

CHAPTER SIX

OLIVER HAVARD STANLEY FAMILY

Oliver Harvard Stanley: Oliver was born Dec., 1833 in Warren Co., Tenn. He married in Iowa or Mo. Nancy Ann Hatfield June 22, 1851 born 1833 in Tenn. They had eleven children. He was killed by others Nov. 5, 1885 near Pilot Rock, Umatilla Co., Ore. He was a miner and a blacksmith and ranched near Pilot Rock, Oregon for several years. He lived in Iowa, at Hawkinsville and Yreka in California and in Umatilla Co., Oregon. From a book on Umatilla Co., Oregon:

Mr. O. H. Stanley came to Pilot Rock as a blacksmith in the 1880s. He became well known for his skills as a blacksmith. The horse owners found that they could rely upon him. But in 1885 a series of horse and cattle thieveries was taking place, and he was accused of being one of the thieves. His story is told in the chapter about the cattle industry

The violence of the Old West struck in 1885 at one of Pilot Rock's residents, O. H. Stanley, a blacksmith, experienced vigilante justice--or injustice, depending on how you look at it. A series of horse and cattle thefts had caused some Stewart Creek owners to become angry, and they decided to put a stop to it. A confrontation took place and came to a head in Pendleton. Several of the suspects, including Stanley, were jailed on various charges but were soon released on bail. Five of the accused believed to be the ringleaders were then collared by a mob, and a lynching was threatened. The mayor became so concerned that he called out the militia; the order was canceled when the five, including Stanley, agreed to go back to jail. The mob gave the mayor assurances that they would not raid the jail to get the men out.

The authorities believed that the best way to handle the situation was to extract a promise from the accused that they would leave the state on the morning train. The ranchers said they would be on hand to escort the accused to the train. By dawn the five were turned loose. Four of them rode out on their horses and fled, but the fifth was taken to the train.

O. H. Stanley, fifty-two years of age, did not leave the state on his horse but instead rode to Pilot Rock. The vigilantes soon learned of this since he was seen as he neared the town. Some 20 to 30 vigilantes started riding to get him. Stanley was informed of this, so he asked the local constable and another man to go with him while he rode back toward Pendleton. With darkness falling as he left Pilot Rock, he emotionally kissed his grown motherless children goodbye. About halfway between Pilot Rock and Pendleton some 50 men on horseback met the three riders and called on them to halt. Instead, Stanley spurred his horse and bolted away. Shots rang out in the dark and Stanley fell dead.

At the Coroner's jury hearing, no one would say they could identify anyone; this was a common practice. So it was written, "Came to his death by wounds received from a posse of men unknown to the jury". Western vigilante justice had been done. No one will ever know whether Stanley was guilty or not.

1. **Charlotte T. Stanley**, called Lottie, was born March 8, 1852 in Iowa, probably in Decatur Co. where her father's family lived in 1850. She crossed the plains as an infant with parents in 1853, crossing over the Greenhorn Mts., settling at Yreka. At age of 18 years with family removed to Pendleton, Umatilla Co., Ore. She married there on Feb. 5, 1870 to Thomas B. Alford who was born 1837 in Benton Co., Mo. They had several children. They divorced in Klamath County Ore. and she married again Nov. 26, 1888 at Klamath Falls to Dr. Stacy M. Hemenway, 1836 - 1914, son of Dr. Ansel Asa Hemenway and Abigail Whitmore, settlers in Eugene, Lane Co., Ore. Stacy was born at Pleasant, Ind. He served in the civil War as Physician and later with US Colored Troops as Full Regimental Surgeon. Later, he served as a Physician at Fort Steilacoon Insane Asylum, Wash. Still later he was with the Army and Indian Physician at Yainix Sub Agency in Klamath Co., Ore. Stacy and Lottie had children and divorced in 1894. He married three more times. She married again 1900 in Lakeview, Ore. to Frank Burch. About 1907 she married again to Henry Edwin Stinchacum and lived in Doris-Picard, Cedarville and thence to Redding, Shasta Co. Calif. about 1905. Her last husband, a bar tender and a sawmill worker, died June 15, 1913 at Redding. Lottie died at Redding June 1, 1935 and is buried in Redding Cemetery close to her daughter, Anna. Lottie was employed earlier at the Temple Hotel as laundress.

2. **Alfred Marion Stanley** was born in Dec. of 1855 or '56 in Yreka, Calif. He married Jan. 1, 1880 in Umatilla Co. Ore. to Sarah Alexander. In 1880 they are living at Pilot Rock, Ore. He is said to have married again after divorcing Sarah. He is also said to have worked for his father, later moving away and disappeared. He may be the Alfred M. Stanley who married Nov. 20, 1890 at Payne Creek Tehama Co., Calif. to Lurena M. Elliott. In a letter of 1975, his nephew, Stanley Marion Perry, wrote that Alfred had a son. An Alfred M. Stanley died at Eureka, Calif. Oct. 1922 leaving a wife whose Initial was "N" and a son Clyde Stanley and four step daughters. Perhaps this is the same man. The 1910 census shows wife, Nettie & 3 daughters, Ethyl, Grace and Hazel.

3. **Sarah Ellen Stanley** was born 1858 in Yreka or Hawkinsville. She married Apr. 20, 1875 to Marion Smith and had a daughter Rosa and a son Bird Smith. She later married, in 1886 at Lakeview, Ore., to Jerry, a teacher, and had a son. She is said to have died at age about 50, which would be 1908. Her death Certificate, filed in Oregon, said she died 1919. Later information states that Sarah was b. Feb. 21, 1859 in Curahe/Curake? Calif., died Nov. 10, 1919.

4. **Marzella B. Stanley** "Zellie" was born 1860 in Hawkinsville, Calif. She married in 1883 in Umatilla Co., Ore. to Charles Finch and was said to have had four sons. They lived in Pendleton, Ore. She is said to have died 1920, age about 60. Her father died in her home Nov. 5, 1885.

5. **Martha A. Stanley** "Mattie" was born Jan. 6, 1863 near Hawkinsville. She married in 1882 in Umatilla Co., Ore. to William Huffman. Again to _____ Royce. And in Lakeview, Ore. to William Burch on March 19, 1898. She had from five to seven children. She died April 16, 1903 in Lakeview and is buried in the IOOF Cemetery.

6. **Louisa Jane Stanley** "Janie" was born 1864 near Hawkinsville. She married about Apr. 6, 1884 in Umatilla Co. to B. H. Huffrian. Again to Frank Peters of the Bottling Works of Pendleton, Ore. They managed the Arlington Hotel there for years. After his passing, she moved to an

apartment in Portland, Ore. She is said to have had no children. She was yet living in 1935. About 1926 she made a visit to her sister, Lottie Stincham, at Redding. My mother could recall that visit in later years . The 1900 census has her birth Nov., 1866.

7. **Nettie F. Stanley** was born at Hawkinsville, Calif. July 27, 1867; she was married Jan. 14, 1883 in Umatilla Co. Ore. to H.C. Petersen and had two sons and a daughter. Her second husband was Ed Saunders. She later lived in Seattle, Wash. as early as 1920. Later she lived at Edmund, Wash. in 1935. Nettie died Sept. 18, 1960 at Seattle, King Co., Wash. Her children:
 - a. Lillian Petersen died about 1920 and is buried in Seattle; she was born May 1887, Ore.
 - b. Earl Petersen died about 1937 and is buried in Seattle; he was born Oct. 1883, Ore.
 - c. Charley Petersen died 1974 in Seattle, Wash. and is buried there. He was born Oct. 1885, Ore.
8. **Lew Anna Rose Stanley** was born Jan. 25, 1869 at Hawkinsville, Calif. She married at Lakeview, Ore. to John F. Perry on Dec. 2, 1886. They later lived at Cottonwood, Calif. in Shasta Co. Calif., until 1907. They homesteaded land in Vya, Nevada near her uncles, Lemuel and Newton Stanley. In 1907, they moved to Modoc Co. Calif. She later married Elmer Buice, and later still to George Wilbur Sept. 20, 1932 and lived at 1770 Broadway in Salem, Ore. She died at age about 83 in 1953 in Fallon, Nev. at home of her daughter Theresa Eckhardt.
9. **Oliver Stanley** was an infant who died young; he was born somewhere around 1854/71 in Calif. or Ore.
10. **Elizabeth Stanley** was an infant who died young. These names were given by Stanley Perry. For many years I believed other children were born. The infants do not appear on any census records with their parent; evidently one of these was born between Lottie and Alfred and the other between Lew Anna and Nancy O. hence born 1854/71.
11. **Nancy Olivia Stanley** was born July 31, 1874 in Pendleton, Ore. She married Charles Lark and had one child. Nancy died 1921 at age 47 while visiting her sister, Nettie, in Seattle. Her nephew, Marion Stanley Perry says she married a man named From-Froome, a violinist. Her daughter, Geraldine Lark was born Feb. 17, 1898 at Mt. Home, Idaho. She lived for a time in Redding and her son was born here in 1928. She is the wife of George Wahl and lives in Los Gatos, Calif. Her son is married and has children.

NOTE: Nancy Olivia Froom, widow, died at Alderwood Manor, Washington, a resident of Pendleton, Ore. Her husband was George Froome. She d. June 1921.

The East Oregonian newspaper of Umatilla Co., Ore. on July 4, 1884, p 3, Col 3 lists businesses includes O. H. Stanley of Pilot Rock, Blacksmith.

Nancy Olivia md. perhaps to Charles Lark in Idaho, not in Umatilla Co., Ore.

Theresa Eckhardt writes that her aunt, Nettie Peterson, was yet living in 1950. Theresa met aunt Jennie when she was a youngster. My mother, Vera Hemenway, was at her Pentecostal Church when her parents told her she was going to get to meet aunt Jennie.

Letter of O. H. Stanley
 Feb. 9th 1877
 To his father, Alfred M.

Umatilla County, Oregon, Feb 9th, 1877 Pendleton Postoffice

Respected father this leaves all well and hope that it may reach you in due season and find you all well I am laboring under the same old complaint of having nothing to write and yet I have wrote so little in the last 5 years I ought to be full of wright I will at least try and fill up my sheat and make as interesting to you as possible. To commence I will tell you that duering this winter all around us the Diptheary and Scarlet fever and what the doctor called Scarlet Teena was killing of the young of the land till it looked vary alarming to those that was liveing a man by the name of Ogles had five of his children laying corps in his house at once They was all buried in one grave besids lots of other famlays lost all of theare children thought health is better now and the weather is pleasant My famla has escaped all most unharmed so fare tings are rather looking up in this part though money is rather scarce but I think that money matter will change in a short time in this Country Cattle buyers are thick and theare are considerable money selling it thought by those that pretend to keep posted that theare will be between 50 and 75 thousand head of cattle taken out of this county this season I will give you the prices that theare selling hole bands that is an avarag lot of steers and stock cattle are \$760 per hed two year old 13 to 14 dollars per hed 3 year old \$16 to 18 is about the way the avarage we havent sold now do not intend to at the present figure For what we have got did not costus anything we worked for them and if tha die we wont be out any thing only our time and think cattle are on the rase in fact tha are a

little higher this winter than tha was last.

This County is settling up vary fast in the last year emigration is coming in to this county from all quarters of the land is in a manner all taken up that is good for any thing and goddel that is in a manner for nothing this has bin the finest winter out our town is improving all the time thought under greate disadvantages as the Indian Reservation is doing on the South side whilst immediately on the north the steap hill riseing immediately from the Umatilla river confineing to A narrow strip of bottom along the South side of the river to the line of the Indian reservation of a distance of about three hundred yards and about half mile long and then a ranch on the East and West confineing things and lots owned ny moneyed men and wont sell unless tha get two priced so a nuff of this sort of complaint this winter the Preacher have reaped a good harvest meeting of about five weeks in lenth in this place.

This reservation that I spoke of is the best part of the County and is called the Umatilla Indian Reservation and taulk of it being thrown open in a short time but nothing is reil certain though thare anuity runs out this year according to the publications of the treaty maid with the Indians by government Lemuel and I have takened up ranches out about 16 miles south of this place he is ut up theare at work now now Father I wont say to you like the Swift said to the toad write if you want to I am proud to thik and own up to it that when I am pening to you I am writeing to my betters and one that fed me when hungry and when naked cloathed me and if the Swift would have reckoned her cake on this scale with the toad worm fealings rather than cool would yue esisted in the toad now I hope to see you in th is life but if we fail I hope to meet you in that hapy land so now I must close as ever yours

pleas take no offence

Finch, Huffman and Smith Families

Oliver Stanley's daughters intermarried with these families, and they are listed in the 1880 census of Umatilla County Oregon. I have lost the township of residence, but it would be Pendleton or Pilot Rock where Oliver and his brother Lemuel, had a ranch.

CHARLOTTE (1) STANLEY FAMILY

- A. Delila Anna "Annie" Alford b. June 19, 1872 Pilot Rock, Umatilla Co. Ore., Md. ____ Read. Married later to Lee Oliver. Moved to & resided in Redding; earlier in Klamath Falls, Oregon. She and Kid Silvers ran a chicken ranch near Redding. She had two daughters, Jessie, & Hattie. Lenna Read was 6 months younger than her nephew, Claude Hemmenway. Annie d. at Redding Dec. 3, 1928 & is buried at Redding's IOOF CEMETERY. Her mother d. 1935 and is buried beside her.
- B. William Lemuel Alford b. Apr. 12, 1873 at Pilot Rock, Oregon. Md. Carrie & had 6 children. The family lived at Condon, Ore. He d. Sept. 4, 1936 at Condon, Ore. & is bur. at Mayville.
- C. Charlotte Hattie Alford b. Dec. 25, 1877 near Grant's Pass, Josephine Co., Ore. Md in the home of her uncle Newt. Stanley at Lakeview, 1895 to Philip Mulkey, a Son of John & Sarah Mulkey, early day settlers to Lakeview. Philip was b. 1869 and d. 1918 and she md. second Patrick W. Berry. Charlotte d. Dec. 28. 1945 and is buried beside Philip in Lakeview's IOOF cemetery where many other members of this great extended family rest. A daughter May was b. and m. a rancher named McFoy. She m. Otto Buckhorn.
- D. Thomas Bertram Alford b. Dec. 25, 1879 near Grant's Pass in Kirbeyville, Ore. Said by his niece, Linnie Hemmenway Lamb, that he had no children. He md. Bertha Pendleton. He died at age about 30 in 1909 and is buried in the plot of his sister Lottie Mulkey. Thomas and his siblings Charlotte, William and Annie, along with parents Thoma and Charlotte Alford are listed in the 1880 census in Kirbyville, Josephine Co., Oregon.
- E. Oliver Alford b. about 1880 - 1886 in Grant's Pass, Ore. He is said to be a sickly child. He died age 14-15 in Ore. probably Klamath Co., about 1894. He drowned.
- F. Frederich Alford b. Mar. 1886. He was quite young when his folks divorced. He was given custody of his mother. He md. and had a daughter. He lived at Yakima, Washington and died there about 1942.
- G. Lenna Alford b. Nov. 1884 in Grant's Pass, Oregon. She md. R. E. Eatee in Vina, Tehama Co., Calif. in 1904. He was aged 28 at the time and was b. in Montana; she was aged 20 born in Oregon. They lived at Buckeye, Shasta Co., Calif. She d. at Redding Dec. 10, 1912 and is buried in Redding's IOOF cemetery. She died in her mother's home. Two daughters were born: Charlotte Mildred and Lila Temple Estee. The name Temple was probably her grandmother, Charlotte T. Stanley's middle name. Lila md. ____ La Mar and in 1949 resided in Mineral and later Eureka.
- H. Claudius "Claude-Claudie" Galen Hemenway b. Mar. 1, 1889 at Olene, Klamath Co., Oregon. He md. May 8, 1911 in Redding to Alice Lillian Stowe daughter of Elias M. and Alice Celina (Snyder) Stowe who was b. Apr. 24, 1896 at Guinda, Yolo Co., Calif. The Stoves came to Shasta Co. 1899-1900. Claudius d. Mar. 5, 1932 in Redding; he had cancer of the face. He converted to Pentecostalism with his wife about 1926 at the Assemblies of God church. He is buried in Redding's IOOF cemetery. He and Alice had 7 children. She md. 1934 at Anderson, Calif. to Edward L. Oliver. She d. Aug. 21, 1963 in Redding. Ed d. at Yellville, Ark. In Oct. 1966. Alice and Ed had one daughter.

- I. Philbert Hemenway called Phillip, was b. at Dorris or Picard, Calif. Apr. 25, 1896 according to his obituary. He md. 1934 to Zylpha Thurston, a teacher, and he d. July 1, 1949 at Redding and is buried at the IOOF cemetery there. A daughter, Shirley Anne, was b. Nov. 5, 1935 at Redding. His wife and daughter, by 1961, moved to Bryte, Calif., near Sacramento. My mother recalls that he used to be a life guard in Redding. Shirley married _____ Slates and had children. She married again and had at least 4 children. In 1993 Shirley was Mrs. Gilliam. Philbert is said not to be Dr. Hemenway's son.
- J. Elmer Hemenway b. about 1891 and d. at 6 months of age from a fall from a wagon probably at Eugene Oregon. Dr. Hemenway's portrait photo was taken with Elmer. My grandmother had it for years after grandma Stinchaum d. in 1935. She gave it to mom in 1958.

In her letter of 1966, Cousin Hattie Dews, could recall very little concerning the Stanley family. She did say that Mattie died about 1902 and had five children. [*Hattie shows up soon, g.m.*] She remembered that her grandmother, Lottie Stinchaum, had a large plush red photo album, but said her grandmother could not afford to get it out of storage when they moved to Redding. There was also a family bible. Hattie said she herself had no old family pictures. She referred to her grandmother's youngest sister, Nancy Oliva, as Ollie also she called her great uncle, Alfred N. Stanley, Newt Stanley, uncle Newt., saying that her mother and grandmother called him "Uncle Newt". But he was not Lottie's brother.

The children of Lottie's younger sisters, Annie(8) and Ollie(11), did not know their uncle, Alfred Marion Stanley, only that he married, had a son and disappeared.

There was something about this family that Hattie Dews would not relate to me, saying it would go to her grave with her, as it might hurt some of the living generation, and it did go to her grave with her, but I think it may have been related to the fact that her great grand father, O. H. Stanley, was killed by vigilantes. She said that the Stanley's were Catholic and fell away from the Church after seeing some priest do something evil which actually sounds like something out of the Protestant Revolt era of the 1600s. Perhaps she was getting something confused. She did write, however, that her grandmother Stinchaum tried to enter some of her daughters in a convent school in Portland, Ore. but was refused due to some scandal in the family. Perhaps this is where aunt Nora thought some relative became a Catholic Sister.

Uncle Galen(1.H.) Hemenway recalls that his grandmother said she was of Irish descent. She is said to have had auburn colored hair, and records show that some of her uncles, Lemuel, Fransis and Chris all had auburn and sandy colored hair. Rufas Stanley in his works on this family says the common ancestor, Joseph Stanley, was of Scotland. Marie Dyke of Adel, Ore. says her great great grandfather was a full blood Scotsman. Perhaps they were Scots-Irish. Lottie was a midwife and must have helped her Dr. husband Hemenway through the crises of many births in the Oregon Klamath Country where he served. On occasions (Perhaps also at the Temple Hotel where she worked) Lottie was called to prepare delicious meals for gatherings of people and when it came time for the guests to eat Lottie would commence to join the crowd, if the hostess tried to refuse her, Lottie would say "I have to work for my living but I'm just as good as you are; I'm an aristocrat, my family were aristocrats; are you?" At her persistence she usually got her way.

Lottie and her family used to hire Indians to work for them, and at times payment was made

with food and clothes, and evidently used clothing, for once an Indian woman received her payment for her employment, said in her native tongue HIKI YUNI CHIT KOK, HIKI YUNI CHIT KOK" which meant there's a hole in it, there's a hole in it, also sounding harsh and a bit vulgar as well. This related to me by my grandmother, Alice Oliver, when I was a child. She knew her mother-in-law, Lottie Stincham , well.

My mother and her sister, Lennie Lamb, recall that their grand-mother was, or pretended to be, spiritualist and could make tables move and jump. And I should say that it was their grandmother, not their mother. Stanley Perry, nephew of their grand mother, wrote in a letter of 1975 that one of his aunts could go into a trance and speak in another voice using words she usually did not speak.

Of Lottie's album, Hattie Dews wrote in 1965 that when her grandmother moved to Redding, she had a large bible and plush red photo album with many pictures in it. They were in the trunks and these remained in storage when they moved to Redding as she could not pay to get them out. Theresa Eckardt of Nev. Wrote that her mother had a group photo of five of Lottie's sons. Which would seem to be: William, Bert, Fred, Oliver and Claudius. Aunt Lennie recalls that her grandmother's sister, Jennie, was taller than Lottie Cousin Hattie Dews knew, Lottie's sister Mattie Royce Burch. Also she knew their uncle Newt Stanley. Mother recalls when times were hard for her father's growing family, her grandmother came through by giving gifts of food to help out. Lottie, herself, it is said, in order to help feed her own family, had to chop wood like a man.

It seems that the reason Lottie moved to Redding was for health reasons for her son Claude, because of the climate. Claude met his wife to be, Alice Stowe, at a dance near Redding, of which her favorite being the quadrille. They married in 1908. and lived in Redding. They had several mines near Redding, and he named two, Lennie and Nora, for his eldest daughters. My grandmother, Alice Lillian Stowe, moved to Stella in Shasta Co., now called Whiskeytown in 1899. After her husband died in 1932, she married in 1935 at Anderson, to Edward Lesley Oliver a son of Levi Lasley Oliver and Mary Kress/Cress who was raised near Lewiston, Calif. She was possibly of the Modoc Tribe. Levi later lived in Red Bluff, Calif. where he died 1948. Alice had known Ed when they were youngsters. He was born about 1889 and died 1967 in Ark. where he lived with his daughter Donna Ward who, with her family, resided in Ark. at that time. Claude and Alice belonged to a Pentecostal Church in Redding which developed into the United Pentecostal Church. They died as communicants in those churches. Elias Stowe, my grandmother's father, was born 1838 in Ohio, and his wife was born in Waterloo Co., Ontario Canada. Alice was from a family of nine brothers and sisters.

FOUND DEAD LYING IN DOORWAY

H. EDWARD STINCHACUM DIED SUDDENLY AND ALONE SUNDAY MORNING

Henry Edward Stinchacum was found dead in his home in the northeastern part of the city at 9 o'clock Sunday Morning. Death was due to heart trouble following and indisposition dating back several months.

Mrs. Stinchacum was at work in the laundry of the Temple hotel Sunday morning when her son, Filbert Heminway, on his way to work in the Benton Sawmill, dropped in to tell her that he had left Mr. Stinchacum feeling very unwell and she had better see that he had some attention. Mrs. Stinchacum hurried home. Entering the house, she found her husband lying dead in a doorway.

Mr. Stinchacum was hurt about a year ago while at work at the Benton sawmill and he had never been really well since; though he was up and able to be around. He and his wife went to the picture show Saturday night and he then remarked that he felt better than common and he hoped to be able to go to work in a short time. He was under treatment by a Physician, though the doctor had not called upon him for several days. He had dropsy and was also asthmatic.

The decedent was formerly a resident of Hayfork. He was twice married, He left no children by either wife. He was married the last time seven years ago. Mr, Stinchacum was an honest, hardworking man, but for a year past he had not been able to do much of anything, though he was more than willing.

The decedent leaves, besides the widow, two brothers, Benjamin Stinchacum, the Kennett carpenter, and William Stinchacum, residing somewhere in Washington.

Coroner Larkin held an inquest at the home Sunday Morning, It was found that the death was due wholly to natural causes.

STINCHACUM - STINCHAUM

My great grandmother, Lottie - Charlotte T. Stanley, married four times, at least, and perhaps five but four are known. Her first Husband was William Alford 1871. Second, she married Dr. Stacy M. Hemenway 1836-1914, son of Eugene, Ore. pioneers, Dr. Ansel Asa Hemenway and Abigail A. Whitmore. Her third was Frank Burch, whom she married in 1900 in Lake Co. Ore. She married again, to Edward H. Stinchacum who died in June 1913 in Redding, Calif. He was said to have been a bar tender

The Stinchacum family may have settled first in Tehama County Calif. At any rate, Marriage Book C. p 7 shows one Alonzo Stinchacum age 21 White Caucasian native of Calif. married there April 26, 1873 to Mrs. Virginia Banks age 18 born in Virginia. A brief look into Grantor- Grantee land sales books in Tehama County to 1900 did not show Alonzo or any other Stinchacum. Alonzo was born according to the record in 1852; he could be a brother to Lottie's husband Edward H. Stinchacum of Redding and Benjamin F. Stinchacum who was born in Calif. March 17, 1862 and died July 13, 1913 at Kennett, Shasta County. Both are sons of one Edwin Stinchacum,

Death Records of Shasta Co. at the Courthouse at Redding, Calif. 1910-1915 page 259 show Benjamin F. Stinchacum died July 13, 1913; born March 17, 1862 in Calif, single, Carpenter, father Edwin Stinchacum, birthplace unknown, mother unknown. Informant - Lottie Stinchacum of Redding.

DIED SUDDENLY OF HEART TROUBLE

Death of B. F. Stinchacum in Kennett like that of his brother in Redding.

(Special to Courier Free Press) KENNETT, July 14- Benjamin F. Stinchacum, the carpenter, died very suddenly shortly after noon yesterday, the circumstances of his passing being exactly similar to those of the death of his brother, H. Edward Stinchacum, in Redding a month ago. Heart trouble was the cause of both sudden deaths.

Mr. Stinchacum was at A. Carattini's place in Little Italy. He and Mr. Carattini were figuring on a bill of lumber, when Mr. Stinchacum complained of not feeling well. He declared that he would have to lie down. A glance told Mr. Carattini that a physician should be called right away. Dr. Sandholdt was on hand in a very few minutes. He gave a stimulant, but nothing could save the carpenter. Mr. Stinchacum died in a few minutes after the physician's arrival.

Ben Stinchacum was aged 51 and single. He had lived in and near Kennett for over ten years. He was well liked here and had many friends. Just before he died he said that he wanted to be buried here where he had so many friends. The decedent was a member of Mammoth Aerie of Eagles and the funeral tomorrow will be under the direction of the order.

Deputy Coroner A, M. Dick came up from Redding last evening and made the usual investigation of the sudden death.

The Stinchacum - Stinchacaum- Stinchaum family were in California early. It seems that one Edwin Stinchacum came to Calif. the name of his wife now not known. Presumably he was the father of Henry Edwin, Benjamin Franklin and William and probably of Alonso.

Alonzo Stinchacum age 21 (b. 1852 in Calif.) m. in Tehama County to Mrs. Virginia Banks age 18 of Virginia April 26, 1873. I found no Stinchacum in the Deeds of Tehama Co.

Edwin Henry Stinchacum born in Calif. 1857-8. 1892 res. in Weaverville in Trinity Co. M. 1st wife ?
M. 2nd Lottie (Stanley) Burch 1906 probably in Trinity Co., later to Redding. He died there June 15, 1913. Lottie died June 1, 1935 in Redding. Mr. Stinchacum had no issue by either wife.

Benjamin Franklin Stinchacum born, 1863 in Calif., single at death July 13, 1913 at Kennett Shasta Co.,

Calif. near Redding, one month after his brother Edwin.

William Stinchacum born ??? in Calif. In 1913 he resided in Washington state.

Edwin's obituary has him as Henry Edward. It also shows he married 1906, no doubt in Trinity County. It shows also Lottie was employed in Temple Hotel, not Lorens as I thought. Though she is not named in the obituary, her son Filbert Heminway is.

Note-- Lottie Stinchaum was employed as a laundress at the Temple Hotel in Redding for several years.

The 1870 census of Trinity County for the towns of Lewiston, Minersville, Trinity Center and Weaverville shows no family living there named Chriss or Cris or Kress. Levi Leslie Oliver was not here either. In fact his death certificate at the Courthouse in Red Bluff, Tehama County, indicates that he must have come to Calif as early as 1878 at age about 16 years So perhaps his parents and other family members also came. His parents were Henry Oliver and Sarah Bailey, a native of KY. Supposedly Henry was of Texas, but he was not found there as a child in 1850.

Aunt Linnie Hemenway Lamb [*see next page*] says Ed's mother, Mary Kress, died prior to her (aunt Linnie's) birth. Ed's parents, Levi and Mary Criss Oliver, lived at Lookout, Modoc County when he was born. They were not there in 1900.

The 1881 Directory of the City of Redding speaks of the Noseas (Nosi or Nose) Indians of Round Mountain, Clover Creek areas, Shasta County. Aunt Donna says her father, Ed, told her his mother was of the Noshew tribe. There seems to be no tribe of that name unless they called themselves by this name and whites were not knowledgeable concerning the name. However, Cousin Deldean Lamb Oiler says Ed's mother was of the Nosha tribe. So that I believe it was the Nozi or Noseas Indians that Ed's mother Mary Criss's mother was affiliated with. In 1880 she is at Millville with husband William Ellsbury listed as Indian. In 1900 with Levi Oliver at Buckeye she is listed as white father born in Germany.

Edward Leslie Oliver was born Oct. 19, 1890 at Lookout, Calif. His mother was born in Minnville [Millville?], Shasta Co., Calif. A daughter of Mr. Chriss, Johnne and Ju-Lu-Jo-See or "Nancy", a woman of the Noshew, Nosea tribe in 1862-3. Mary died in March 1918. She resided in the Redding area and must have been known by the Stowe family there, as their daughter, Alice, my grandmother knew Ed when they were in their youth. Mary Criss' father was John Criss or (Guise ?) of Germany.

Levi L. Oliver married Mary Criss in Shasta County Aug. 4, 1887. His second wife was Minnie Elizabeth Moore, daughter of Joseph and Nancy Jane Caylor Moore of Whitmore-Millville. Minnie was born 1877 at Whitmore and the family are listed in the 1880 census at Millville.

Joseph Moore, age 50, was born in Indiana, his father was born in Ind. and his mother born in Ohio. His wife, Nancy, age 26 (2nd wife?) was born in Iowa and her father was born in Ind. and mother in Va. Children: Sarah Ellen 8, Joseph L., Minnie E. 3 and George W. 2 all born in Calif.

Levi and Minnie lived in Red Bluff, Calif. on Jackson since 1907. He had lived in Calif. 70 years at his death. He died in 1948 at Red Bluff and is buried in Oakhill Cemetery. His wife, Minnie, died in the Spring of 1972 and is buried beside him.

Levi Lesley Oliver is listed in the Great Register of Voters of Medoc Co., 1890 age 28, native of Texas, farmer residing at Lookout. In 1894 he is in Pacheco Precint, Shasta County.

My Grandmother, Alice Lillian Stowe was born April 24, 1896 at Guinda in the Capay Valley Yolo Co, to Elias and Alice Snyder Stowe. She married May 8, 1911 to Claudius Galen Heminway. He died 1932 and she married in 1934 at Anderson to Edward L. Oliver. Aunt Linnie and mother were witnesses according to marriage records at the Courthouse at Redding. She died 1963 and he died 1966.

Charlotte's second husband, Dr. Stacy M. Heminway, was for many years Government Physician for the Yanix Indians of Klamath County Ore. He knew and was friend to Winema "Woman of a Brave Heart.", the heroine of the Modoc Cap'n Jack War of the 1872-3; she let the settlers know that they were about to be attacked. A photo of him with her and the field Matron Eleanor Gunston was taken about 1906.

Winema or Toby is found in the 1880 census of Linkville, Lake Co., Oregon p 15:

1. H. 1. Lenna Lottie Lillian - Lennie Hemenway was born Aug. 8, 1912 at Buckeye in Shasta Co. and d. Apr. 11, 1983 at Redding. She married at Reno, Nev. 1928 to William Henry Calhoun and had two sons. She married again to Delbert Charles Lamb of Klamath Co., Ore. and had two daughters. They lived most of their married life in Redding and then at Happy Valley near Redding.

1.H.2. Nora Violet Hemenway was born Aug. 27, 1914 at Redding. She married Sept. 3, 1930 in Redding, to John L. McDemos a native of Greece. They had five children. They lived in Redding for many years and later at Palo Cedro not far from Redding. She died June 30, 1968 in Redding and is buried at Redding Cem. John still resides at Palo Cedro. Nora affiliated with a United Type Pentecostal Church. John was at one time Greek Orthodox.

1.H.3. Violet Helena Hemenway was born Feb. 21, 1917 at Redding. She married Lee Robertson and adopted his son Claude Lee Robertson who was born Oct. 1946. Violet is now the wife of Robert Heitsman and they reside in Orland, Glenn Co., Calif. Claude married Marylan Taylor. Violet d. Nov. 14, 1986 at Fall River Mills, Calif.

Note: Aunt Violet said she & Lee Robertson both adopted Claude and that Claude's wife was Marylan Neal, not Taylor.

1. H. 4. Vera Rosie Hemenway born Feb. 15, 1918 at Redding. She married Oct. 19, 1936 at Red Bluff, Calif., to Bud Franklin Lander son of George Bertram Lander and Katherine Lillias Isham. Bud was born Jan. 7, 1912 in Marion Co., Ore. They were married by Rev. Mrs. Gabrielle Dame of Redding. Bud and Vera have lived their entire married life in Red Bluff. He was employed for many years with the P.G. & E. Co. serving with the Water Division at Manton. She was Pentecostal, and in 1954 joined the Catholic Church in Red Bluff, under Fr. James O'Day who now serves in Sacramento, Calif. They had five sons, and now have 2 granddaughters. She

passed away Nov. 6, 1978 at Red Bluff and is buried at the Oakhill Cemetery there. Bud died July 15, 1981.

1. H. 5. Galen Vernon Hemenway was born Apr. 12, 1924 in Redding. He served in the U. S. Army in W.W.II He married to Althea Alice Daniels and they live in Redding. He was employed as a truck driver for years. They have two children. He died Jan 30, 1991.
- a. Galen Ricky Hemenway was born Jan. 5, 1957 in Redding and is in the army.
 - b. Gaylene La Shell Hemenway was born July 6, 1966 in Redding.

1. H. 6. Wesley Clarence Hemenway was born Sept. 6, 1929 and died Nov. 18, 1998. He m. Louise McCathern McNatt and they have a daughter, Leslie Colleen Hemenway, born July 8, 1958 in Redding. They live in Redding. He also has three step daughters. Darla, Debbie and Linda are his other daughters, some of whom also have children. Wes and Louise have about, six grandchildren.

1. H. 7. Claudius Hemenway died at birth; he was son of Claude and Alice Stowe.

- a. Donna Lee Oliver, daughter of Alice L. Stowe and Edward Leslie Oliver, was born Oct. 1, 1936 in Redding, Calif. She married James- Jim Ward of Arkansas and they have twelve children. They have lived intermittently in both Calif. and Ark. In 1973 they made a trip to Calif. with their van, twelve children and a pet. Being summer, when they stopped in to see mom and our family, the children all slept on the front lawn of my parents home. My folks marveled at the older children taking a hand in caring for the younger ones. Dona and Jim are now grand parents and live at Olinda next to aunt Linnie and Uncle Delbert on Sherry Lane. They are grandparents also.

When I was a child, aunt Donna told me her grandmother's tribal connection was to the Noshew tribe. She said her father told her this, but she looked in the books published on Calif. Indians and found no such name, but thought it may have been an Indian name for themselves- which may be---But, Cousin Deldean Lamb says it was the Nasha (Nawsha) tribe.

Several books on Northern Calif. Indians mention the Nizi - Noze - Nozes tribe. Of these, the 1881 Directory for the City of Redding on p.29 mentions this tribe as Nosheas who owned Oak Run, Clover Creek and Round Mountain. So I believe aunt Donna's tribal connection are to the Nozi-Nosheas, Nasha or Noshew tribe (all the same tribe ?). My grandfather (actually mother's step father) always maintained that he was ¼ Indian so his grandmother would have been of the Nosheas tribe. Ed's mother, Mary Criss, so he says, was raised in Lewiston (Trinity-Shasta Counties). In 1850, only one Chris any spelling appears in Calif. In 1880 a few Chris families are in Shasta Co. The 1881 Directory has John W. Criss of GasPoint and J. Criss of Igo. Mary Criss was daughter of Johnne "John" Criss and Ju-Lu-Ja-See, or "Nancy" a Noshea-Yana woman.

Jim and Donna have in their family Bible a document which is recorded at the Tehama Co. Courthouse in Red Bluff. Sworn by Levi Leslie Oliver that his son, Edward Leslie, was born Oct. 19, 1890 at Lookout, Modoc Co., Calif. sworn March 12, 1942 and recorded June 21, 1956. Information also shows father, Levi Leslie Oliver, white, age 28 at birth of Edward and residence in Lookout. Mother Mary Cress, age 27 years, old, white, born in Minnville. Levi born in Denton, Texas. There seems to have been no Minnville in Shasta Co. and I believe it was Millville which is in the vicinity of the home of the Nosheas Indians.

He was in the service but is now a police officer.
- b. Glenn Gene Calhoun born Nov. 7, 1933 in Redding. He served in the U.S. Air Force after graduation from High School. He married Alice and had several children, most of whom now live on the coast of the state near Eureka. He is married again and lives in Salem, Ore. They had 5 children

Linnie and Delbert Lamb are the parents of;

- a. Deldean Edith Lamb born Nov. 7, 1942 at Redding. She married Jerry - Basil Oiler in Red Bluff, Calif. in 1960 and three children were born to them. She lives at Olinda, Calif.
- b. Linnie May Harriet Lamb born Feb. 17, 1945 at Redding. She died as a result of an automobile accident near Redding June 12, 1960 and is buried in Redding Cemetery where other members of the family are interred also.

Verle is employed at Richfield and lives in Los Molinas, Calif. Naomi's family are members of the Assemblies of God Church. They have two daughters both born in Tehama Co. born on her grandfather's birth day and named for both grandmothers.
 - a. Gaylene Naomi Lander m. Michael Wallenburg and has three children, two living. Gaylene received her Teacher's Aid certificate in 2002 in Red Bluff.
 - b. Rosy Marie Lander md. Clarence Midget (now divorced). Rosie has three children.
- e. David Wesley Lander born July 27, 1951 resides in Red Bluff. He is employed by Minch Meat Packing Co. He is an avid sports enthusiast. David married in Oct. 1963 at Reno Nevada to Sandra Leah Votaw. A daughter, Heather Leanne Lander, was born at Red Bluff, Calif.

My mother Vera & her sister Linnie Lamb recall that their grandmother, Lottie Stinchacum, was, or pretended to be, a spiritualist and could make tables jump and move. Lottie's nephew, Charles Perry, wrote in a letter of 1975 that one of his aunts could go into a trance and speak in another voice using words she usually did not speak. Yup, got to be great grandmother Lottie!

Of Lottie's albums & Bible, her granddaughter, Hattie Dews, wrote in 1965 when her grandmother moved to Redding she could not pay to take things out of storage. That album had many family pictures in it (this Was abt. 1906). Her things were later sold for cash by those holding them in storage.

Theresa Eckhardt of Nevada wrote that her aunt Lottie sent her sister Annie a photo of 5 of Lottie's sons. These must have been Wm. Thomas, Frederich, Oliver or Philbert and Claude. Hattie Dews knew her aunt Mattie Royce Burch and also knew Uncle Newt Stanley. Mom recalled when times were hard for her father's family, that is Mom's folks & siblings, that her grandmother Lottie used to help the family out when hungry. And aunt Linnie said that Lottie had to work hard to feed her own family & got out and chopped wood like a man to help out.

It seems the reason Lottie moved to Redding about 1906 was due to the health of her son Claude Hemenway. A Doctor told her the climate there was good for him. Claude would meet his future wife, Alice Stowe, here at a dance; in fact, grandmother's favorite was the "Quadrille". They lived at Buckeye & later Redding. They had two mines nearby and named two Linnie & Nora for the two oldest daughters.

Grandmother Alice Stowe moved to Stella (now Whiskytown, Shasta Co.) about 1900; two brothers, Bill & Oliver H., had come in 1899. After Claude d. in 1933, she had m. second Edward Leslie Oliver in 1934 at Anderson. Aunt Linnie & my mother, Vera, were witnesses. Edward was the son of Leslie Oliver & Mary Chris.

Levi, b. in Texas or Mo., 1862 and d. in 1948 in Red Bluff. Levi's first wife, Mary Chris, was part Indian. Her father was Johanne or John Chris and was b. in Germany in 1830. His wife was Nancy

(Indian name Ju-Lou-Jo-see) which evidently is a Nosea/Yana name though Ed's daughter Donna and her family were registered as Wintun Indians.

Abt 1926, my grandparents converted to Christ through the Assemblies of God Church in Redding, a Pentecostal Church. After Claude died, his widow would affiliate with a church very similar to the United Pentecostal Church "Jesus Only Doctrine". In it one had to be rebaptised in the name of Jesus rather than the traditional Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Grandmother Alice's father, Elias Meade Stowe, was b. 1838 near Kirtland & Cleveland, Ohio, his parents Milton Nahum Stow & Margaret Anna Burton, having become among the earliest converts to the Mormon Church (LDS).

Elias m. Alice Celina Snyder b. June 1858 in Waterloo, Waterloo Co., Ont. Canada. She d. at Redding in 1916 and he d. at Napa, Calif. in 1917. Both are buried in the Redding IOOF cemetery. Grandmother was the youngest of 9 children:

1. A. Deilia Anna Alford m. Lee Oliver but by her first husband ____ Read, had:
 - a. Hattie Lenna Read b. Sept. 1889 and d. 1969 in Sacramento. She had m. a Mr. Dew but had no children.
 - b. Jessie Read was b. abt 1892 in Oregon & m. William Hensley & had two children
 - a. Pete Hensley b. about 1912 and resided (1970s) in Wyoming.
 - b. Tina Jean Hensley b. abt 1912, m. Mr. ____ Randolph & had a daughter Barbara called Trudy b. 1940. Jean resided many years in Fresno, Calif. and later again in Redding. She & Linnie, mom's sister, were best friends. Of Jean's daughter Trudy, I first met her when I was 7; grandmother, who was caring for Trudy for a time came down from Redding to help care for mom as she was having brother Verle in May. Grandmother brought Trudy with her and brother Bud and I both in the second grade brought Trudy with us to school, but Mrs. Tremmain, our teacher did not want a stray in the classroom, so she had me take Trudy to the Kindergarten room. "Oh, Well!". I met Jean at a 1976 reunion in MacArthur, Calif.

While I cannot say that any of the Stanley, Studley or Colvin men served in any capacity for the military during skirmishes with Native Americans, we can say they must have been of some concern. For we know the family came out to Yreka and Hawkinsville, Siskiyou County, in 1853 and 1864. Oliver H. resided at Yreka, Wm. F. at Scott Valley and Alfred M. came out at Hawkinsville for a time. His daughters Luanna and Cela would marry their prospective husbands here.

In the 1860s Wm. F. Stanley located in El Dorado County and in the later 1860s at Cow Creek, Shasta Co. Oliver, in 1869, moved on up to Pendleton/Pilot Rock, Oregon. Tom and Luanna Colvin, Ben and Cela Studley, Ozias and Rhoda F. Stanley would in 1869 move east to Big Valley and Adin in what later become Modoc Co. in 1871. About this time, Tom Colvin and Ozias Stanley moved up to near Lakeview, Lake Co., Oregon. By 1870 Lemuel is with brother Oliver.

John R. Stanley, another son of Alfred M., may have come after 1863 to Calif. But he located at Sonoma Co. briefly then Lower Lake, Lake Co., Calif.

His father was in Lake Co., Calif. for a time [perhaps as a visitor] and Ozias, Chris and Lemuel would all reside here at times as well.

Newt, or Alfred Newton, Stanley would locate at Lakeview, Oregon also.

Jesse H. came out during the gold rush but it is not known where he was in Calif. We might suggest the Yreka area due to two brothers having come here in 1853. He may have come even earlier and they would join him later. THIS IS PURE SPECULATION ON MY PART. But, in the story of his altercation with a Chinese man and his mine and his killing the man and then disappearing from his

family in Missouri or Iowa, in order for that story to get back to his wife and children, someone out in Calif. had to know about it and reveal it to the family.

Lottie Stinchaum d. June 1, 1935 in Redding, Calif. Among her survivors was her son William Alford [1.B.] of Mayville, Oregon.

This family resided here for many years. Aunt Linnie Lamb, Mom's sister, visited some of them in the 1960s. William's wife, Carrie [Grisel] Alford and he had 8 children. William died here In 1936. Their children:

- a. Rufas Alford m. Louise Wright in 1931. He was a farmer and stockman and retired in 1969. Louise was a school teacher who retired in 1971. They had four sons:
 - a. Ronald Alford m. Donna Lotze and resided in Spokane, Wa. in 1970s.
 - b. Robert Alford m. Shirley Ingram and resided in Condon., Ore. in the 1970s.
 - c. Gerald Alford m. Nancy Miles and lived in John Day, Ore.
 - d. Joseph Alford m. Toni Hindman and lived in Heppner, Ore.
- b. Elmer B. Alford b. Sept. 3, 1920 in Mayville, Ore. He served in the USMC in WWII. He m. Pauline Muessig and had 3 sons: William Paul, Jeffery and Roger Alford.
- c. Phelbert William Alford lived in Mayville, Ore.; he m. Bonnie Farrer and they had 5 children, Bonnie Jean, James, Wilbur, Sharon and Walter Alford.
- d. Leo Alford lived in Mayville and m. Winnie Weise and had Peggy and Sally.
- e. Fiona Edna Alford m. Fred May and in retirement lived at The Dalles, Ore. They had at least one daughter, Jean May.
- f. Myrtle Thelma Alford m. Marshall Van Hoy and lived in Mayville; they had a son Larry Van Hoy.
- g. Thomas Merle Alford served in the US Navy in WWII; he m. Velda Rust and had 3 children: Kennegy, Theodore and Larna Alford.
- h. Betty Jean Alford worked for the State and Salem, Oregon.

Otto Herman Buckhorn, husband of Mae Mulkey, was b. July 27, 1876 at Kamspell, Montana. *As I had no luck finding Kamspell, may I suggest Kalispell, Montana?? There is a Kamspel Indian Res. just above Spokane also.* d. July 12, 1965 Lakeview, Ore. Their son, Willard Elmer Buckhorn b. June 11, 1933 Lakeview, Ore. and d. Nov. 20, 1989 Lakeview was Republican, Methodist and a Salesman. He m. Aug. 9, 1952 in Lakeview, Ore. to Elizabeth L. Scoville. Their children are: Trudy Mae Buckhorn Drew, Richard Lee Buckhorn, Tamara Joy Buckhorn Bridgmon and Shawna Maureen Buckhorn Alexander.

Trudy Drew has been very generous in sending info and photos on her family line including another of Charlotte Stanley and my grandpa Claude Galen Hemenway as a 4 yr old plus other kin. Thank You Trudy!

Alfred Marion Stanley [2.] and Sarah Ella Stanley

Mrs. Barbara Pink is a descendent of a Smith family whose line came to Umatilla Co., Ore. at an early day. She is not a Stanley descendant but her distant cousin, Lewis "Bud" Smith descends from Sarah Ella Stanley & her first husband, Francis Marion Smith. Sarah Ella's brother, Alfred Marion m. first Sarah Alexander. Mrs. Pink sent this information on Feb. 12, 2001. No answer has yet been received from Mr. Lewis Smith.

It seems Mr. Smith is a descendent of Birta [Bird] Smith. Actually in 1963 is when I found Bird Smith's age: infant, in the family of Oliver H. Stanley at the Pendleton/Pilot Rock area in the Umatilla Co., Oregon 1880 census. Bird and his sister, 4 year old Rosa, were with parents Marion and Sara Smith living with her father's family of children. Marion Stanley and wife Sarah, young newlyweds, were also with the family plus several other sisters of Alfred Marion and Sarah.

I knew nothing more other than that Sarah Ella, after the divorce from her 1st husband m. in 1886 at Lakeview, Ore., Jerry Cochran. Their son, Charles O. Cochran, was b. Nov. 1890 in Oregon.

They are at Preston, Oneida Co., Idaho in the 1900 census, sheet 6 ED 95.

Sarah Ella Cochran d. in Malhuer Co., Ore. Nov. 10, 1919. Her death certificate shows she was b. in Curake, Calif. Feb. 21, 1859. (NOTE: Curake must be in Siskiyou Co. where her folks, Oliver Havard Stanley and Nancy Ann Hatfield had in 1853 crossed the plains by wagon train to California.

Alfred Marion Stanley, according to his sisters children, moved and supposedly contact was lost. Records show he was in Humbolt Co. and the 1900-10 censuses show him wife Nettie, 3 step(?) daughters and his Obit in 1922 shows there was a son, Clyde Stanley; I have never found him though.

Evidently, Alfred Marion Stanley md. second Carrie Isabella Gall b. about 1867 in Ore. Alfred

was her 1st husband. Alfred and Sarah Alexander evidently divorced abt. 1885. Marion Smith & Sarah Ella Stanley divorced about 1887. Sarah E. would marry J. Cochran and Alfred Marion Stanley disappeared but is found in the California Great Register of Voters at Antelope in Tehama County., Aug. 21, 1890 On Nov. 20, 1890 he was at nearby Payne Creek about 10 miles m. to Lurena M. Elliott. Obviously this marriage was short lived or she had died for by 1910 he is in Humboldt Co., Calif. m. to Nettie.

Nettie ____ m. by time of 1910 census.

In 2001 I found that Alfred Marion Stanley besides son Clyde had a daughter, Ollie S. Marion Smith and family are in the 1900 census of Umatilla Co. Ore.
