The Library has knowledgeable assistants to help us with our research. Their collection includes books, microforms, atlases and maps, genealogy software, and online databases. Through The Portal with Alice

The Family History Center "Portal" provides free access to a Wonderland of genealogy subscription websites. Please note that the arrangements with these websites require that you have to actually be using a computer at a Family History Center; you cannot simply log on to FamilySearch.org at home for this. Ancestry.com is probably the most popular site on the Portal, but don't stop there.

As space and time permit, we will discuss one Portal website by shamelessly plagiarizing descriptive material from its home page.

This month's featured website is THE 19TH CENTURY BRITISH LIBRARY NEWSPAPERS DIGITAL ARCHIVE. This is a collection of 48 British newspapers from 1800 to 1900 held by the British Library.

The following description was lifted - uh, extracted - from the British Library website: "19th Century British Library Newspapers provides researchers with the most comprehensive collection of national and regional newspapers of Victorian Britain available. This full-text, fully searchable digital archive includes papers originating in England, Wales, Scotland and Ireland, carefully selected by an editorial board from the British Library and providing a broad yet detailed view of British life in the 19th century."

My mother's Langston line came from England. Although our immigrant ancestor crossed the ocean sometime before 1675, I thought it might be interesting to see if I could find articles on possible Langston cousins. I found eight articles referring to a Member of Parliament, J. H. Langston, Esq. I also found three articles on "Mr. Langston's Prize for Root-Crops" referring to a contest in 1854 spon-

sored by, I assume, the Member of Parliament. A Mr. George Gibson, in Letters to the Editor of Jackson's Oxford Journal, insisted that he had grown 130 tons more root-crops than the man who had been given the prize, a Mr. Mace. In the best tradition of English gentlemen, he concluded his protests with "I beg to remain, Sir, your most obedient servant, George Gibson." I also found articles asserting that M. P. Langston had paid people to vote for him.

After some consideration, I have decided that Mr. Langston probably was not a relative.

REGRETFUL INFORMATION

We are so saddened by the loss of our R&GD member, Kenneth (Ken) Lavin. He passed away on December 3, 2014 at the age of 82. He and his wife, Priscilla, attended nearly every monthly meeting. Ken was easy to pick out of the crowed with his happy smile and his questions to the speaker.

Ken graduated from Grant Union High School, but this is just the beginning of a complex gentleman. He served in the Korean War as an aerial battle-field photographer and received numerous awards for his photos. Ken graduated from college with a degree in journalism and was proficient in five languages. He was always concerned

with the question, "Who can translate that?"

Ken retired from the McClellan Air Force Base as Chief Public Relations Officer, also contributing to the Air Force newspaper and Space Maker, as staff journalist and cartoonist.

Traveling with his wife, researching genealogy, playing spider solitaire, photography, reading, and camping were his favorite activities. He was also an accomplished artist and musician.

If I had to describe Ken Lavin with just one word, I would say, "HUMBLE"!
