The SAR does a lot to preserve the history and understanding of the early patriots through educational programs, participation in community events, recognition programs, etc.

# **Pleasant Valley Cemetery**

The Pleasant Valley Cemetery is located on an oaken hilltop just west of Pleasant Valley. The land where the cemetery is located was conveyed several times, and eventually went to the Henry Schneider family. They dedicated the portion of land already being used as a cemetery. The earliest known burial was Harriet Norris in 1822. There are several other burials dated in the 1800's, although the majority of interments are from the 1900's. As with most pioneer era El Dorado County cemeteries, there are several unmarked graves in this cemetery.

Since the mid-1980's the Pleasant Valley Cemetery Corporation (more commonly known as the Pleasant Valley Committee) has maintained the cemetery and its history. There are seven members on the committee. The current President is Louisa Boeding, an ancestor of the Schneider family.

**How To Get There:** Pleasant Valley Cemetery is located on Heavenly Ridge Road which is off of Mt. Aukum Road (E16). To get there you go south on Missouri Flat Road from Highway 50. Follow Missouri Flat Road for about 1.5 miles to Pleasant Valley Road and turn left. Stay on Pleasant Valley Road for 10 miles until you reach Mt. Aukum Road/E16 and turn right. About .10 miles down Mt. Aukum Road you will see a sign on the right that says "Heavenly Ridge Road - not a through road" and "Pleasant Valley Cemetery". Follow this road past the houses to the chain link fence. The cemetery is inside the fence.
