The tour began at 1:00 with docent Pam Hufner who led half of the group on the tour in the research room while docent Fran Kilday guided the other half through the museum's exhibits.

Pam was very informative and showed us the various places to locate information needed to conduct our research. She explained the types of research that is available at the museum and supplied us with El Dorado County Historical Museum brochure. The members enjoyed looking at the various resources available and appreciated the knowledge that Pam shared.

Fran Kilday made the tour of the Artifacts and Exhibits very interesting. She is really enthusiastic about all the items displayed and really enjoys sharing her knowledge about them. She stated that she is gains more knowledge about El Dorado County regularly when people come in to tour the museum and then she can share it with others.

St. Louis Genealogical Society Releases Three New CDs

The following announcement was written by the St. Louis Genealogical Society:

The St. Louis Genealogical Society released three important new products on CD for Missouri research at its fortieth annual Family History Conference on Saturday, May 16.

St. Louis Burials, Volume 3, is the third in the Society's ongoing project to record every burial in every cemetery in St. Louis City and County. This newly released CD product includes over 330,000 interments in 21 cemeteries, including Bellefontaine (a large, historic non-denominational cemetery with burials of many famous Americans, including William Clark, Sarah Teasdale, William Tecumsah Sherman, Eberhard Anheuser, and Adolphus Busch) and Washington Park (the largest African-American cemetery in the state). Information on this CD (when available) includes names, dates and locations of birth, death, and burial, maiden names of women, ages, marital status, mortuaries, gravesite locations, and more. Previous CD products in this series include St. Louis Catholic Burials, recording nearly 500,000 burials in 26 Catholic cemeteries, and St. Louis Burials, Volume 2. which includes over 500,000 burials in 230 cemeteries, including Jefferson Barracks National Cemetery as well as many private family burial plots. St. Louis Burials, Volume 3, is available for purchase from the Society at the price of \$35.00 for Society members and \$40.00 for non-members.

The second CD product released at the Society's conference is a two-CD set of the first forty years of the Society's scholarly Quarterly journal, including a surname index to the first 34 volumes and an every-name index to the last six volumes. The Quarterly volumes are presented as every-wordsearchable PDF files. Also included on these CDs are indexes to all 1,330 articles by title, author, subject, and volume-page number. The Quarterly Journal CD is available for purchase either separately or as a two-CD set. Part 1 (volumes 1-20, 1968-1987) or Part 2 (volumes 21-40, 1988-2007) each costs \$25.00 for Society members and \$30.00 for non-members, when purchased singly. The two-volume set of all 40 years of the Quarterly costs \$45.00 for members and \$55.00 for nonmembers

The third product released at the conference is a booklet entitled **Web Resources**, with a companion CD. This 46-page booklet contains reprints of the Society's "Web Resources" columns from the past five years of its monthly newsletter, *News 'n Notes*. This popular genealogy-technology column has been completely updated for 2010 and the CD includes a PDF version of the booklet with live links to all websites. The Web Resources booklet and CD is available for the price of \$22.00 for Society members and \$25.00 for non-members.

LOCAL HISTORY

Coloma Pioneer Cemetery

Located at the site of the historic gold discovery at Sutter's Mill, the Pioneer Cemetery at Coloma has been known by several names over the years. These include: Sutter Mill Cemetery, Coloma Protestant Cemetery and the Vineyard Cemetery. The first known interments were in 1849. Robert Chalmers, who built the Vineyard House, and his family are buried in the cemetery. Chalmers was the earliest recorded owner of the land where the cemetery is located. Over all, over 600 souls would call this their final resting place. Many of the graves do not have markers. In fact, it is estimated that between 200 and 300 graves are unmarked. The cemetery passed into the ownership of the State of California in 1981 and is now a part of the Marshall Gold Discovery State Park in Coloma.




Directions:

Traveling south on Hwy 49 as you are starting to leave Coloma, Hwy 49 makes a sharp left at a crossroads. Go straight ahead onto Cold Springs Road. Right after passing the crossroads, you will see Marshall Parkway (Monument Rd) on your right, the road that takes you to the James Marshall Monument and Memorial. If you look to your left when you get to Marshall Parkway, you will see the cemetery on your left up on the hill side. Continue on up Cold Springs Rd a few more yards and you will see the entrance and parking area for the cemetery on the left."
