GSOC is going to ZOOM into meetings!


Monthly Meeting

Discovering the Watt Family - By Jodie Biles

Hello everyone, hope you're as busy as I am. I have more than enough time on my hands. Occasionally, I do random searches on Ancestry for ancestors that are hard to find information for. Recently, I was looking at my Huff ancestors. My grandmother was born Luna Huff. Her father was James Henry Huff and her mother was Victoria WASHINGTON Huff. James Henry was born before 1870 so he is listed on the 1870 census as Henry, along with his mother Martha and his grandmother Amy WATT Stephens.

I have always been curious about Martha's and James Henry's father, Tom Huff. Thomas Huff lived next door to a man named Moses WATT. This led me to believe he may have been related to Martha's mother or at least come from the same plantation/farm on which Amy had been enslaved. I discovered an intricate tree that included Moses WATT. The owner of this Ancestry tree posted this detailed story about Moses and his enslaver to include names:

This research is the story of my great grandfather Moses. The 1870 census record records him as being born in North Carolina in abt 1820. He became the property of Hugh Boyd Watt of Rockingham County, N.C. by birth, purchase, gift, or Will.

Hugh Boyd Watt (Oct 30, 1789-Apr. 28, 1845), the son of Cpt. John Watt married Elizabeth Phillips (June 12, 1792-Sept. 24, 1822) on Dec. 20, 1810 in Rockingham County, N.C. From this marriage, there were 7 children. He moved his family to Jones County, Ga. Elizabeth Watt died from Bilious fever. He later married Lucy P. Finney (Sept. 4, 1804-Dec. 16, 1881) of Jones County, Ga. on Jan. 23, 1823. From this union, there were 5 children. Hugh willed a total of 31 slaves and all their increase or that may be hereafter, including the slave Moses. Moses was willed to his and Lucy's daughter, Frances Ann Kimbrough (Nov. 1, 1823-Oct 9, 1883). The Will was dated July 5, 1844 (Muscogee County) and he appointed his loving wife, Lucy P. Watt Executrix. Frances Ann was buried in Pierce Chapel United Methodist Church Cemetery in Midland, Ga. Hugh Watt was buried in Copper Clad Farm Cemetery in Midland, GA.

As many slaves did after being emancipated, Moses took the slave master's name, Watt. This research suggests Moses had no wife or children while enslaved. In 1867, he and formal slaves, Tom Watt, Ephraim Peters, Charles Ramsey and Daniel Kimbrough became employees of Thomas Jefferson Watt, the son of Hugh and Lucy P. Watt.


Lucy P. Finney married Colonel Bartley Martin Cox (July, 1802-Dec 22, 1872) on May 6, 1847. He died in Camilla, Ga. Lucy P. Finney married William A. Amos (Jan. 3, 1801-Oct. 21, 1887) on Aug. 14, 1861 in Muscogee County, Ga. Lucy Amos was buried in Copper Clad Farm Cemetery in Muscogee County.

I have Ancestry/23andMe matches with all the surnames above listed in their trees. I also knew from Martha's death certificate that Amy Watt was born in North Carolina. I wish I had looked into Moses Watt more extensively before. After digesting this information I went back to the 1870 census and found a Ramsey and Kimbrough living nearby. I found an 1869 Poll Tax document with Thomas Huff, Daniel Kimbrough, Ephraim Ramsey and Charles Ramsey. I believe Ephraim Peters and Tom Watt changed their names to Ephraim Ramsey and Thomas Huff. I do know that Thomas, who had been in Virginia, was reunited with his father, Thomas Sr. This could be the reason for his name change. I do not know Ephraim's reasoning, but it was not uncommon for ex-slaves to change their names. I can't wait to read the will of Hugh Boyd Watt to see how much more info I can find.

When I started doing genealogy my mother neglected to tell me things. When I found her mother in the 1920 census she was living with her parents but had a different last name. Questioning my mother she said oh yes she was married before and he died in WWI. Since we are living in the time of a pandemic I thought it would be interesting to bring up his death. He actually died in England of the flu!


