Today, on the National Geographic Society's Genographic Project page, we find this announcement:



Genographic Project Update

The Genographic Project was launched in 2005 as a research project in collaboration with scientists and universities around the world with a goal of revealing patterns of human migration. Since then, nearly 1 million people have participated in The Genographic Project through National Geographic's "Geno" DNA Ancestry kits. The public participation phase of this research project is ending and, as a result, effective May 31, 2019, Geno 2.0 DNA Ancestry kits are no longer available for purchase. If you have already purchased a kit, you may still send it in for processing in accordance with the Terms and Conditions of sale.

National Geographic currently plans to maintain this site, through which customers may access their results, until the end of 2020. Please see our FAQ page for more information.

This is a sad day indeed.

Effective May 31, 2019, you can no longer purchase Genographic kits.

If you currently have an unsubmitted kit, you may still be able to submit it for processing. See this link for more information about your specific kit.

The Genographic website will be taken down December. 31, 2020. Your results will be available for viewing until then, but not after that date.

Data will be maintained internally by the Genographic project for scientific analysis but will not be otherwise available.

Please Transfer Your DNA Results


The original Genographic project had two primary goals. The first being to obtain your own results, and the second being to participate in research.

If you are one of the 997,222 people in 140 countries around the world who tested, you may be able to transfer your results.

Depending on which version of the Genographic test you've taken, you can still preserve at least some of the benefit, for yourself and to scientific research.

- If you tested <u>before</u> November 2016, <u>Family Tree DNA</u> processed your kit for the Genographic Project, and you can transfer your results to <u>Family Tree DNA</u> for free by clicking here.
- If you tested internationally <u>after November 2016</u>, your kit was processed by <u>Family Tree DNA</u> and you <u>can</u> transfer your results for free to <u>Family Tree DNA</u> by <u>clicking here</u>.
- Note that only Y and mitochondrial DNA results can be transferred, because that's all that was tested. How
 much information can be transferred is a function of which level test you initially took, meaning the version 1 or
 version 2 test.

- If you tested <u>within</u> the US in November 2016 or after, you tested on the Helix platform and your results **cannot** be transferred to <u>Family Tree DNA</u>.
- If you have already tested your Y (males only) and mitochondrial DNA at <u>Family Tree DNA</u>, there is no need to transfer Genographic data. <u>Family Tree DNA</u> information will be more complete.



Salvage as Much as Possible

As a National Geographic Society Genographic Project Affiliate Researcher and long-time supporter, I'm utterly heartsick to see this day.

Please transfer what you can to salvage as much as possible. We already lost the <u>Sorenson data base</u>, <u>Ancestry's Y and mitochondrial DNA data base</u> along with <u>YSearch and MitoSearch</u>. How much Y and mitochondrial DNA information, critical to genealogists and the history of humanity, has been lost forever?

Let's not lose the Genographic Project information too. Please salvage as much as possible by transferring - and spread the word.

KILROY WAS HERE!

"Kilroy was here" messages were scrawled on surfaces throughout the world during and following World War II. They even appeared in Calhoun county (MS), where I grew up, during and after the war. The photo here shows it inscribed on the WWII Memorial in Washington.

The strongest claim to who Kilroy was came from a contest by the American Transit Association to find the REAL Kilroy, offering a prize of a real trolley car to the person who could prove himself to be the genuine article.

Almost 40 men stepped forward, but only James Kilroy from Halifax, Massachusetts had evidence of his identity. He was a welding inspector at a shipyard, and his job was to check the work done by others on the inner bottoms and inside the tanks of ships being manufactured there. He became frustrated with bosses who would not believe he had checked all the work areas. In a fit of pique one day, as he emerged from the hatch of a tank he'd just inspected, he scrawled in yellow crayon on its top, where the boss could easily see it, "Kilroy was here." To help prove his authenticity, James Kilroy brought along officials from the shipyard and some of the riveters. He won the trolley car.




So the phrase that would quickly travel the globe and be found in unexpected places was born. As for the graphic that came to be associated with the phrase, it's not clear how the two came to work together. The little drawing of a man peeking over a wall, with just his eyes and nose (and sometimes his fingers) showing, began as a British cartoon.

Kilroy's "trademark" was seen by thousands who boarded the troopships the yard produced. They spread it all over and began placing the graffiti wherever they landed, claiming it was already there when they arrived. Kilroy became the Super-GI who always had "already

been" wherever GIs went. It became a challenge to place the logo in the most unlikely places imaginable.

As the war went on, the legend grew. Underwater demolition teams routinely sneaked ashore on Japanese-held islands in the Pacific to map the terrain for the coming invasions by U.S. troops (and thus, presumably, were the first GI's there). On one occasion, however, they reported seeing enemy troops painting over the Kilroy logo! In 1945, an outhouse was built for the exclusive use of Roosevelt, Stalin, and Churchill at the Potsdam conference. The first person inside was Stalin, who emerged and asked his aide (in Russian), "Who is Kilroy?"

- 1. Always Cite Your Sources. Always.
- 2. Never, Ever Assume Another Researcher's Information is 100% Correct
- 3. Remember That Every Name Has Variations, Check Them All
- 4. Never Copy Another Person's Public Tree, Use it Only as a Helpful Aid
- 5. Share Freely With Others and They Will Share With You
- 6. Don't Trust Your Assumptions, Only Sources
- 7. Check and Double Check Your Facts Before Recording or Sharing
- 8. Take a Second Look at Records, Your Answer May Be Right in Front of You
- 9. Don't Limit Yourself to Only One or Two Research Sites, Look for Options
- 10. Go Offline or Order Hard Copies to Expand Your Research
- 11. Back Up Your Files Monthly, Keep at Least Two Copies of Your Research
- 12. Never Give Up you may not find what you're looking for but the journey is always worth the effort
