YOUNG OLYMPIAN

Patrick Fulghum Qualifies for the National Junior Olympics in Cross Country.



Patrick Fulghum, age 11, knew he was a good runner but wanted to try it as a serious sport this season. He joined the Potomac Valley Track Club, www.pvtc.org near his home in the Northern Virginia suburbs of Washington, DC. He runs 3 kilometers (1.86 miles) in an 11-12 year age group.

This season, Patrick won every local meet in which he raced, setting the club's 3 K record for his age group. Due to snow, the local qualifying run for the Junior Olympics in the DC area was cancelled: however, all runners were advanced to the regional competition (included Georgia, North and South Carolina, and southern Virginia DC. In the Maryland). regional competition Patrick came in 5th with a time of 10:45, a personal best!

Easily qualifying for the National Junior Olympics on December 13, 2003, he headed out to Albuquerque, NM with his Dad and Brother to compete with the elite runners in the Nation. The altitude at 5050 feet turned out to be his most challenging opponent. About 10th place 3/4 of the way through the race, he "hit the wall," struggling to finish but still coming in a very respectable 36th out of 265 young men.

His team was able to finish second earning him a medal and an award. Patrick, we of the Fulgh*m clan are all very proud of you!

Another Distinguished Fulgh*m Author

Richard Lee Fulgham and his mentor, Norman Mailer, got together to discuss creative fiction and nonfiction novels at Norman Mailer's home. Norman Mailer, controversial literary lion asked his 32 year penpal and student to have dinner with him and his family at their Cape Cod home the summer before.

Richard, who published his first book at age 50, finally got to meet his mentor and discuss their respective books in person. Both are especially interested in historical narrative — nonfiction written with the novelist's insight and skill to keep the reader absorbed in the tale.

Richard Fulgham was born in Dachau, Germany but was raised in the deep South. He received his BA from the University of Georgia and his MA in the United Kingdom. He served in the U.S. Navy.

Some of Richard Fulgham's works include *Appalachian Genesis* (Overmountain, 2001), *The Crippled Lion* (Adams 1986), *Tales By Moonlight* with foreword by Stephen King (Garcia and TOR 1985, and many magazine articles.

Fulgham has won two Virginia Associated Press writing awards and many VA state environmental writing awards

JAMESTOWNE 2007 And the Selection of the FFFNA as a Virginia 2007 Community

The Commonwealth of Virginia will celebrate the 400th anniversary of the settlement of the **Jamestowne Colony** in 2007 with a statewide calendar of activities. Cities, towns, counties, and other groups will add their own celebrations to a highlight commemoration in Jamestown, itself, in May 2007. Other statewide activities will take place throughout the year. www.Jamestown2007.org

The Fulgham-Fulghum Family National Association was the first family group to be selected as one of the "Virginia Communities" for the celebration. Our family was invited to participate because of its heritage in Virginia, having settled there about 1640 and because of its plans for a FFFNA reunion in Virginia in 2007.

Plans for the Virginia 2007 Community Program to celebrate the landing and settlement at Jamestown in 1607 began to come together at a Thursday, January 22nd meeting in Richmond, VA., of representatives from the Virginia Communities from all over Virginia. Included were representatives from FFFNA. Carolyn A. Fulghum of Greenville, NC and Ted Crossland of Yorktown, VA are serving as Co-Chairmen on the Jamestown celebration committee for the FFFNA.

Preliminary plans call for the Fulgham-Fulgham Family National Association to conduct its annual Reunion on the south side of the James River across from Jamestown in Isle of Wight County, VA, in 2007. St. Luke's Church National Shrine near Smithfield, VA., has invited the Fulgh*ms to attend and be the featured family at the 50th Pilgrimage to celebrate the restoration of the 17th century church. Michaell Fulgham sold the acre of land "whereon the church house now standeth" to the church vestry in 1683. For this reason the Curator of St. Luke's, Richard Austin, selected our family to be the featured family and to present the history of the family at the Pilgrimage service on May 20, 2007 at 4 PM... Robert Lee Fulghum, noted American author, has been asked, and has agreed, to serve as spokesman for the family at the Pilgrimage.

The Early History of the Fulgham-Fulghum Family National Association

James E. (Jim) Fulghum, Wilson, North Carolina)

(The Newsletter Editor has requested that I recount the origin of the Fulgham/Fulghum Family National Association.)

In 1983, I became interested in genealogy and began to attempt to trace my roots. One of my cousins, the late J. Carl Fulghum, was helpful to me. He provided me with a copy of a little handwritten booklet that was prepared by the late James Hooks Fulghum of Roanoke, Virginia, who had visited my home area, Wilson County, North Carolina, and with the help of the late Raiford Fulghum of Kenly, North Carolina, had compiled a listing of the Fulghums of Wilson County.

Meanwhile, like many others across the country, I had received a mailing from an Ohio firm that claimed to be expert genealogists and could provide me with a complete history of my family along with a national mailing list of Fulghums. I responded to the mailing with the form they sent and a check. A few weeks later I received a mailing providing me with a sketchy, mostly puff, attempt at impressing me with some semblance of a family history and with a mailing list of about 200 Fulghums from across the country that purported to be a full and complete listing. That list, however thin, would prove to be very valuable later.

Meanwhile, some visits to the Wilson County Library, to which I was to serve as a Trustee later, exposed me to Boddie's extensive works of the COLONIAL FAMILIES OF VIRGINIA, and acquainted me with Captain Anthony Foljambe-Fulgham who had arrived and settled in Isle of Wight County, Boddie's work attributed Captain Anthony to the Virginia, about 1641. distinguished Foljambe Family of Derbyshire in England and listed his father as Major General Hercules Foljambe who accompanied the Duke of Cumberland in his invasion of Puerto Rico in 1597. At this time I prepared a letter to the Vicar of the Church at Bakewell in Derbyshire requesting a copy of the pamphlet giving the history of that church. I sent along a small contribution. Shortly afterward, I received a copy of the booklet, along with a nice letter from the Vicar, and the booklet informed me that an Alabaster bust of Sir Godfrey Foljambe and his wife, Avena Ireland, was prominently displayed in the chancel of the church, the chancel being a gift of the couple to the church.

Several other trips to the county Library acquainted me with the works of Burke and in Burke's LANDED GENTRY, I was able to piece together a loose line of the Foljambe Family from the time it accompanied William The Conqueror in his conquest of England in 1066, to Captain Anthony, the purported son of Hercules Foljambe, the first arrival of our family from England in 1641. It was then in early 1984 that I received another mailing offering me a full glimpse of the Fulghum Family from a physician in Florida, the late James E. Fulghum, MD. Since he had the same name as me and since he was a physician, I decided he might have something better than the firm in Ohio. I wrote for his book sending along the required check. A few days later I was surprised to receive a telephone call from this same James E. Fulghum (Later to be known affectionately as "Dr. Jim") of Jacksonville, Florida, and, after some introductory comments, he wondered if he could travel, with his wife, up to visit with me. I inferred I would be glad to have them and in a few days he arrived with his wife and with his book in hand.

Dr. Jim, right away, told me that while he had done lots of work on the family in England, he was still somewhat in the dark about the family in America and had some blank spots in his own lineage.

As we visited, we started talking about our mutual desire to know more about the family in the United States. I suggested that a reunion might help bring folks together from all over. His question was, "How do we get them to attend?" That's when I pulled out the mailing list of Fulghums that I had received from the firm in Ohio. Note it was only Fulghums. There were no Fulghams on the list. We decided to try.

It was decided to have that first reunion in Rock Ridge, the heaviest enclave of Fulghums in North Carolina. At the time we thought North Carolina had the most members of the family. Now we know that several other states, like Mississippi, Georgia, Florida, and Tennessee, with both "-am" and "-um" Fulgh*ms, have more. The best date, we decided, was Memorial Day weekend, 1985.

I put a local committee together and we started planning. On the committee were the late Libba Fulghum King, Carolyn A. Fulghum, later a family association President, Bobby Boykin, with family connections, Larry Fulghum, and Bill Fulghum.

I operated a public relations firm at the time, so I put together an announcement flyer. My office staff addressed the envelopes and got out the flyer in a mailing.

We were amazed at the returns. They were coming from everywhere. There were so many out-of-staters that I decided to have a party for those from out of state in my back yard on Saturday evening, prior to the reunion on Sunday. The party was great and I got to know a lot of Fulghums.

The next day we gathered at Rock Ridge behind the school and had a dinner on the grounds. Raiford Fulghum, his son Larry, and Raiford's other sons, barbecued a pig, area Fulghums brought food baskets, and we purchased some additional food. In addition, the late George Fulghum of Memphis, brought a load of Tennessee barbecue. We had a rousing good time. We had pulled in a tractor-trailer flatbed to be used as a stage, and Dr. Jim and I performed as co-presiders and tried to excite the crowd which was not difficult. We had about 300 attendees from 25 states.

It was decided to have a second reunion in two years, and Tommy Fulghum, then of Wadley, Georgia, and now of Augusta, invited us to Wadley for the next reunion. The second reunion became a big success at Coleman Lake outside Wadley in 1987. It was there that we decided to have reunions every year and the late Sam Fulghum invited us to Tennessee for 1988. it was decided to form the Fulgham/Fulghum Family National Nashville, Reunion and I had the honor of being elected the first President. Fulghum of Midlothian, Virginia was elected Vice President, Peggy Fulghum Wood of Jacksonville, Florida, was elected Secretary & Treasurer, and Dr. Jim of Jacksonville, was elected Historian. It was decided to have the fourth reunion in 1989 in Isle of Wight County, Virginia, where Captain Anthony Fulgham first settled the family back in 1641. Highlight of that reunion was the appearance of Robert Lee Fulghum of Seattle, Washington, the noted best selling author who started his string of best sellers with All I Needed to Know I Learned in Kindergarten.

Since then we have been all over the country with our annual reunions and the Fulgham-Fulghum Family National Association is getting stronger and stronger. We hope to see a big crowd of the family this year in Savannah, Georgia in July.

Charles Mallary Fulghum was the ninth child of James Fulghum and Jane (Harrison) Fulghum. He was born 5 August 1860 in Washington County, Georgia. Orphaned at age 3, Charles was reared by the Nathaniel Hooks family. He was married on 30 November 1887 at Sanderson, Georgia to Matilda (Slade) Fulghum (born 21 March 1864 in Linton, Georgia, died 9 February 1955 in Macon, Georgia). Charles and Tillie had eight children: May, died soon after birth; Sarah Frances (Fulghum) Uehara (born 20 May 1890, died 1973); Matilda, died as infant; Lillian Winefred (born 10 August 1894, died 1962); Charles Mallary, died as infant; Nathaniel, died as infant; James Hooks (born 18 September 1905; died 1982); and Charles Bennett (born 23 November 1906, died 1976).

Charles worked as a building contractor, wholesale and retail grocer, and merchant-broker in Macon, Georgia. He was a Baptist Deacon in the Vineville Baptist Church of Macon. He also was an incessant student of the Bible. Self-educated and extremely well-read, he was on the Executive Council of Mercer University in Macon.

His children were brought up in a very religious home that provided a rather strict Baptist environment. Consequently, they excelled in their work. A brief sketch of each of them follows:

Sarah Frances Fulghum graduated from Bessie Tift College in 1911, became a voice teacher, later graduated from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, Kentucky, became a Baptist missionary to Japan, married a Japanese physician (Dr. Nobuaki Uehara, b 3 March 1905, d 2 July 1987), and had two daughters, Lillian Natsue Uehara (b 1930) and Anne Kazue Uehara (b 1932). Sarah Frances lived in Japan from 1918 until her death in 1973. Her daughters immigrated to the United States after World War II.

Lillian Winefred Fulghum attended Bessie Tift College, Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, and Mercer University. She was a kindergarten teacher in Macon. Never married, she died in Milledgeville State Hospital.

James Hooks Fulghum graduated from Mercer University and attended law school. He married Frances W. Schmidt and they had four children (See the article on James Hooks Fulghum in the next issue of FFFF).

Charles Bennett Fulghum, Sr., MD married Elizabeth Moore (1902-1976). They had two sons, Charles Bennett Fulghum, Jr. (1931-1995) and David Dowell Fulghum, MD (1937Mercer University and the Medical College of Georgia in Augusta. He practiced medicine in Milledgeville, Georgia at Baldwin Memorial Hospital until his death in 1976.

Charles Mallary Fulghum died 3 September 1921. He is buried in Riverside Cemetery, Macon, Georgia.

Editorial Note: The spelling of Charles M. Fulghum's middle name has been found both as Mallary and Mallory. From his own recording of his name in the Family Bible he and Tillie owned, Charles preferred the spelling Mallary. The spelling Mallory was used in newspaper articles after his death.
