- A book, "Getting the Most Out of Roots Magic," was purchased with funds from the R&GD book can and donated to the El Dorado Family History Library. The library also has a "Legacy 8.0 Family Tree" user manual available for use by patrons.
- The Catalog Committee is busy with the project, documenting the books available at the EDFHC in the Family Search website. The committee has completed a milestone by completing the cataloging of the US state book section in the EDFHC. The country, war and research sections still need to be completed. If you look at the books in the EDFHC book room and see a pink sticker on the book binding, it indicates that the book is digitized and can be viewed online through the Family Search website on your computer at home. The committee is also assigning Dewey decimal numbers to each book

and in the end, the books will eventually be rearranged in order by Dewey number.

Program:

Mary-Lee Gilliland introduced our speaker, Kori Pilkington. Kori is the Director of the El Dorado Family History Center in Placerville. Since taking the position in July 2016, she has turned the library upside down by obtaining new computers, furniture and comfortable chairs. She has also brought free classes to the center. Kori has been teaching classes for the last 7 years, having a passion for educating and helping people with their family history and blending in with world history and cultures. Before her retirement, she worked for 40 years as a registered nurse in Utah and California.

"Family Search Research Wiki"

Family Search Wiki is a tool used for finding information about subjects, records, research methods and training guides. Wiki does not have information about any specific ancestor but you may find links to databases that do have records. There is an overwhelming amount of helpful information to be found on this website.

- Family Search Research Wiki is accessed through https://familysearch.org/ website and it's totally free. From the home page click on "search" and select "Wiki"
- Wiki is a Hawaiian word meaning fast/quick
- Family Search Wiki is about finding records about ancestors and places and where the records may be found. It's not like Ancestry.com where you can search by individual names.
- Wiki has records from the United States and 244 countries. Type a word or two into the search box and you will find links to record collections all over the world. Information down to the county and city level can be found.

- Maps are clickable and anything in blue is clickable. Country, state and county images will link to articles that may have links. Some of the links will take you out of the Wiki to the World Wide Web.
- There are lessons and webinars that will help you learn how to use the wiki and learn about genealogy research.
- Articles are written by various individuals on many topics and can include links. As with any article, the information cannot be trusted 100% of the time. You must do your due diligence to ensure accuracy for your family history.

New Online Records available through FamilySearch Portal —

Various subscription genealogy websites are accessible for free at the Family History Center Library.

One of these websites, *Ancestry.Com*, is constantly expanding its collections. Here are just a few additions and updates listed in a recent announcement: Beaver Co., PA Obituary Records; U.S. Indian Wills 1910-21; Calif. Voter Registrations 1900-68; Montana Births and Deaths 1830-2011 and Prison Records 1861-1968; Compiled Records from Various [Genealogy] Societies 1875-2010; Idaho Obituaries 1868-2013; South Carolina Death Records; and many more.

CEMETERY TOUR – The Lost Graves of New Helvetia

What: The Old City Cemetery Committee pre-

sents a history tour diving into the New

Helvetia cemetery from long ago.

Where: Sacramento Historic City Cemetery,

1000 Broadway, Sacramento

New Helvetia, a beautiful Sacramento cemetery, possibly related to where Sutter did burials in the 1840s, was turned into a park (and later the site for Sutter Middle School). The "known" remains were unceremoniously removed to the Old City Cemetery, whereas almost 5,000 others were re-interred at East Lawn as "unknowns." We'll share their stories, from the famous to the "infamous" and speculate on what happened to their grave markers.

however, donations are appreciated and benefit cemetery preservation.
