RICHES is a Regional Initiative for Collecting the History, Experiences and Stories of Central Florida

It is an umbrella program housing interdisciplinary public, history projects that bring different departments at UCF with profit and non-profit sectors of the community to explore Central Florida's diverse past.

Central Florida has often been associated with large-scale, commercial tourism and housing development. While those aspects of Central Florida are important to the economic growth of the region, much of its history has remained unnoticed and under researched. The Public History program at UCF links many projects under one initiative to promote the collection and preservation of Central Florida history. By facilitating research that records and presents the stories of communities, businesses, and institutions in Central Florida, RICHES seeks to provide the region with a deeper sense of its heritage. At the same time, the initiative connects the UCF students and faculty with the community and creates a foundation on which Central Floridians can build a better sense of their history.

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A Tribute to Pioneer Black Families of Apopka

Henry & Hannah Williams arrived in 1915 from Nashville, Ga. worked at the Saw Mill (Consumer Lumber and Veneer Co.)

David Wesly Stokes and Carrie arrived in 1911 from Smoke, South Carolina (Waterburg County) worked at the Saw Mill (Consumer Lumber and Veneer Co.)

Samuel Small, Sr. & Nora arrived in 1895 born in South Carolina moved from St. Cloud, Florida to Apopka, worked in Turpentine and for the Eledrige Livery Stable, lived in Meade's Bottom, located in the current location of Highland Manor Restaurant

Cato and Ella J. Sanders arrived in Apopka in 1898 from North Carolina worked at as a Hackman (carriage or coach for hire) the Eldridge LIvery Stables and School Teacher

George and Hattie Rand arrived in Apopka 1902 from North Carolina, worked in Citrus and for Starbird Utilities, helped put up street lights.

Monroe and Frances Neil arrived in Apopka 1916 from Archer, Florida worked on the farm.

John and Lucy Hickey arrived in Apopka 1920 from Ocoee, Florida, refugees from infamous Ocoee Election Day Riot, worked as Laborer.

Michael and Bessie Gladden arrived in Apopka 1910, born in Charleston, S. C. moved from Jacksonville, Florida worked as a Wood Cutter at Consumer Lumber and Veneer Co., later branching out and opening the once prominent Gladden General Store.

Will and Lula Davis moved from Apopka Sumpton County South Carolina in the 1800's did carpentry work.

Contributions made by these families were documented by the late Mildred Board, Educator, Historian and native Apopkan and Marie Gladden, wife of Michael Gladden Jr. and Educator and Historian and Community leader from Sanford, Florida. These two great women were long time and devoted members to Apopka Historical Society gathered information from descendents and family bibles. This project was not completed, because there were more than 100 black pioneer families in Apopka from 1800s and early 1900s.

We the members of Apopka Historical Society honor the contributions made by these great people.
