THE OLD BRICK CHURCH, HISTORIC ST. LUKE'S

Historic St. Tuke's Shrine c. 1632

St. Luke's Church, earlier known as the old brick church, was one of two early churches in Virginia. The other was Tower Church in Jamestown. Both of these churches were constructed in the early 17th Century. Construction on the Old Brick Church began in 1632. St. Luke's is the nation's oldest standing church and a national shrine. Thomas E. Talmadge said of it, "in many respects the most precious building in America."

Dwight Eisenhour, in a letter to St. Luke's, October 12, 1956 said, "This monument to the founders of our country is in truth a national shrine. Visitors, ..., inescapably, will be reminded of the deep religious convictions of the first settlers, their faith in God and their faith in themselves as children of God. St. Luke's, more than a time-hallowed relic of the past, will be an enduring witness to the spirit that animated them for within its walls our forefathers gained new courage, firm perseverance, abiding strength to make of the wilderness a home for themselves and all who followed them."

St. Luke's is the oldest church of English foundation in this country and is the only surviving ORIGINAL gothic building. Michael Fulgham, son of Captain Anthony, donated an acre of land to the church September 6, 1683, possibly land now a part of the church grounds. Although small in comparison to the great Gothic cathederals of England, St. Luke's has full Gothic characteristics with its Gothic buttresses, stepped gables, brick-traceried windows and medieval timber trussed roof structure. The walls are laid in the Flemish-bonded brick pattern. It is a single nave plan about 60 by 24 feet. The church was restored in the 1950's and its furnishings are almost all from the 17th century.

To enter this beautiful church and to realize that Captain Anthony and his family also frequented this building brings on an indescribable feeling of awe, of "returning home", and belonging. Every member of our family will want to visit here and experience these powerful and unique human emotions. I have visited here on three occasions and look forward to my next visit.

Cousin Thomas R. Fulghum of Midlothian, Virginia has made arrangements for the reunion visit to the Old Brick Church which will include a Sunday worship service to be conducted by some of our cousins who are ministers.

NOTES OF INTEREST

Owen Fulghum, son of Bill and Hazel Fulghum, Jacksonville, Florida is a student at Asbury Theological Seminary at Wilmore, Kentucky. On graduation, Owen will join other illustrous Fulghum ministers of the Gospel. We are proud of Owen and others of our great family with altruistic goals.

James E. Fulghum, M.D., Jacksonville, Florida, had an article, "MEET MY GRANDPA, JESSE FULGHUM" in the December 1987 issue of "The Confederate Sharpshooter". Jesse served in the Confederate Army for three years, was wounded at Gettysburg and taken prisoner at Petersburg. He was released and later farmed in Franklin County, N C. He married Mary Sledge. Jesse gave his cane to Dr. Jim who still has and treasures it.

"ALL I EVER REALLY NEEDED TO KNOW I LEARNED IN KINDERGARTEN"

(This article by our illustrious cousin, Robert Lee Fulghum of Seattle, Washington, appeared in the September 17, 1986 issue of the Kansas City TIMES. Cousin Robert is a pastor emeritis of the Unitarian Church. His article has appeared in the READERS DIGEST and is the basis of a book by the same name which has been chosen as the main selection for the Book of the Month Club for November. The publication date was October 13, 1988. Cousin Robert is now working on a second manuscript.)

"Most of what I really need to know about how to live, and what to do, and how to be, I learned in Kindergarten. Wisdom was not at the top of the graduate school mountain, but there in the sandbox, at nursery school.

These are the things I learned: Share everything, Play fair, Don't hit people, Put things back where you found them, Clean up your own mess, Don't take things that are not yours, Say you are sorry when you hurt somebody, Wash your hands before you eat, Flush, Warm cookies and cold milk are good for you, Live a balanced life, Learn some and think some and draw and paint and sing and dance and play and work every day some.

Take a nap every afternoon. When you go out in the world, watch for traffic, hold hands and stick together. Be aware of wonder. Remember the little seed in the plastic cup. The roots go down and the plant goes up and nobody really knows how or why, but we are all like that.

Goldfish and hamsters and white mice and even the little seed in the plastic cup - they all die. So do we.

And then remember the book about Dick and Jane and the first word you learned, the biggest word of all: LOOK (SEE). Everything you need to know is in there somewhere. The Golden Rule and Love and basic sanitation. Ecology and politics and sane living.

Think of what a better world it would be if we all - the whole world - had cookies and milk about 3 o'clock every afternoon and then lay down with our blankets for a nap. Or if we had a basic policy in our nation and other nations to always put things back where we found them and cleaned up our own messes. And it is still true, no matter how old you are, when you go out into the world, it is best to hold hands and stick together."

Editor's note: What a wonderful philosophy! It certainly makes us all very happy to be related to a person of such warm humanity! Be on the lookout for Cousin Robert's book. JACOB ALONZA FULGHUM, DEVELOPER OF FULGHUM OATS
Story suggested by Patricia Daniel Bailey, Washington, Georgia

Jacob A. Fulghum (1849-1928) was a pioneer farmer-breeder of Warrenton, Georgia who selected and developed FULGHUM, a distinctly American variety of rust resistant oats. Mr. Fulghum noticed one Sunday morning while walking through his field of Red Rustproof oats, a plant that was taller and maturing earlier than those plants surrounding it. He harvested this plant individually and grew the seeds to develop the strain. This gave rise to all of the FULGHUM Oats grown in the United States. In 1935, FULGHUM Oats and all its strains, were the most important varietal type of oats grown in the U.S. due to its earlier maturity, more vigorous plant development, fewer awns, and high quality of grain. Alabama FULGHUM No. 321, Kanota, Franklin, Frazier and the Coker and Marette Fulghum oats constituted the group of improved strains of FULGHUM oats grown commercially in the mid 1930's.

COLONIAL WILIAMSBURG

After the reunion in the Smithfield (Isle of Wight County) Virginia area, May 27 and 28th, 1988, it is recommended that you give sreious consideration of a visit to Colonial Williamsburg, Virginia which is nearby.

Williamsburg is a city carved out of the wilderness three centuries ago to serve as the capitol of the new world colony. This city was to become the political proving ground for such advocates of freedom as Thomas Jefferson, George Washington and the other patriots of the time. Restored, Colonial Williamsburg lives today as it did in those days. The city has working trades doing their work as it was done 300 years ago. There you can see a barrel maker building shipping barrels that must come within close tolerances regarding their volume. You can see the shoemaker demonstrating his skills (and for a fee, he will make a pair of hand-made shoes for you). You will see how the rifled gun barrel was made by hand and by what we would consider crude, though effective, tools. A music instrument maker has various musical instruments in different stages of manufacture. And many more craftsmen are seen in their shops producing the daily necessities for the people of the town.

and request a Vacation Planner. In this vacation planner you will find a list of package deals that include lodging, tickets to the Colonial Williamsburg historic buildings, etc. (everything needed for an exciting adventure that will show you how our ancestors lived in that area 300 years ago!) We recommend the Leisire Plan (either 3 or 2). We have stayed at and recommend the Motor House which is a very nice, quite comfortable motel-like accomodation with convenient parking at reasonable rates in the center of the historic area activities. The package plans will save you much money and are highly recomended.

Make your reservations as early as you can as the accomodations fill up very quickly. An advanced reservation form is included in the Colonial James E. Fulghum, M.D. Williamsburg Vacation Planner.

"WAVERLY"

A NEW LEAD IN THE SEARCH FOR THE PARENTAGE OF CAPTAIN ANTHONY FULGHAM

Dr. Mary E. Hutchings of Oxford University in England has very kindly provided information that may be of use in searching for Captain Anthony's ancestry. We have always assumed Captain Anthony to have been an educated person. If he was educated at the university level, he would have attended Cambridge or Oxford. Mary reports that there are records in existance of alumni of these Universities (the only ones at the time) going back into the Seventeenth Century. (e.g. ALUMNAE OXONIENSIS, 1500-1714. Published by Joseph Foster, 1891. Published either in Oxford or London. There also may be a later version of Emden, A.B. A Biographical Register of the University of Oxford to AD 1500. Oxford University Press 1957.)

Mary recently visited the laboratory of your Editor, Robert S. Fulghum, to discuss our mutual interests in otitis media and how she might use the Gerbil model of the disease in showing how auditory sensory deprivation may affect the development of the auditory sections of the brain stem. Such changes could result in retardation of the education of humans. Mary has planned some very elegant studies in this area of neurophysiology that will undoubtedly have a great impact on how we treat children with ear infections!

Robert S. Fulghum, your newsletter editor, is also editor of the NORTH CAROLINA NEWSLETTER, North carolina Branch of the American Society for Microbiology. Bob, a professor at East Carolina University School of Medicine in Greenville for the past 16 years, is interested in ear infections and in the role played by the bacteria found associated with the human body.
