Records of births, marriages and deaths, together with many other government and private records, some dating from the Middle Ages, have been preserved in about 2,000 German archives. This book details the record collections in these archives that enable researchers to discover and describe German families of the past.” Anyone researching German ancestors should consult this informative guide.

Pictures of Ellis Island Before it Became a Tourist Attraction

Ellis Island was closed in 1954 and remained abandoned for years before being resurrected as a tourist attraction and memorial to America's immigrants. The Mail Online has published an eerie series of photographs showing what Ellis Island looked like during those years of neglect.

The photos make it obvious that arrival at the immigration gateway was not a joyous occasion for every immigrant. Illness was common. Some immigrants were sent back to the "old country," including young children who were returned without being accompanied by an adult. Then there is the morgue and the mortuary building where autopsies were performed.

Search More Than 40,000 Digitized Genealogy and Family History Books

You can search through more than 40,000 digitized genealogy and family history books from the archives of seven important family history libraries in the United States. Best of all, it is available right now and all of it is free of charge. Every word in every book is searchable. No, this isn't on Google Books. It is FamilySearch.org, the same web site that hosts the huge databases online at the same site: FamilySearch.org.

Perform a search at <http://books.familysearch.org> or click on the links to the individual libraries themselves. They are Allen County (Indiana) Public Library, Brigham Young University Harold B. Lee Library, Brigham Young University Hawaii Joseph F. Smith Library, Church History Library, Family History Library, Houston Public Library's Clayton Library Center for Genealogical Research, and the Mid-Continent Public Library's Midwest Genealogy Center.

The materials in the collections include family histories, county and local histories, genealogy magazines, how-to books, gazetteers, and medieval histories and pedigrees. Not all the books in all libraries have been digitized just yet. It is an on-going effort. If you don't find what you want in a search today, come back in a few months and try again. The book you seek may have been added by that time.

You can search easily by entering a name in the search box. That operates in more or less the same manner as Google or most any other search engine. However, I'd suggest you first click on "Advanced Search" and then enter a more focused search in the form that appears. Using the Advanced Search will usually result in "hits" that are closer to your exact area(s) of interest.

This has to be one of the greatest online sources available to genealogists today. I am surprised at how little publicity has been generated about this valuable resource. Try it at <http://books.familysearch>

A PERSONAL ACCOUNT OF THE SAN FRANCISCO EARTHQUAKE

Linda Galley has been "helping" her husband Art, with his family's genealogy. Among the family records in Art's possession is a letter from his maternal great grandfather, Thaddeus S. Casner to his wife Margaret, written in San Francisco on April 18, 1906, the day of the great San Francisco earthquake. Linda shared this letter with our group recently at a Show and Tell and was kind enough to transcribe it so it can be shared with everyone. Thank You Linda!

Linda states: "We have no idea what business Thaddeus was attending to in California. It may have had something to do with the motor he was always improving for electric razors. Thaddeus was born July 16, 1865, died February 7, 1950."

Dear Sweetheart,

I wish I could talk to you right now, but am awfully glad that you were not here this morning.

A very severe earthquake at 5:15 this morning shook this city to its very bottom and it is practically in ruins and the ruins are on fire adding to the disaster.

Hundreds of people are killed or hurt and thousands are walking the streets afraid to go back into their homes.

Last night the city went to sleep as usual and was rudely awakened this morning at 5:15 by the most terrific earthquake ever known in this state. I was about half awake and of a sudden I heard a terrible bumping and rumbling noise accompanied by an unearthly rocking and jolting sensation which continued for about 30 seconds. In this time I had become thoroughly awake and realized that it would be useless to run so simple sat on the edge of the bed awaiting the cessation of the shake.

I then looked out the window and found the city was in a perfect cloud of dust. I then dressed and went down to the office and asked if that was the method they usually employed to wake their guests. He asked if it was efficient and I told him it was most efficient.

As soon as I got out of my room the extent of the disaster began to become apparent and the scenes are beyond description.

Men and women half clad and with terror written in their faces were making frantic efforts to get out of the building and into some open place, some were crying, some shrieking or moaning, some praying and all was confusion and uproar.

The farther I walked through the city the greater were the effects to be seen. Business blocks which cost hundreds of thousands of dollars were so shattered or twisted that they were useless until rebuilt.

Many buildings collapsed entirely, and but a very few escaped without some damage.

Soon after the shock occurred fires broke out in various parts of the city and soon it was apparent that what was left by the earthquake would soon be destroyed entirely by fire, making the destruction most complete.

I heard a fireman say that there were over 24 fires and to make it worse the earthquake had broken the water supply so that the city was without water and the only way to fight the fires was by using dynamite and blowing up the building in the path of the fire. This has been going on all day, and the constant booming of heavy charges of dynamite and the crashing of tall buildings has raised over the city a pall of smoke that darkens the sun and people walk about in semi-darkness.

Many stories of narrow escapes are heard on all sides and many stories in which friends have been hurt or killed are common.

As the day wore on and the fires became more general the scenes became more confusing.

After the first shock had been over for some time people ventured into their offices or homes to secure some valuable papers or coveted piece of furniture or pet and took them into the street as they supposed a safe distance from the fire, only to find that they had to be moved farther and farther away and in many cases were abandoned entirely. Every kind of wheeled vehicle was pressed into service, sometimes horses could not be had and men would pull their wagon by hand. Trunks, hand bags, bedding, chairs, and clothing of all kind were heaped in piles along the curbing or in the streets and the affrightened (sic) people would sit on them to keep possession.

Ambulances drove at full speed back and forth taking the killed and hurt to places for treatment.

A large skating rink was turned into a hospital early in the morning, but this had to be abandoned about 1 o'clock on account of fire, and it finally burned completely. The U.S. Cavalry soon came upon the scene and also the U.S. regulars - all swarthy looking fellows - and the city was put under martial law.

The parks and open squares are now crowded with a motley mass of humanity and their belongings where no doubt they will camp for today and possibly tonight and tomorrow.

Business is absolutely out of the question as all business places are closed and everybody is interested in acts of mercy rather than trade.

I am leaving this evening by boat for Stockton about 65 miles up the bay where I will try to do business tomorrow and if no other word comes will then start for Salt Lake City.

Will write you again later. Now sweetheart don't worry about me for I am safe and not hurt in the least.

I did not get very badly scared, but became nervous while dressing. However I don't think we will die until our time comes and then no matter what we do it will be just the same,
