# A GEM IN OUR OWN BACKYARD

Earl Joiner, curator of the Florida Baptist Historical Society at Stetson University, was the guest speaker at our April meeting. Dr. Joiner's presentation was coupled with some excellent incite on the Baptist Church records and a wry humor explaining his introduction to genealogy. What he found precipitated "the process that will hound me until the day I die."

The following is a list of material accessible to the researcher at the Historical Society at Stetson:

- 1. Massachusetts Missionary Society Journal 1803 to 1992; then as <u>The American Baptist</u>, it ceased publication.
- 2. The Christian Index Microfilm 1822-1850. One of the oldest Baptist papers in the Southeast. Until 1883, it was the main medium of Baptist news in Florida.
- Baptist Biographies, England and America and Florida. Volumes on England and America. File folders on Florida Baptists.
- 4. Associational Minutes, which contain information on church leaders in every geographical area in Florida.
- Published volumes of obituaries from back issues of the <u>Christian Index</u>, 3 volumes, 1822-1899.
- 6. Home Mission magazines, American and Southern Baptist.
- 7. Census Records from 1790 to present; available to the public.
- 8. Civil War Records which include many lists.
- 9. American Baptist Register Philadelphia American Baptist Publication Society,1853. List of Baptist Ministers in the U.S. and Canada and other countries.

- Baptist Ministerial Directory. Brief information on each minister, 2 volumes, 1899.
- 11. Baptist Annual Register , 1833-1836.
  Ministers, clerks of various churches in the United States.
- 12. James B. Taylor, <u>Virginia</u> <u>Baptist</u> <u>Ministers</u> Biographies.
- 13. History of the Baptist Denomination in Georgia with <u>Biographical</u> <u>Compendium</u> 1881.
- 14. Marriages recorded in the <u>Christian Index</u>, 1822-1855, microfilm.

We appreciate Dr. Joiner's presentation, and realize the asset it will be to those searching their Baptist roots. (Stetson University, Box 8247, DeLand, FL 32720.)

## STATE CENSUS RECORDS

"State census records are a valuable tool in genealogical research. Generally they were taken every "odd five years", and provide a great deal of important information not found elsewhere."

"State censuses may fill in gaps left by missing federal censuses. State censuses may not be closed to the public for a 72 year period as are federal censuses; in fact, some cenuses taken as recently as 1945 are available to the public. Many state censuses ask different questions than federal censuses, so you may find information about your ancestors that would never be found in the federal census records, and finally state censuses can help fill out the picture of your ancestors and help solve genealogical problems."

State censuses have been taken at one time or another by most states since the formation of our country. Some were taken randomly, their purposes varying according to the needs of the state, which could involve anything from the need to determine the extent of the population for reasons of defense, taxation, or land distribution, to the desire of a territory to show that it had sufficient population to warrant state-hood."

The above information was taken (via Past-time Publication) from a new book by Ann S. Lainhart entitled State Census Records, and is available from AGLL. The book gives the most exhaustive listing of state census records ever compiled.

## FEDERAL LAND RECORDS

The Suitland Reference Branch has custody of land entry files and abstract books for Federal public domain states and the record copies of patents and central office tract books for western states.

The mailing address for information and requests for land entry records is: Suitland Reference Branch (NNRR), Textual Reference Division, Nat'l Archives & Records Division, Washington, DC 20409.

Federal land records document only the first transfer of title to land from the United States to another party. Records of later transactions may be found in county records.

There are Federal land records for all states except the 13 original states, Vermont, KY, Tennessee, Maine, West Virginia, TX and Hawaii. These states were never part of the Federal public domain.

Legal description of land can usually be obtained from the county recorder of deeds. For the public domain states east of the Mississippi River (as well as Arkansas, Missouri, Iowa and Minnesota), the researcher must provide the name of the State and the name of the land office, type of file and land entry file number. This information can normally be obtained from the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) by providing the BLM with a legal description of the land, section, township, range). The BLM address is: Eastern States Office, Bureau of Land Management, 350 Pickett Street, Alexandria, VA 22304. The charge for material received is 25¢ per page. (National Archives & Records Administration)
