Alice Morrow gave an update on activities in the FHC Library including a description of the new document and photo scanner. It was then noted that it was Alice's birthday and all were invited to join in after the meeting to celebrate her birthday and share her birthday cake. A thankyou was extended to Carol Pirtle for bringing the drinks. Mary-Lee Gilliand gave a brief summary of some of the genealogy related events taking place in the area later this month. February Presentation:

The topic for the February meeting was "Being a Family History Detective" and was led by **Bill Taylor**. Bill started by highlighting what it meant to be a good "History Detective" by following the examples set by famous fictional detectives like

Sherlock Holmes. He then gave us some guidelines about how to prepare for searching through records, databases and publications in search of information about our ancestors. He also cautioned us about keeping good records in a Research Log as it was very easy to repeat searches for information that we had already completed. The handout included a very informative "Research Selection Table" with columns titled: 1. If You Need, 2. Look First In, 3. Then search.

Learn how to take photos using the FamilySearch Memories app on your Android or iPhone and add them to Memories on Family Tree. ** Learn to scan your photo albums, pictures and documents with our new **photo scanner**, save them to a flash drive, and post them on Family Tree. Bring your pictures and a flash drive. Flash drives are also available for sale at the FHC. **

• Maiden Voyage: Finding Females with Kathryn Marshall.

Thursday 23 March 10 to 11 am.

Learn the most productive sources and strategies for identifying female ancestors. Searching for a female ancestor generally involves using familiar records, but focusing on whole family groups and records about collateral lines. Use timelines to analyze clues suggesting that an ancestor might not have been a first husband or wife. Discover verification logic which can help to assign the right children to the right combination of biological parents when spouses have remarried.

The LDS El Dorado Family History Center

("FHC") is open to all researchers and volunteers. Several R&GD non-church members (me included) are part of the volunteer staff. The library gives us access to the online records and microfilm collections of the Family History Library in Salt Lake City. Many of the FHC's own collection of books, maps and microfilms have been donated by R&GD or its individual members. The online "Portal", which can only be used at an FHC, provides free use of several major paid genealogy websites (Ancestry, Fold3, etc.)

FHC Library Volunteers

The Family History Center can always use more staff to work a regular shift or to substitute as

needed. The pay isn't very good, but the rewards are great. You learn while helping others and, if patrons don't need help, you may work on your own research. Pick your day and time.
