Except for the slow-down of workers at the airport on the return trip, Mary Ann DEFNET had a most pleasant stay in Belgium this past September. She says: "It was a "mad house" (Brussels Airport) trying to get our group checked in and through the customs gate, Some people were nearly crushed. In the middle of that, we tried to carry on a conversation with Mr. GORISSEN, Michael DUDNEY, and Dirk BINON, all of whom had especially come to see us as we had not been able to visit with them during our stay in Belgium. We were so pleased they came, but sorry we couldn't have carried on a more peaceful meeting. Regardless of the ending, our trip was extremely pleasant and rewarding. Our cousin, who is

a Finance officer at the Maison Communale in Eghezee, took us to his office twice. The first time, he brought up the books we wanted from the basement. The second time, he took us down the basement and let us look at anything we wanted. We found much information on families we were researching. Another day, our friend from Namur took me to Grez-Doiceau, Beauvechain, Incourt and Perwez. Because we had called ahead, we were received very warmly. We arrived at Beauvechain too close to the noon hour and couldn't stick around until 1:30, so nothing was obtained there, but the girls were very friendly. They said we should come back. I wish it had been possible. They told me that they receive both cash and International Reply Coupons from America and it presented no problem (to cash them). The Commune Secretaire at Grez-Doiceau had a file folder full of letters from the U.S. asking for documents and information. He seemed to be pretty busy and hasn't a lot of time to answer these requests. He did, however, take me up to the attic (50' steps) where all the old books are kept and he located and copied the things I wanted - 20frs per copy. I had a slight problem at Incourt. The clerk in the office where the books are kept would not look in them without the signature of the Commune Secretaire. We had to wait until his return and then go upstairs, write ~~our~~ name and address on a paper and tell him what we were looking for. He then signed his name and we went back down to the clerk's office. In the confusion of Incourt/ Opprebais/Sart-Risbart records, I forgot one. This office required document copies to be officially stamped, sealed and signed by the Burgomaster. The clerk at Perwez was very accomodating. She sent for the books and brought them out to look at. There, too, it was necessary to have the copies stamped, sealed and signed. Each of these two places charged 150BF. per photocopie. I also had the opportunity to go to the Province Archives in Namur. An acquaintance of our friend does research as a hobby. He is very good. I had previously sent him a pedigree chart (Jack's) so

 had written down the books (number and page)
 where other information could be found. That was
 a very profitable day !
 The last place I visited was Ramillies. The
 Commune Secretaire was a friend of our cousin.
 He was very friendly and took us up to the attic
 to look for the proper books. This information
 was for a friend here. The records were exactly
 where they should have been and I received the
 copies free of charge. I should mention that
 except for Namur and Eghezee, I did not ask
 for a lot of documents (5 at Perwez, 3 at Incourt,
 2 at Grez-Doiceau, 3 at Ramillies) and our friend
 explained who I was and what I was doing. I was
 not given a "free hand" to look myself for
 whatever time I wanted. It was understandable.
 I could have spent hours in each place. The names
 were all so familiar that I wanted to write
 everything down, but no time for that! My friend
 is not a researcher and he expected I was going
 to ask for only one thing in each place. I felt
 fortunate that he was as patient as he was. My
 cousin, incidently, seemed to have endless
 patience with Dorothy and me when we were at
 his office. It has taken me a long time to
 sort out, translate and record all the information
 I brought back. Now, of course, I need to go
 further, so I will have to rely on my researcher
 friend in Namur or get in touch with another
 researcher in Brussels. At any rate, I am
 making progress !
 We visited quite a few churches ---some were those
 of our ancestors and some were just beautiful to
 see. We also went to Liege, Tongeren, Beauraing,
 Givet (France), and Brussels.....we limited
 our visit to a bus tour of the city (Brussels),
 a bit of lace shopping at the Grand'Place, and a
 look at the Galeries St. Hubert mall. Oh, yes,
 we did go to see St. Michel's Cathedral which
 is breath-taking. I would have loved to go to the
 Archives du Royaume, but it was impossible.
 Austin ALLARD was our group leader on the trip,
 and Joan and Charles SIEGERT, from Texas, were
 with us too. Austin had to travel with the
 groups making the two side trips, so didn't
 have the opportunity to do any genealogical
 research.

Punch, noted Nova Scotia genealogist and Chairman of the Genealogical Association of the Nova Scotia Historical Society, I requested from Public Archives Nova Scotia a particular copy from the Nova Scotia Despatches:
The first document reads:
Foreign Office, 17 September 1843.

Steven EDGE

I am requested by the Earl of Aberdeen to transmit to you the accompanying letter from the Belgian Minister at this Court. and to request that you move Lord STANLEY to forward the required information to this office for transmittal to M. Van der WEYER .

(signed) J.T.H. Addington
the "accompanying letter" translated from French (by Sandra Dobbie) reads:

H.E. the Earl of Aberdeen,
I have the honour to beg H.E. the Earl of Aberdeen to use his good offices with his colleague the Secretary of State for the Colonies, to obtain, if such thing is possible, information about one Nicolas VAN MALDER of Brussels, taken prisoner by the English and sent to Halifax, Nova Scotia. The latest correspondence from VAN MALDER to his family was dated 1822. He then lived in Halifax, near the Catholic church and practised the trade of painter of buildings.
(signed) J. Van der WEYER."

Sandra has written to various places in Belgium and England and R. BALAND had a query published in "Nouvelles Breves" (SCGD-Belgium) about the VAN MALDERS.

Another very successful researcher is Gretchen LEISEN, she reports another recent discovery of Belgian ancestors: " My great-grandmother A. Margaretha HOFFMAN was born in Mersch,

Grand-Duchy of Luxembourg. I recently discovered that her maternal grandfather Jean/Johann THEISEN was born in Hondelange, LX, Belgium, formerly part of the Grand-Duchy - now part of Luxembourg Province..... The THEISEN family along with son-in-law Nickalaus HOFFMANN arrived in the U.S. in July 1847 and settled in Seneca County, Ohio. They lived in Big Spring, Pleasant Township and belonged to the Catholic parish of St. Boniface in New Reigel, Ohio. They had relatives with the family name MARX who also settled in Seneca County. In 1856, Jean THEISEN (with his family) and Nickalaus HOFFMANN's family moved west to St. Joseph, Minnesota where Nickalaus HOFFMANN was the first schoolteacher in the community. One THEISEN son, Nicolas, stayed in Ohio until 1859 before joining his relatives in Minnesota. "

Gretchen would like some information on the fate of Jean THEISEN's oldest daughter, Margaretha, she cannot find a marriage or death record on her in Luxembourg or in Ohio. The name HINNANT appears under various spellings in the Colonial records of North Carolina: in 1726 it's HENARD, in 1729 it's HENNANT, 1739 - HINARD, 1744, 1745 - HENNARD, 1761 - HINNAT, 1762 - HINNANT, all these various records found mostly in Edgecombe and Johnston counties of North Carolina, pertain to John HINNANT, direct ancestor of Frank HINNANT. John 's will was probated in November 1768 in Johnston Co., N.C., his children are listed as: Edea, Beathanea, James, John, Mary, Patience, William. Nothing is known about John HINNANT's ancestry, except that his father's name might have been Josiah, or William.

Mr. and Mrs. Frank HINNANT have been to European countries several times during the past few years.

name of HINNANT is in the LIEGE region of Belgium; however, the name HINNANT is spelled with only one N (HINANT). The HINNANTS have met a few Belgian HINANT families. One told them that according to a family story handed down through generations, one of their ancestors, Job HINNANT, gave-up and left Soumagne, 2 or 3 of his sons left for America and were never heard from again.
The HINNANTS are searching for records that will permit them to trace back their ancestor to his place of origin.

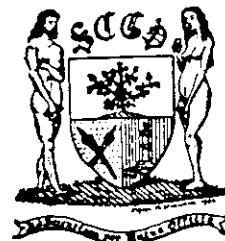

MIJN VOORoudERS TE NIEUWKERKEN-WAAS

16e - 17e EEUW

De naam Pudembrouc, waarvan de huidige vormen Van Puyenbroeck en Van Puymbroeck afgeleid zijn, komt voor het eerst voor op het einde der 13e eeuw. De uitspraak en de spelling van de naam hebben een gedurende evolutie ondergaan, bv. te Haasdonk, in 1390 Pudembrouc, in 1439 Pudembrouc, -bruke, -broec, in 1470 Pudembrouc, -broeck, in 1519 Puyenbroeck, in 1571 Puyenbroec. Ook andere vormen komen voor: Pumbrouc, Puenbroeck (1).

De oorsprong van de naam is ongetwijfeld een plaatsaanduiding. «Pul» kan een aanwijzing zijn voor een hoger gelegen plaats en «broeck», vaak voorkomend in aardrijkskundige namen, betekent drassig land.

Of «pude» en «pui» ook puit (kikker) of pad zou kunnen betekenen? Enkele aanduidingen wijzen in die richting. In 1403 zegelden Boudewijn en Jan, zonen van Boudewijn Van Pudembrouc, leenmannen van Jan Gillis Wauters zone, heer van Vrasene, de beschrijving van hun leen met een pad. In 1527 gebruikte Jan van Puenbroeck, voor het denombrement van zijn leen in Kemseke, een zelfde kenteken. Op 8 mei 1527 ten slotte zegelt Bauwen van Puymbrouck, fs Jan, de beschrijving van zijn leen te Vrasene eveneens met een puit en in de linkerbovenhoek een zespuntige ster (2).



In hoever mijn voorouderreeks — die aanvangt rond 1500 — wat te maken heeft met naamgenoten die in vroegere eeuwen bekendheid verwierven is nog lang niet uitgemaakt. Onder hen dient vernoemd te worden: *Heinric van Pudembrouc* die meesterkok was aan het hof van Lodewijk van Male (2de helft 14de eeuw) en te Brugge (St-Kruis) land verwierf.
