



JOURNEY OF MAN tells the remarkable story of the human journey out of Africa and into the rest of the world, tracing history through evidence uncovered in the Y-chromosome of man's DNA. Traversing six continents, the film takes viewers on a fascinating journey into the hidden world of their ancestry and offers a modern look at our ancestor's lives.

This informative film is based on the work of Spencer Wells, who is both an innovative scientist and enthusiastic host. He and crew scoured the world for indigenous people with deep roots in one place, asking for samples of DNA to test, in order to piece together our "big family" genetic tree.

The best parts are when he returns with DNA results and we see the diverse ways in which people and tribes react to the news of what science says about their arrival in that place and their relations.

Robert L. F. Sikes Public Library: Preserving the Past to Protect the Future

Ray Bradbury, prolific author of the harrowing bookburning dystopia *Fahrenheit 451*, once said, "Without libraries, what do we have? We have no past and future." As a professional librarian, I often get the question: are libraries still relevant? My answer, emphatic as it may be, always sounds tired and worn to my ears. Yes, of course libraries are still relevant! I then launch into my spiel: we're not book mausoleums, we're life-long learning centers! We provide countless social, informational, technological, and educational services for our communities.

And yet, even as I drone on about the multiple benefits, I oftentimes find myself wanting to stop, look the inquisitor in the eye, and declare the proverbial bottom line. Regardless of what ornamentation I lay upon it, what I truly mean is this: libraries are servants of the human soul. To know ourselves on the deepest level, we must both studiously know who we are, the terrain we are trekking, and the destination. Life is ever marching on, and only the preservation and understanding of our narrative can truly aid us in preventing the eldritch horror of a Bradburian future.

As such, the Robert L. F. Sikes Public Library is dedicated to meeting the needs of the Crestview community by providing a rich collection and variety of services. We not only carry the latest in fiction, but also a hearty array of audiobooks, online services, DVD's,


and a poignant selection of non-fiction. Particularly of interest to this ongoing mission is a reference section on Local History and Heritage. Though it is modest in size, we house a wealth of intriguing resources about Okaloosa and its surrounding counties, including history, cemetery, and marriage records. We also carry an assortment of local yearbooks, with Crimson Crests going back as far as 1947. Most relevant to the genealogist, we have various sources for personal research, such as The Source: A Guide to American Genealogy, the Dictionary of American Family Names, and Crestview: The Forkland. There are newspaper clippings, photocopies of records, and various city directories for both Crestview and Fort Walton Beach. For those digging deep into the news, we have copies of the Crestview News Bulletin, formerly known as the Okaloosa News Journal, dating back to 1953. Though some of these resources are not available for checkout, we can provide photocopying capabilities and computer access.

Massachusetts Trivia

In the early 19th century—the 1830s—most New Englanders were not practicing Christmas," says assistant curator Shelley Cathcart. "The majority of the population had Puritan roots, so most people were not decorating the interiors of their homes, especially with a Christmas tree." Puritans mostly ignored the holiday because the Bible was silent on the topic.

Massachusetts declared Christmas a legal holiday in 1856 The first English Christmas cards were produced in England in the 1840s.

The first American made Christmas Card was distributed in the early 1850s. RH Pease who owned a variety store in Albany New York produced the card showing Santa, reindeer, dancers and an array of Christmas gifts and foods.

In 1875 a German Immigrant named Louis Prang expanded his trade card business by adding a Christmas Greeting to his color trade cards. This launched the practice of exchanging these small, affordable works of art.

By 1882, mailing Christmas cards had largely upset the traditional personal letter writing or making personal visits.

Exchanging gifts had been a modest feature of Christmas up until the 1870-80s. They now became a symbol of the new world of commerce and consumerism. They also served to mediate the fragile relationships of an increasingly fragmented society. As charitable gifts, they sought to become symbolic solutions to the problem of economic and social inequality.
