

A NON CONFUSING EXPLANATION OF "REMOVED" (OBTAINED FROM February/March 1998 Odom Family Tree Newspaper and Family Trails Newsletter of the Genealogical Society of Southeast Volusia County)

The term "removed" is often cause for confusion in determining relationships, simply put, it means that two people are from different generations. You and your cousins are in the same generation(two generations younger than your grandparents) so the word "removed' is not used to describe your relationship.

The words "once removed" mean that there is a difference of one generation. For example, your mother's first cousin is your cousin once removed. This is because your mother's cousin is one generation younger than your grandparents are and you are two generations younger than your grandparents. The one generation difference equals "once removed"

"Twice removed" means that there is a two generation difference. You are two generations younger than the cousin of your grandmother, so you and your Grandmother's cousin are first cousins, twice removed. (Thanks to FMT Newsletter)
