<u>18th CENTURY TOMBSTONES DECIPHERED</u> WITH NEW 3D TECHNOLOGY

Here's an article that should be interesting to the future of genealogy about a new technique being used to read previously illegible headstones.

SACKVILLE, N.B. – A Mount Allison anthropology professor is using new technology to preserve the past. Grant Aylesworth has begun a project, in partnership with the archaeological services unit of the Government of New Brunswick, reading "illegible" tombstones from the 1700s using 3D software technology.

The research team carried out their work at Fort Gaspareaux National Historic Site near Baie Verte, N.G. Aylesworth has been able to read previously illegible inscriptions on 250-year-old tombstones using 3D software models derived from photos taken with a regular digital camera.

"This new technology is enabling us to digitally preserve the old tombstones, important for many researchers, most notably historians and genealogists. More importantly, this has allowed us to bring back the name of a person that was lost to history, before we get to the point that there really is nothing left to read," says Aylesworth.

Brent Suttie, project executive, archaeological resources with New Brunswick's department of tourism, heritage and culture says, "This is a relatively new technology, but in collaborating with Mount Allison on its implementation, we can already see that it presents enormous opportunities for archaeologists and the public alike to start documenting and reconstructing these monuments in a way that was not previously possible. The fact that the technology is freely available and once learned, is rather easy to implement holds great potential for archaeologists, researchers, and genealogists."

The research team is working to standardize and simplify the process so others can document the thousands of other degrading cemetery monuments in the province. These tombstones, often considered illegible, deteriorate further each year.

So far, the results have found the name of an English soldier who served at the fort, but, given the historical significance of the local area, Aylesworth is hoping to continue his research in the Fort Gaspareaux area and is planning to involve students in local field research this summer. "The 1700s was an important time in history for this area with the Acadian deportation and other significant events," he says. "We'd like to expand our research and make this process more accessible to local communities and researchers in New Brunswick and beyond."

Aylesworth teaches classes in North American and Central American archeology and anthropology at Mount Allison University. He has worked on many archaeological digs in Belize, Honduras, the USA, and the Maritimes, including the recent excavations in Pennfield NB, which proved that aboriginal people were living in the province more than 12,000 years ago.

<u>16 Top Web Sites For Researching Irish</u> <u>Ancestors</u> By Kimberly Powell, About.com Guide

Many records documenting the history of Ireland and her people were lost forever when fire swept through the Public Record Office of Ireland in the Four Courts, Dublin, in 1922. This disaster, following the destruction of the Record Tower in Dublin Castle in the early 18th century, and the destruction by government order of the 1861-1891 census returns, means that Irish researchers must face the loss of most 20th century Irish census records, along with civil, probate and parish records valuable for Irish family history research.

While there are a few notable records that survive that cover the majority of Ireland, including Griffith's Valuation and the 1901 and 1911 Ireland census, the majority of Irish records available to genealogists cover smaller areas, including fragments of early censuses, and especially parish records. Despite these limitations, however, many sites offer valuable data for researching Irish ancestry in the form of extractions, transcriptions and digitized images. To get you started tracing your Irish ancestors I've highlighted 16 of my favorite Web Sites for Researching Irish Ancestors.

The sites presented here offer a mix of free and subscription-based (pay) content, but all represent major sources for online Irish family tree research.

1. FamilySearch¹

Irish civil registration indexes 1845-1958, plus parish records of births (baptisms), marriages and deaths have been transcribed by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and can be searched for free on their Web site at FamilySearch.org. Browse to "Ireland" and then search each database directly for best results. Coverage is by no means complete, but it is a good place to start. Another search trick is to use Ireland IGI Batch Numbers² to search the International Genealogical Index³ - see <u>Using IGI</u> <u>Batch Numbers⁴</u> for a tutorial. Free

2. FindMyPast⁵

Subscription-based website FindMyPast.ie, a joint venture between Brightsolid and Eneclann, offers about 12 million Irish records, including some which are exclusive to the site such as Landed Estate Court Records with details on over 500,000 tenants residing on estates across Ireland, Irish Prison Registers featuring over 3.5 million names, and Petty Session Order Books. Additional Irish genealogy records include directories, military records, BMD indexes, and almanacs. *Subscription, pay-per-view*

3. <u>RootsIreland: Irish Family History</u> <u>Foundation⁶</u>

The Irish Family History Foundation (IFHF) is a nonprofit coordinating body for a network of government approved genealogical research centres in the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland. Together these research centres have computerized almost 18 million Irish ancestral records, primarily church records of baptisms, marriages, and burials, and made the indexes available online for free. To view a detailed record you can purchase credit online for instant access at a per-record cost. *Free index searches, pay to view detailed records*

4. Irish Origins⁷

This subscription-based genealogy site features an Irish Wills Index (1484-1858), the 1851 Dublin City Census, Irish Royal Garrison Artillery Records, and the best online version of Griffiths Valuation. other While Web sites such as MyIrishAncestry.com⁸ offer a free index to Griffiths, Irish Origins offers full details and links digitized images. to Free name search. **Subscription**

5. <u>National Archives of Ireland</u>⁹

The genealogy section of the National Archives of Ireland offers several free searchable databases, such as the Ireland-Australia Transportation Database, along with finding aids to many useful record series held in the National Archives. Of special interest is their digitization of Irish 1901 and 1911 census records which are complete an available online for free access. *Free*

6. Emerald Ancestors¹⁰

This extensive Ulster genealogy database contains baptism, marriage, death, burial, and census records for over 1 million Irish ancestors in Counties Antrim, Armagh, Down, Fermanagh, Londonderry and Tyrone. Most database results are indexes or partial transcriptions. *Subscription*

7. Ancestry.com - Irish Collection, 1824-1910¹¹

The Ireland subscription-based collection at Ancestry.com offers access to several important Irish collections, including Griffiths Valuation (1848-1864), Tithe Applotment Books (1823-1837), Ordnancy Survey Maps (1824-1846) and the Lawrence Collection of Irish Photographs (1870-1910). *Subscription*, plus Irish census, vital, military, and immigration records.

8. <u>AncestryIreland</u>¹²

Ulster The Historical Foundation offers subscription-based access to more than 2 million genealogical records from Ulster, including birth, and marriage records; death. gravestone inscriptions; censuses; and street directories. Matheson's Distribution of Surnames in Ireland in 1890^{13} is available as a **free** database. Most of the rest are available as pay-per-view. Select databases are only available to members of the Ulster Genealogical & Historical Guild. Subscription, pay-per-view

9. <u>Irish Newspaper Archives</u>¹⁴

A variety of newspapers from Ireland's past have been digitized, indexed and made available for searching online through this subscription-based site. Searching is free, with a cost for viewing/downloading the pages. The site currently features over 1.5 million pages of newspaper content, with another 2 million in the works from papers such as *The Freeman's Journal* (1763 to 1924), *Irish Independent* (1905 to 2003) and *The Anglo-Celt* (1908 to 2001). *Subscription*

10. Failte Romhat¹⁵

The personal Web site of John Hayes might not be the first place you'd expect to visit, but his site actually offers a surprising number of online Irish databases and transcribed documents, including Land Owners in Ireland 1876, Irish Flax Growers List 1796, Pigot & Co's Provincial Directory of Ireland 1824, cemetery transcriptions and photographs, and much more. Best of all, it is all free!
