Lexington County South Carolina, Probate Court Records

Lexington County is located in central South Carolina. The town of Lexington is its county seat. The Lexington County Probate Court has made estate and marriage license databases available on its website. To access the databases click on the links at the end of the page.

Estate (1865 - 1994) and Marriage Indexes (1911 -The indexes in this section have been 1987): scanned from the original paper indexes and uploaded to the site as PDF files. Estate records indexes are organized alphabetically and separated by year. Data fields in the estate records include date, name of deceased, executor or administrator, box, parcel, will book and page number. Marriage license records are organized alphabetically by bride's surname or groom's surname, and separated by year. Data fields in the index include license number, name and residence of man, name and residence of woman, their ages, race, date of application / license, date of marriage, by whom married and where, and comments.

The probate court has added two databases indexing more recent records. One indexes estate records from 1995 through the present. Data fields for the estate records are case number, case type, decedent's name, date of birth, date of death, date opened, case status, and Personal Representative & Attorney Information. The other database is a marriage license index from 1986 through the present, which can be searched by bride or groom. Data fields for this index are license number, bride's name, groom's name, issue date, and marriage date.

Hancock County Historical Society, Mississippi

Hancock County is in southern Mississippi. It is bordered by the Gulf of Mexico to the south and by Louisiana to the west. The Hancock County Historical Society has made a number of resources available on its website. First, go to the Research/Reference tab and choose an option from the drop down list.

Hancock County Cemeteries: An online inventory of individuals buried in more than fifty county cemeteries. Click on the Hancock County Cemetery Index to browse the consolidated database by last name. There are more than 13,500 records in the index. The data fields in the index are last name, first name, birth, death, cemetery, and grave location. Click on the individual record to open the specific cemetery page. The data fields for the listings contain a comments field. Information found in this field includes military service, age and more. You may also click on the cemetery name and go directly to the alphabetical burial list.

Hancock County census records: This database is an index of the 1820, 1830 and 1840 censuses. (The 1820 census is the earliest one taken for Mississippi.) To browse the index, click on a letter to view all last names starting with that letter, or click on the census year to view the records in the order in which they were recorded. The data fields include last name, first name, year, page, and record number.

Catholic Church Records: This database includes digitized marriage and baptismal books from Our Lady of the Gulf Church in Bay Saint Louis, and the Church of the Annunciation in Kiln. There are nearly 53,000 records in this database, covering the years 1847 through 1911. The names of all parties involved have been extracted individually, so anyone who is mentioned in these records, be they a parent, a godparent, a witness, or else, is included in this index. Click the database link to browse the index by last name. Click on the record of an individual to view all of the information available for that person.

Hancock County Marriage Index: This index includes marriages recorded from 1849 to 1956. To browse the index, click on a letter to view all last

names starting with that letter. The names of the bride, the groom, and witnesses are included. Brides are listed under their maiden and married names. Beginning in 1938, the names of the parents of both the bride and groom were recorded by the Court and are included in the database. Click on the record to view detailed information.

Hancock County Divorce Index: This database indexes of all Hancock County divorces from 1916 to 1950. To browse the index, click on a letter to view all last names starting with that letter. The data fields in the database include last name, first name, plaintiff / defendant, case number and year.

Hancock County Obituary Index: This database includes the obituaries on file at the Hancock County Historical Society. To browse the index, click on a letter to view all last names starting with that letter. Click on a record to view a transcription of the individual's published obituary.

Early Hancock County Land Records: Early Hancock County land records were destroyed in a courthouse fire in 1853. Following the fire there was an effort to re-register the previously registered deeds and claims. There were three deed books - A, B and C. The website contains a transcription of the records recorded in Deed Book B. Copies of the original deeds are at the Historical Society.

Information You Are Searching For: <u>Need His Parents!</u>

Name of person(s): Ebenezer Swan, Sr., Born 1786 in Waltham, Mass.

Dates:

1780 - abt 1890

The location where you are stumped: Born 1786 in Waltham, Mass, Lived in the far North East of Maine. Died in Kent, Michigan

Nationality:

U.S.A.

Any information you have about the person that might help others help you chisel away at your brick wall.

Have tracked down descendants of about 18 different couples whose birth dates made them possibilities as parents -to no avail. My Maine relative has done the same! Have studied 'History of New Brunswick' for clues as he once owned a sawmill there as a young man. I did find records of the last 20 years of his life-age 80 to 104- as having followed his several oldest sons out to Michigan where he ultimately died -by following every one of his 17 children's histories until I found his whereabouts on an old land record map.

Sources you have used:

Internet, books, contacting relatives, Ancestry, computer and personal contact (Went to Maine!) with relatives living, wrote to Waltham, Mass. city records to no avail, have tried contacting a couple museums in Maine where his family lived.

Judy Williams

Judy has another one of those common problems, she's found a name and a birth date that covers about 10 years, but nothing else.

Information You Are Searching For: Anything I can find on him.

Name of person(s): James Henry O'Shields Dates:

Information seems to disappear from Birth to 1864

The location where you are stumped: South Carolina and wherever else he was.

Nationality:

U.S.A.

Any information you have about the person that might help others help you chisel away at your brick wall.

Probably born between 1838 & 1848 in South Carolina.

Sources you have used:

Internet, books, microfilm, relatives, Osheals/O'Shields Name Group, census.

Diane Florintine

Diane is lost in a metropolis with too many people with the same name.

Information You Are Searching For: What happened to them??

Name of person(s): John Mills and Samuel Mills

Dates:

Late 1800's

The location where you are stumped: Disappear 1882 in San Francisco, Calif.

Nationality:

English

Sources you have used:

Internet, books, contacting relatives, etc. Family lore, Ancestry and Family Search web sites for John and Samuel Mills living at the same address, San Francisco City Directories (cross-match of addresses for all John and Samuel Mills listed in the directories), 1880 U.S. Federal Census, 1861 and 1871 England Census, church records for marriage (no death records available), deaths listed in the San Francisco Morning Call (newspaper) from 1882-1884, Naturalization Index, Greater Voter Registration, Find-A-Grave, ship passenger and crew manifests, and military records..

IDEAS FOR BREAKING A BRICK WALL

Mary Ann Dobson, a.k.a. "The Genealogy Bug", shared these ideas with us on breaking through a brick wall in the early United States:

Check the <u>FamilySearch</u> microfilmed records (or online original document images)

You did try for a probate or estate or administration record, or guardianship of a minor child, didn't you?

Deeds for the family. Sometimes a grantee deed will say where the family was from. Sometimes a grantor deed will say where they went.

Tax records help determine how long the person was in that locality. Sometimes he/she will appear very briefly in a county court record to help pinpoint the location at a certain time.

Try for any war records during the male's lifetime.

Early county histories, through HeritageQuest or Google. Use both a name search, and also a locality search if you know the locality.

Look for the surname and every spelling you can think of, not necessarily the full name. Maybe you can find the person's family, even if not that particular person.
