HISTORY OF SAR

In 1876, there were many celebrations to commemorate the centennial of the signing of the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776. As part of this patriotic fervor, a group of men in the San Francisco, California, area who were descendants of patriots involved in the American Revolution, formed an organization called the Sons of Revolutionary Sires. Their objective was to have a fraternal and civic society to salute those men and women who pledged their lives, fortunes, and sacred honor to the battle for independence from Great Britain. The Sons of Revolutionary Sires desired to keep alive their ancestors' story of patriotism and courage in the belief that it is a universal one of man's struggle against tyranny – a story which would inspire and sustain succeeding generations when they would have to defend and extend our freedoms.

Out of the Sires grew the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, which was organized on April 30, 1889, the 100th anniversary of the inauguration of George Washington as our nation's first President. We have used the acronym SAR to identify ourselves for over 100 years. The SAR was conceived as a fraternal and civic society composed of lineal

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descendants of the patriots who wintered at Valley Forge, signed the Declaration of Independence, fought in the battles of the American Revolution, served in the Continental Congress, or otherwise supported the cause of American Independence. The National Society was chartered by an Act of the United States Congress on June 9, 1906. The charter was signed by President Theodore Roosevelt, who was also a member of the Empire State Society, SAR. The charter authorizes the granting of charters to societies of the various states and territories and authorizes the state-level societies to charter chapters within their borders. Federal Legislation then established a federal charter for the National Society, SAR.

PATRIOTIC GOALS

- The SAR inspires the community with the principles on which our nation was founded.
- Many chapters and state-level societies have color guards that wear Revolutionary War uniforms and participate in civic and patriotic events and observances such as the Fourth of July, Veterans Day, Armed Forces Day, Flag Day, Patriots Day, Bill of Rights Day, Yorktown Day, Constitution Day, and important battles of the Revolutionary War.
- Each year the SAR National Congress passes resolutions to stimulate personal and national action based on these principles.
- The SAR maintains and extends the institutions of American freedom. In 1994, the SAR formed a Task Force to Preserve U.S. History to help focus public attention on profound problems in some proposed national standards for teaching pre-college U.S. history.

- The SAR carries out the promises expressed in the Preamble to the Constitution.
- The SAR provides recognition for public service. The state-level societies and chapters of the SAR present thousands of awards each year to law enforcement officers, public safety officers, and other citizens who exemplify the best civic traditions of our nation. This includes young men and women who are leaders in our communities: high-ranking high school students of history, Eagle Scouts, JROTC and ROTC cadets, and midshipmen.

The SAR honors, respects, and supports veterans, especially those confined to residential and hospital facilities provided by the Department of Veterans Affairs.

HISTORICAL GOALS

- The SAR commemorates and provides memorials for the people and events of the American Revolution.
- The SAR preserves records relating to the events leading up to and during the American Revolution.
- The SAR was a major force behind the construction of the National Archives in Washington, D.C., and the collection of historic documents therein.
- The SAR supports genealogical research and presentations (books, articles, and presentations) related to the history and people of the period from 1750 until 1800.
- The national SAR Magazine publishes authoritative descriptions of historical events in a quality magazine of archival value.
- The SAR Revolutionary War Graves Committee published information on some 54,000 grave

sites of patriots in the SAR Revolutionary War Graves Register, published in 1993. More names have been collected and the entire 140,000 names and locations have now been published.

• The Patriot Index Committee is publishing information on 732,000 patriots and their descendants.

EDUCATIONAL GOALS

- The SAR sponsors youth awards programs, including essay and oration contests for students, based on historical and patriotic themes.
- The SAR distributes history curriculum and educational media resources across the country.
- The SAR informs the community about the events and philosophical bases of the American Revolution and the Constitution. Important events and persons of the Revolutionary period are portrayed for students and the public at large.
- The SAR helps people locate and evaluate genealogical records. The SAR's state-level society and chapter registrars have excellent resources and the SAR Genealogical Research Library is a major national repository of genealogical information.

This database will continue to expand as new patriots and graves are found and new members are approved. This database is available for the purpose of general research and assisting with the SAR membership process. The sources contained within this database are not acceptable as proof of service for an SAR application. Applicants and researchers must still find the original reference to the service when submitting an SAR application.

Please be aware that the Patriot & Grave Registry is not a comprehensive list of all the individuals who served in the American Revolutionary War. This database is a work in progress. The SAR is attempting to eliminate duplicates, make additions to records when new data becomes available, and add new records for patriots as these individuals are vetted. Visitors and researchers may submit comments, corrections, and new information to the committee by email at patriotgraves@sar.org. When submitting changes, please include the patriot's reference number, citations, and references to support the request along with any relevant follow up contact information. Visitors will be directed to an external database site in order to access the SAR Patriot and Grave Index.

SAR HEADQUARTERS

Located along Main Street's Museum Row in downtown Louisville, the Sons of the American Revolution is the leading male lineage society that perpetuates the ideals of the war for independence. As a historical, educational, and patriotic, non-profit corporation, it seeks to maintain and expand the meaning of patriotism, respect for our national symbols, the value of American citizenship, and the unifying force of *"e pluribus Unum"* that was created from the people of many nations.

The historical buildings themselves, housing the SAR's administrative offices, Library, and Center Gallery, showcase a cast iron façade in the Modified Renaissance Revival style prevalent in American architecture in the late nineteenth century. The Soho district in New York City is the only place in the United States with more cast iron façades than Louisville's Main Street. The warehouse (located from 803 to 807 West Main Street) was occupied in the early years by a variety of tobacco brokers, including the Kentucky Tobacco Company. In the early twentieth century, its use had switched to grocery and coffee storage.

While Kentucky was not a cotton-growing state, the Brandeis & Sanders Building (located at 809 West Main Street) was a testament to the importance of the Ohio River for transportation, and Louisville as a distribution point, for the southern cotton commodity trade. On 27 March 1890, a class-4 tornado came through Louisville and heavily damaged the 800 block of Main Street. The Kentucky Tobacco Warehouse was "completely wrecked with the exception of a part of the front and back walls," according to the 29 March Louisville Commercial, and the top two floors were never reconstructed, leaving the current building shorter than its neighbors. During the years surrounding the start of the Great Depression, it was vacant. In 1936, A. J. Whitley purchased the building, and relocated Fulton Conway & Company, an automobile accessories business, from a location a few doors west on Main Street. In March 1974, the 800 block of Louisville's West Main Street was listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

On 23 February 2008, under the leadership of President General Bruce A. Wilcox, the SAR general officers, vice presidents general, and trustees voted to take the first step to relocate the SAR national Headquarters to West Main Street in Louisville. In October 2010, the Genealogical Research Library began operations in its new facility on West Main Street, with the full transition of the Headquarters to its current location occurring over the summer months of 2014.

SAR GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH LIBRARY

The SAR Genealogical Research Library collection contains over 55,000 items including family histories; local, county, and state records; and online genealogical databases. The Mary & James S. Craik Special Collections Room also houses the miniature of Dr. James Craik by Charles Willson Peale, the George Washington book collection, and several artifacts of importance surrounding General Washington's life and early U.S. history.

The Library is open to the public on weekdays from 9:30AM until 4:30PM and on the third Saturday of each month from 9:00AM until 4:00PM.

The FHC gives us access to the online records and microfilm collections of the Family History Library in Salt Lake City. Much of the FHC's own collection of books, periodicals, maps and microfilms has been donated by R&GD or its individual members. The online "Portal", which can only be used at an FHC, provides free use of several major paid genealogy websites (Ancestry, Fold3, etc.)

The Family History Center is normally open Tues - Thurs., 11:00 a.m. - 8:00 p.m. If you go in the evening or when the weather is bad, it's a good idea to call first (530-621-1378).
