1,133,050 is the microfilm number for charts 501-600.

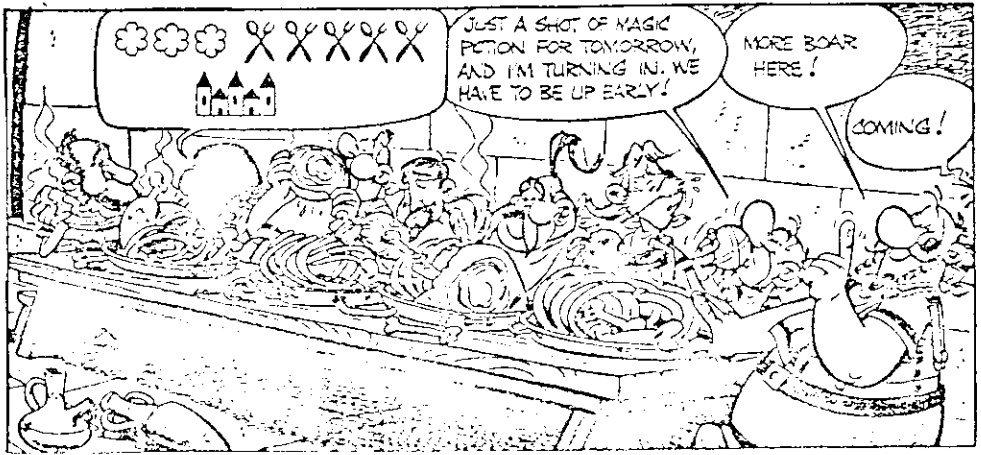
Since the incorrect number was given by Salt Lake Genealogical Library, if you have ordered that microfilm you should get a credit or refund.

From DEPAUW University:
 "This University was originally named INDIANA ASBURY UNIVERSITY and carried this name until 1884. As most universities of that period, we also were having financial problems. Mr. Washington Charles DEPAUW was a trustee of this institution at the time and was finally persuaded to come to the aid of the University in regard to finances, and it was agreed the name would be changed to DEPAUW University in his honor. Mr. DEPAUW was a business man who had many and varied interests. His glass works was the forerunner of the Libby-Owens Glass Co. His home was in New Albany, Indiana and there is a United Methodist Church there bearing the name "DEPAUW Memorial United Methodist Church". At one time there was a "DePauw College" for Women at DePauw, Indiana. He was a very devout Methodist".

The microfilm of the passenger list covers April 1 - May 14, 1856. Port of arrival is N.Y. Mary Ann DEFNET 832, S. Quincy St. Green Bay, WI. 54301

Another hard-to-find ancestor is Leonder SPIEGEL/SPECOL who was born in 1836 in Belgium, perhaps Antwerp, Leonder SPIEGEL married Archange MELOCHE (of French-Canadian ancestry) in Michigan, when and where is another question. The following is an account of Rita Cousins's trip to Belgium. The minute my husband agreed to see me pursue my desire to take a trip to Belgium for genealogical research I contacted several airlines. Capitol had by far the best price. They turned-out totally organized, taking off and landing on time - truly a trouble free flight. (Past experience with the airline was a bit different). Having relatives in Belgium helped me to achieve the goal of making this research financially more advantageous than hiring a researcher. At this time four hundred names at least have been added to my ancestral file but a final count will have to exceed five hundred names. The first day at the Hasselt Archives I looked up an ancestor and found that since my last visit a typed alphabetical listing of parents with all their children had been and was being compiled. A typed alphabetical list of all marriages and deaths was also available for the parish records. The second day coming in the archives I found a man looking through the books I had left out, he was doing research in the same towns. Although he intended to research only his paternal line (WILLEMS) he changed his mind when I gave him a twelve generation chart. We turned out to be related some five generations back and we shared information and joined our efforts in our research. We are corresponding. He sends me a copy of any LOYENS documents he comes across. Meanwhile every evening I visited relatives and everyone seemed eager to provide some information or people to meet; all this at a dizzying speed which did not permit automatic organization of the information collected. One relative gave me fifteen wills of our ancestors in VLIJTINGEN. Another introduced me to a third cousin who is writing a book on the MOORS lines. The latter introduced me to a distant relative who is writing a book on the CASTERMANS line. Each gave me information back into the thirteen hundreds. Again a relative is writing a book on the HARDI family. (Should anyone be interested in these lines I have the addresses of these three relatives). Not only are living relatives highly interested in genealogical research, but I tied into several books COENEGRACHTS, WITHOFS and MORISSEN. A fantastic compilation of all the families of EIGENBILZEN-MOPERTINGEN (now separate) done by a retired mayor includes hundreds of pages with charts uniting generations. I have tied in at least to twenty families in that book with many more to come. (I would be delighted to give photocopies to those interested). Although the information in the book is not all correct it is a fantastic help for the years of parish and civil records. Several cousins helped in doing actual research and many offered future help. It seems that reaping the fruits of this trip will be a continuous proposition. Beyond this lies the need to become acquainted with old script but even there some relatives read it fluently. Microfilming of the province of Limburg's records should be in full swing at this time. In past trips I had gathered many death announcements, photographs, copied marriage books. A book written about VLIJTINGEN was very helpful since all people mentioned in it were relatives. It is a bit unusual to have completed a minimum of nine generations and to find that every individual even beyond that was born in the province of Limburg, but that's the way it is until further evidence proves to the contrary. So this Limburger... hopes to receive letters from other Limburgers... who feel they might be related. Until then.

Beside the interesting account of her trip to Belgium, Rita was kind enough to share the list of her travel to Belgium's expenses: Airline ticket (March 1981) \$ 429.00; Limousine N.Y. to Bridgeport round trip \$ 31.00 ; food \$ 153.00; parking \$ 7.50 ; gasoline \$ 78.00; car rental (around) \$ 400.00; genealogical materials \$ 18.00; baby sitter \$ 120.00; unrelated expenses such as gifts \$ 122.00. Rita spent 2 weeks in Belgium and stayed at her sister's house. We congratulate her for a job well done. And now from Clement DE ROO: " After tracing the DE ROO name back, it was found that the name changed from DRUT to DE ROO in one generation after 1765 when a Philippus DRUT married an Andrea GENTBRUGGHE in Assenede, EF. Two entries in the Parish Registers showed that Phillipus DRUT came from the Parish of Biecourt, Lorraine, France. A search in the Parish Registers of Biecourt disclosed that there was a DRUT family in that town but the name didn't appear until after the estimated birth of Phillipus. However a Philippus DRUT signed as a witness on a death entry in 1755 so it was apparent that he was there. On the assumption that the DRUT family came from somewhere close, I started searching the Parish Records of surrounding towns. At the sixth town searched, I found his birth and baptism and also his parents marriage in Menil-ex-Xaintois, about 2 kilometers from Biecourt. Now I can continue with the genealogists insatiable thirst for more. Incidentally, all of this search was done with LDS microfilmed records, for which I am again thankful. How Philippe got to Assenede, Belgium and why he went there, is a mystery that I would like to solve. The migration had to take place between 1755, when his name appeared on a Death entry in the Biecourt Parish Register, and 1765, when he was married in Assenede, East Flanders." Clement requested and received from the State Archives and Library in Austin, Texas a birth record of Alfred VERSLUYS, actually it was a "delayed birth report" and gave much more information than might have been on a certificate registered at the time of birth. 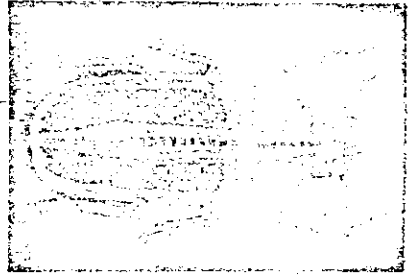

THE LENAINS - PROUD CALIFORNIANS sent by Charles and Claudine BELVA.
 The 1870 War between France and Germany frightened lots of people close to the French border. By the end of XIX century, the recruiting agent for the Red Star Line in the Florenville area was Edgard RICHARD, a very successful one to our knowledge. Ste. Cecile is a tiny village, in the province of Luxembourg, very close to the French border and pioneers were numerous to answer to his offer. Coming from some 20 families, they left around 1890; some settled in New England: MEUNIER, PARMENTIER, MARTIN, ENOND, STEVENOT, DE GRAIDE, mainly in the Woonsocket, R.I. area. Some went back to Belgium: GROSODOS, WILLAIME, GUIOT. But such was not the case with our folks, the LENAINS, nor for members of the MARTIN and FAULE clans. The LENAINS with roots in Western Hainaut during the XVIIIth Century felt unhappy in Ste. Cecile, where work was really scarce, even if the country was beautiful. Among 3 sons and 5 daughters, only one had chosen to stay and care for the old parents - in fact it was our grand-mother (of the author) and 2 generations later we finally crossed to Canada. Two eldest sons: Alfred and Raphael went first with elder sister Augustine. Raphael got married, lost his wife with a newborn child, and crossed back with Alfred. Augustine got married to a Frenchman: Auguste HUILLADE, lost a leg in a streetcar accident and held a rooming house in the L.A. area; her grandchildren and their folks now live in northern California. A few years later came two younger sisters: Amelie, soon married to another French by the name of DUPONT, died leaving two young daughters; among her grand-children: Dr. Edmund DIEFENBACH prepares a book on hospital care, Jeanne WILSON is a painter and Betty MANN made kind of a start in politics in the Bay area. The other sister LENAIN, Alice married Vincent FRANCON had 2 children, and a single grand-daughter Dolores-FRANCON-VILLA. The two younger LENAIN settled in Southern California at the turn of the century. Adrien settled in Anaheim, as a baker got married to Helen Agnes HUETADO and raised a family of 5 children. For the time being, the oldest of the
