinot, Rita Eiseenhauer and Myrtis Bertringer.

In the Fall of 1956, the Baptist Young People's Union (B.Y.P.U.) disbanded in order to organize a younger group. They installed the Oil Furnace at a cost of \$800.00. The \$77.89 left in the funds was passed on to the younger group.

Claudia clearly remembered the play "Lena Rivers" which came from a novel about a poor adopted girl who was looked down upon and "rose up".

Claudia also remembered Sleigh Casting parties at Mansons Spidie's Hill (where Aubrey and Myrtis Bertringer now live). They would then come to her house, which is directly across the street, for baked beans and donuts.

Claudia remembered about thirty young folks attending Young People's at North West. They had devotionals and singing and regular meetings. The plays which Beecher members were singing put on to "draw a crowd" and raise money for things such as a furnace for the church.


The decision was made during these years not to take offering up in the classes and the Sunday School would contribute \$100.00 per year to Mission Band.


