The Very First Steps in Genealogy

1. Start with yourself and work back! Talk to parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, etc. Ask questions like: What's your full name? When and where were you born? Where did you grow up? When and where did your parents marry? It also may be helpful to tape record the people you talk to in addition to writing down their answers and keep the tapes for future reference. Be sure to ask permission before taping someone.

- 2. Begin a genealogy chart. Fill in as many blanks as possible. If you do not have exact dates, pencil in approximate dates. Use pencils for preliminary work. Always use letters to indicate months. Write surnames in all capital letters. Use the maiden names of your female ancestors.
- 3. Read a book about doing genealogy. "How-to" books will tell you about many sources of information for your research. Your local library will have copies of some of these books that you may want to borrow.
- 4. Begin collecting copies of death and birth certificates, and marriage licenses. This step will involve money because all States charge for their copies. You will need to know the approximate date and the proper State and County. These records may give you information about the person and often their parents. You can also find some of this information in newspaper obituaries.

Online Veteran's Burial Sites

You can search Online for Veterans' Burial Sites. The Department of Veterans Affairs has put the burial records of 3.2 million veterans online. They are buried in 120 national cemeteries and some state cemeteries. The records go back to the Civil War. However, nearly half of the Union dead from the Civil War are unidentified. If you are tracing an ancestor, the government has a search engine. You must know the last name. If you have more information, there is an advanced search available. Cocoa Beach Library - Brevard County

John and I attended a Daytona Beach Computer Genealogy meeting where the guest speaker was Michael Boonstra, the County Genealogist at the Cocoa Beach Library. He was a wealth of information about genealogy and told us that the Cocoa Beach Library has the whole second floor of the library devoted to genealogy and he is a full time county genealogist. There collection includes: "How to" genealogy books, directories listing genealogical and historical societies, family histories, military history materials, a collection of maps and atlases, materials on Native American ancestry (Cherokee focus), African-American collection, Filby Passenger Lists, Germans to America, Italians to America, Irish Famine Immigrants, Dutch Immigrants to America, Mayflower fivegenerations project, British Isles Collection, Domesday Books, numerous state and foreign collections, etc.

They also have two free databases where you DO NOT have to be a resident of Brevard County to use them. They are: AncestryPlus Database and the Heritage Quest Database.

The Central Brevard Library and Reference Center is located at 308 Forest Ave., Cocoa, Florida 32922. The Library hours are: Monday – Thursday 9 am to 9 pm, Friday 9 am to 6 pm, Saturday 9 am to 5 pm, Sunday 1 pm to 5 pm.

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USGen Web Project

If you have not taker: a look at this web site: www.usgenweb.org, please take another look. Some of the collections on this site include:

- -Digital Map Library that is useful, readable, and has high quality maps.
- -Pension Project that includes actual transcriptions of pension related materials for all wars prior to 1900. They are filed under the state and the principal county of residence of the pensioner.
- -Church Records Project includes church records and histories.
- -Marriage Records Project includes marriage records by county.
- -Obituary Project which includes published obits and papers that have given permission or those pre-1923 that are in the public domain.
- -Special Collections which include a photograph collection, and some military records.

There are other collections but you have to go down and peruse them. Enjoy!

The National Archives and Records Administration recently announced the availability of World War II enlistment records for over nine million Army personnel at their website: www.archives.gov/aad. These records contain a wealth of personal information on service members. This collection is for Army enlistees and there are no records for officers or members of other services or for enlistments prior to about 1938. 130,000 women who joined the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps are included.

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Mortuary Records

Mortuary records are a genealogical tool that is often passed over. Mortuary records include date of death, place of death, marital status, spouse's name, birth dates, birthplace, sex and race. Many times they also include age, profession, the names of the deceased's parents and their birthplace, the length of time the deceased was ill, his place of burial, the names of sisters including their married names if known and names of the deceased's sons and daughters along with their married names.

If a death certificate is available, it often includes the name of the mortician or mortuary. Obituaries may also give the names of the mortuary.

Research libraries such as the Family History Center are good places to begin because they are repositories for records from many different areas. Other ways to research mortuary records if no research library is available are internet sites such as www.funeralnet.com and www.funeralassistant.com.

One can try local universities to see if mortuary records have been contributed for historical or research purposes.
