Marlin V. Ogden, FFFNA Vice President for 2001-2002 and the California Fulgh*ms, are planning the 2002 reunion for FFFNA. It will be held at Sacramento's Raddison Resort Hotel on Father's Day weekend, June 14-15, 2002. Although they considered downtown hotels, the Raddison Resort furnished a much better contract, including a room price of only \$89. per night (\$30 less than downtown). This Hotel, built on a 16 acre lake, has paddleboats on the lake, conference center, two restaurants, swimming pool, bike rentals for the American River Bike trails, and other amenities. Parking is free. There is a regular shuttle to Arden Fair Mall (Sacramento's most upscale shopping). The Raddison Resort hotel will be an excellent setting for a family style reunion. The Panel Discussion & Decisions Made at the Reunion

The Panel Discussion held Saturday Morning at the 2001 Reunion centered around preserving our heritage and, at the same time, making it available to all. Panelists were Charles H. Fulghum, Robert S. Fulghum, James E Fulghum, and Peter C. Fulghum who also served as Moderator.

Peter Fulghum discussed the prospect of FFFNA joining forces with the St. Luke's Church Shrine at Smithfield, Virginia. See page 7 for details in a related article.

Robert Fulghum discussed the importance of collecting and preserving family data. Robert made the point that genealogical information WITHOUT documentation is MYTHOLOGY -- in other words if we cannot prove a lineage, it is just a nice but not necessarily true story. Robert briefly discussed the types of EVIDENCE and CITATIONS that are needed for documentation that helps establish PROOF. Thus, documentation and citation are everything in genealogy.

Charles H. Fulghum pointed out the feeling of closeness and awe that comes from viewing artifacts that our ancestors once owned and used. He pointed out that we need to collect and preserve these precious artifacts in a museum setting where they will be carefully preserved but available, with descriptions of their history, for study by family members and other historians. Charles supports the concept of a Museum at St. Luke's.

Robert Fulghum covered the services Library of Virginia (LVA) as the Archives for Virginia materials. LVA is very interested in accessioning and preserving information on the Fulgh*m Family. Robert pointed out that we need the safety of a State Library for our materials, citing several instances where genealogical books, documentation and materials "have become unavailable" or lost when in small and/or private collections. He emphasized we need the preservation techniques available only in a large library to maintain our fragile materials that need to be preserved. We need for all to have access to all collected materials and pointed out that a large library can provide interlibrary loans, xerographic copies, and Internet access to our materials. Finally, Robert described how the Museum at St. Luke's could interface with the Fulgh*m collection in the LVA to make study of Fulgh*m artifacts and written documentation available to all

James E. Fulghum of Wilson, NC reported on the progress to date of the FFFNA Museum project. He also discussed costs of developing the Museum facilities as a joint project with St. Luke's Church Shrine. The FFFNA will need \$150,000 for our share of the project (See article pg. 7).

Among other decisions made at the 2001 reunion were: to hold the 2002 reunion in Sacramento, California; to rewrite the Constitution and ByLaws; to proceed with negotiations with St. Luke's Church regarding the Museum; to consider designating the Library of Virginia as the FFFNA Archives; to purchase a laptop computer for the Historian/Archivist office.



Having trouble deciphering Seventeenth and Eighteenth Century handwritten documents?

The Table below shows how some of the letters were written in old, handwritten documents. In the Table, the first three columns of handwritten characters are capital letters and the next three are lower case letters. As you can see, there are a number of variations. The individual writer's idiosyncrasies (as well as my own while drawing each of these letters) often result in slightly different shapes to the letters. Thus, the letters are difficult to recognize. Perhaps having this Table will help you to "transcribe" the old hand written documents into modern documents.

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MUSEUM PROGRESS UPDATE-JULY 2001

At the Fulgham-Fulghum Family National Association (FFFNA) reunion in Jackson, Mississippi in 2000 the Marketing Committee was charged with the responsibility of finding a permanent place for a much needed Fulgh*m museum. Since St. Luke's National Shrine in Smithfield, Virginia bore traces of our earliest settlers, we petitioned the Board of Historic St. Luke's to meet with us to discuss the possibility of adding to the St. Luke's visitor's center there to incorporate our needs.

At the combined meeting of the Marketing Committee, the Curator of Old St. Luke's and a Board Member of St. Luke's Foundation in February 2001, we learned that St. Luke's wanted to broaden its interest. They plan to develop a museum featuring the growth and evolution of religion in the seventeenth century in several counties surrounding Isle of Wight. Family history would be an important facet of the growth and evolution of religion.

A new visitor center replacing the existing building would be in order to house the history and artifacts of several families. A large research room with several computer stations would allow people to do research in family history. Rare books, photographs, critical documents, original manuscripts, etc. will be stored in the Library of Virginia at Richmond with copies available in the museum or via interlibrary loan services.

We estimate the space in the museum for the Fulgh*m collection and a small, on-site office for the FFFNA Executive Secretary may cost \$125,000 to \$150,000 as our share of the total museum. Plans, drawings, costs and timetable will be important considerations for the next joint meeting of the Marketing Committee and the Board of St. Luke's Foundation. Plans are already being made to hold this meeting before St. Luke's Board's annual meeting in October 2001.

We will keep the family informed of the progress so it can prepare to meet the obligations and challenge of this important enterprise.
