She isn't a descendant of Leon BAUDOUX, her grandparents were Dieudonne Alphonse BAUDOUX and Alphonsine Marie VANRIETTE who emigrated from Mont-sur-Marchienne, HT, in 1904 arriving March 4, 1904 in New York on the vessel "Finland". Alphonsine Marie VANRIETTE died in Colorado around 1908, her widower remarried a lady named Elvire DANDORF - they had a child, Alphonse born in Arna, Kansas. It is Betty's fondest wish to find all the descendants of Dieudonne Alphonse BAUDOUX. If you know of any, please let us know.

In regard to the Leon BAUDOUX search, he and his family, including a son born in 1891 in English Canada, were found in the 1900 census of Ward Township, Murray City, Hocking Co., Ohio, Leon is listed as a coal miner, owner of his house, naturalized; the problem is that his family couldn't be found in the 1910 census of that area... the search goes on.

Kewaunee Co., Wisconsin, (except towns of Franklin and Carlton) population, 1885: 13,786. Joseph WERY, democrat, of Darbellay, Kewaunee Co., was born in Belgium, Sept. 29, 1836; received a common school education in Belgium and is by occupation a farmer and dealer in general merchandise; came to Wisconsin in 1855 and settled in Darbellay, where he has ever since resided; was member of the county board in 1869, 70, 71, 73, 74 and 75; sheriff of Kewaunee Co. in 1877 and 78, and town clerk and justice of the peace from 1878 to the present time; elected to assembly in 1888 for 2 years, receiving 1,310 votes against 1,001 votes for Henry RUNKE, republican. (N.B. We found in the 1855 Antwerp passenger list that Joseph WERY, 19, left Antwerp on the Lochinvar, 15 Sept. 1855, for N.Y., he emigrated with his father, Pierre WERY, his mother Antoinette DEGREF, his sister Antoinette and his brothers Joseph and Charles, they were from Tourinnes-la-Grosse.)

Brown Co., The city of Green Bay and the towns of Allouez, Green Bay, Humboldt, Preble and Scott. Population 13,537. -First District -

Benjamin FONTAINE, republican, of Green Bay, Brown Co., was born Feb. 27, 1837, in Pietrebais, Bt, Belgium, received a common school education; is a hardware merchant, came to Wisconsin and settled in the town of Green Bay in 1855, and removed to the city of Green Bay in 1864; from 1860 to 1864 he lived in the town of Scott, Brown Co., and was town treasurer in 1863; was elected member of assembly for 1860, receiving 877 votes against 560 for Mr. RESCH, democrat.

(N.B. We found in the Antwerp 1855 passenger list, that Benjamin FONTAINE, left Antwerp for N.Y. on the Lochinvar, 14 March 1855, he emigrated with his father, Jean Henri FONTAINE, his mother, Marie Elis. VANDERELLS?, his brothers and sisters: Marie Therese, Antoine, Avele, Othille, Victor,) from Hanret.

7 Well aided, intelligent research, combined with help from Rene RENAUD and a tiny bit of the "luck of the Irish" (she also has Irish ancestors) has brought Sandra DOBBIE, 15 Ballymena Court, Don Mills, North York, Ontario M3C 2B6, Canada, MORE INFORMATION ABOUT THE VAN MALDER FAMILY, precisely about Arnold VAN MALDER, her ancestor's brother who died Sept. 25, 1830 during the Belgian uprising against the Dutch government. The following eulogy was found in "Journal de la Belgique" No. du 26 Octobre 1830.

"The day before yesterday, in the morning, two of Brussels' Volunteers were buried in St. Michel Square with full religious and military honors. One of the city guards, M. Lippens, offered the following eulogy: In this ground, lay for ever buried in the mist of so many brave men, the remains of our friends, Nicolas RENAUD and Arnold VAN MALDER; true friends, in more than one way they showed that friendship for them, wasn't a vain word. As military career officers, they distinguished themselves in the army, ARNAUD took part in the Vendee Campaign where his zeal and courage brought him to the attention of his superior officers. Our friend VAN MALDER took part in the Spanish campaigns where he displayed great bravery. And later, he fought with the Belgian troops in the battle of Waterloo where just like in his first campaigns he displayed great valor. When our Revolution exploted, both eagerly saw to its success, and when suddenly, monsters* dressed in Dutch uniforms, lead by another Nero, sought to invade and burn our beautiful capital, (ARNAUD and VAN MALDER) lit by a new enthusiasm, once more, bore arms against their country's enemies. It's during these memorable battles of September 24th, that our friend RENAUD died at the age of 58; luckier by a day, his brother-in-arms, VAN MALDER, died the next day, having seen a great number of these unworthy-to-be-called-men * enemies fall.

8 Lead robbed them of the joy of seeing our freedom triumph. Gentlemen, sacred reverence demands that we salute their memory, their exemplary display of courage has won them this right. A gate separate them from us, still, let's remember that they, better than anyone else were able to show their devotion to their country. Let's hope that those who survived them will remember with gratitude the sacrifice that they made for their country. The braved widows deserve that we intervene on their behalf to those who promised help and protection. However, before this sacred duty, the one that remains here for us to do, sadden us all. Yes, RENAUD, yes, VAN MALDER, if you could only be here, you would see true friends, their hearts heavy, gathered round your glorious remains, remembering you, ready, if they could only, to embrace you, once more, before you go to your eternal rest. May you hear our wishes! May you enjoy a peaceful rest and eternal reward that your good deeds entitle you to. Farewell RENAUD! Farewell VAN MALDER!

* these remarks were made in the heat of the moment, Belgians and Dutch are best of friends!

Most of the volunteers who died during the fight for Belgium's independence were buried in St. Michel Square, now known as Martyrs' Square.

In the "Carnet de la Fourragere, 9eme Serie, # 6, 1931, L. LECONTE in his "Notes sur les Chevaux-legers et les hussards belges" mentions: VAN MALDER, A., was admitted as lieutenant in the Belgian Light Cavalry brigade on 11 April 1815. (N.B. as a pensioned officer, VAN MALDER, Arnold, at the age of 41, 8 mos., 20 days, was killed in Brussels, on Royale St., 25 Sept. 1830 fighting the (Dutch) government troops, he was buried in St. Michel Square).

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Arnold VAN MALDER is also listed as having been an officer in the 5th Light Dragoon brigade which fought with the Allies army under the command of Wellington at Waterloo.

Another interesting document is the death notice that she received from the "Musée Royal de l'Armée et d'Histoire Militaire" of Brussels:

The Brothers and Sisters of Arnold VAN MALDER, announce his death. He was a retired officer and commander at Petit-Chateau where he died for his country on Sept. 25, 1830, at the age of 47. The funeral service will be held at Notre-Dame-de-Finis-Terræ (Finistere) parish church on Monday Oct. 25, 1830 at 11:00AM.

A hand copied death certificate issued by the City of Brussels Archives and found at the Musée. Written in Flemish. City of Bruxelles Archives, D 3239/1830 " Arnold VAN MALDER, retired, died on the 25th of the month of September, in the evening at 7 o'clock, in Royal Street, 47 years, 8 months and 22 days old, born in Brussels, living at Our-Dear-Lady-of-the-Snow Street, husband of Stephania Augusta BEMONT, son of Joseph VAN MALDER, no profession given, living at Pelican Street and of the deceased Maria HOVENIERS. Certified by John VAN MALDER, retired, 40 years old, and John Francis VANDENHOUTEN, paperhanger, 30 years old, both living in this city. "

The wonderful Toronto library had many books about Waterloo, one gave the order of battle for Wellington's army at Waterloo and lists the 5th Belgian Light Dragoons (VAN MALDER's regiment) under Major General VAN MERLEN. Another book has paintings of the uniforms of every regiment at Waterloo including the Belgian 5th Light Dragoons.

Sandra recommends an English written book about the Belgian Revolution: Revolt in the Netherlands, Brussels - 1830. by John W. Rooney, Jr.

It is published by Coronado Press, Box 3232, Lawrence, Kansas 66044. Paperback costs: US \$ 7.50 and Canadian \$ 12.95.

She further writes: "Speaking of books about Belgium available in English, I had some luck recently in a tour of Toronto second hand bookstores, picked up 2 very interesting books: "Waterloo Days" by Charlotte A. Eaton, published anonymously 1815, reprint edition 1888, published by Geo. Bell and Sons, London. Mrs. Eaton was a young, upperclass, unmarried Englishwoman, a tourist in Brussels immediately before, during and after Waterloo. She has all the appalling prejudices of an Englishwoman of her time and rank, including the happy faith that the British troops will save the day. But in spite of that, and allowing for her bias, it is an eyewitness account, it is in English and very readable. She visited the battlefield about 2 weeks after the battle and her comments on the souvenir hunters are very good.

"A Journal From Our Legation in Belgium" by Hugh Gibson, Secretary of the American Legation in Brussels, pub. by Doubleday, Page and Co., New York, 1917.

This is a diary of 1914-15, the first year of the first World War. The U.S. Legation very quickly became the only neutral Legation in Brussels and had to deal with the nationals of all other belligerent countries as well as their own American stranded tourists. So Gibson was moving about a lot, very involved, and saw a lot. The parallels between the two books are truly surprising - the atmosphere in Brussels and in both cases - the initial enormous confidence and gung-ho attitude of War as a great adventure".

Denise CORKE called to our attention that Mrs. Norma MEIER, North Maple St., Clifton, Ill. 60927, compiled the baptismal, marriage, burial, confirmation records of the St. John the Baptist Catholic Church of l'Erable, this book is marvelous, and is well worth the \$ 15.95 + \$ 2.00 postage that it costs;

by using it in conjunction with the population registers that Mary Ann DEFFNET sent us a while back, we are able to add a little bit more information to the census records.

CREVICOUR, Flavin, perhaps the CREVECOEUR, Florent, who died 14 Feb. 1871 in l'Erable, he was the widower of Caroline VANHOLDER. Julienne LECLAIRE was born 10 April 1858, daughter of J.B. LECLAIRE and Rosalie BRONNE. Eugene DACOSSE was born 16 Aug. 1858 to Gregory DACOSSE and Ferdinanda HUSKIN/HUSQUIN. OGARCH/OGARDI family is probably the HOUGARDY family, were they from Autre-Eglise ? BT Eugene DACOSSE, son of Francis DACOSSE and the late Marie Therese MERVELLE married on 12 Feb. 1861, Josephine DELHAUTE (DELHANTE ?) Francois DUCAT was married to Anne Jos. DUCAT, he died March 26, 1895. Eugene PETIT married 14 Jan 1868 Virgine PONTON, he was the son of Pierre PETIT and Marie COURTOS/COURTOIS. Clementin SCINTE is most likely the Clementin SENTE listed in Maleves Ste. Marie Wastinnes. His wife was a LIROUX.

Florent FRONVILLE married Rosalie PONTON, his sister, Mary Therese married Eugene ROBIN. It's possible that Mary Therese ROBIN's maiden name was LOUIS., Maximilien ROBIN married Louise VAILLANCOURT.

GLEUS (as spelled on Census) is most likely GEENS, Mary GEENS married 8 Nov. 1864 Francois FANIER. Same with the PASQUEEN family, it's actually the PASQUIN family.

LEONENGER is most likely LEMENAGER (Allen TASCHER's ancestor) he left Wastinnes in 1857, his son Francis (LEMANAGER on census) had left in 1856, Francis married Hortense AUCREMAUNE.

TO OUR CANADIAN MEMBERS, if you know of a McKUIIN genealogy, please contact us. We are searching for the place of origin in Canada (perhaps Kinston) of Ambrose McKUIIN who emigrated with his family to Erie Co., Pa. in 1868. The McKUIIN family changed their name to KOEN.

13 Belgian Laces has no intention of giving a detailed account of the BATTLE OF WATERLOO, we have to admit that we lack the expertise and necessary ambition to undertake such task - but a general overview of the situation is appropriate since some of our ancestors were directly involved and that most if not all were affected by the outcome of THE BATTLE OF WATERLOO (June 15, to June 18, 1815). The following lists just the main events. NAPOLEON escaped from Elba Island where he had been confined since his abdication in 1814, disembarking on French soil near Cannes on 1 MARCH 1815. Most of his former troops rallied to his side and with lightning speed advanced on Paris, reaching it on MARCH 20. Louis XVIII, King of France, had fled the day before. "Long live the Emperor" ? This perhaps, was the wish of the French people, but to the English people and their allies, whose forces were occupying Belgium and other European areas, their only wish was to send back the "devil" to where he belonged ! There could be NO PEACE, NAPOLEON was aware of that and had 2 options, to wait for the Allies' army to attack him on French soil, or for him to attack them on foreign soil - a man of action he chose the latter, quietly and speedily massing his army at the Belgian border. The Allies' army in Belgium was made-up of English, Scottish, Hanovrian, German, Dutch and Belgian troops. The Prussian-Saxon army under the command of General BLUCHER, was in the neighborhood and Russian and Austrian forces were expected. The Allies' army was under the command of WELLINGTON. If NAPOLEON was a master at strategies and tactics, it should be noted that WELLINGTON was a master in defensive actions. NAPOLEON's plan was simple: divide his army into 3 sections, one under the command of Field Marshal NEY to attack the Allies' Army, the other under the command of Field Marshal GROUCHY to attack the Prussian forces and to prevent them to join forces with WELLINGTON's army. The third section was the "reserve" under NAPOLEON's command, to be called

NEY's French cavalry is destroyed in taking over La-Haye-Sainte. WELLINGTON reinforces his threatened centre with his reserves. NAPOLEON's famous and never defeated IMPERIAL GUARDS attack and are seen retreating. This is the beginning of the end, BLUCHER's army is close by and WELLINGTON orders his troops to advance on the French forces which are crushed between the 2 armies near La-Haye-Sainte. It's 9:15 PM, JUNE 18, 1815, and the Allies and Prussians armies are victorious !! IF the lines of communications between NAPOLEON and his subordinate commanders had been better, IF the brave general BLUCHER had not come to the aid of WELLINGTON, the outcome of the BATTLE OF WATERLOO might have been otherwise. But IF NAPOLEON had been victorious, for sure Belgium would have been the theater of many more battles and most likely would never had been able to become an independent nation in 1830.

Do you know that a Belgian farmer by the name of DECOSTER had been "drafted" to serve as NAPOLEON's guide? That only a few of his officers deserted him but that none of his soldiers did ? That NAPOLEON underestimated WELLINGTON and BLUCHER, whom he had both defeated at one time or another ? That WELLINGTON distrusted the troops who had previously fought with the French, fearing that they might desert their units or join back with the French ? That GERALD BYLANDT's Belgian-Dutch troops were needlessly exposed and suffered great casualties ?

WELLINGTON chose the best defensive positions, deploying his troops to defend Brussels, his lines of supplies and communications and also a possible retreat route toward the North Sea. Forces deployed: Allies Army, abt. 110,000 men, including abt. 30,000 Belgian-Dutch men. Prussian-Saxon Army, abt. 117,000 men, for a total of 227,000 soldiers (again abt., numbers vary according to sources used). French Army, abt. 120,000 men. The French army was inferior in number, but superior in experience and skill. Forces engaged on Waterloo battlefield: abt. 72,000 men on each side, of which the French forces lost 56% and the Allies and Prussian forces 31%. A 3 days battle, a battlefield front of no more than 4 miles and 60,000 casualties ! Can words describe the horror ? the suffering, the fears of the fighting men ? The suffering of the population of that area ?

Thursday JUNE 15, 1815, 3:00 AM, NAPOLEON and his army are advancing on Charleroi, occupying that city 12 hours later. By night time he had succeeded in positioning his army between the Allies army and the Prussian army. JUNE 16, at 10:00AM, WELLINGTON arrives at Quatre-Bras, one of his outposts, held by the PRINCE OF ORANGE, one of his commanding officers. The French forces under the command of Marshal NEY attack Quatre-Bras, but doesn't succeed in overtaking it. JUNE 16, at 2:00 PM, Marshal GROUCHY and his French troops attack BLUCHER's Prussian army in Ligny, by 7:30 PM, BLUCHER's army is retreating toward Wavre. JUNE 17, at 7:30 AM, WELLINGTON orders a retreat from Quatre-Bras and takes defensive positions at Mont-St. Jean, south of Waterloo. JUNE 18, at 11:30 AM, the French forces attack Hougomont, an Allies outpost, they are driven back by the Nassau, Hanovrian/English units. And the brave General BLUCHER and his Prussian army is coming back to help the Allies' army and is threatening the French's right flank. NAPOLEON's infantry advances on WELLINGTON's positions and is defeated at the cost of 7,000 British, Dutch and Belgian lives.

15 One of the most illustrious names found in the history of Belgium and The Netherlands is that of Lamoral, Count d'Egmont and Prince of Gavre (Gavere, E.F.), a nobleman, born in La Hamalde (HT) in 1522. He was Commander of Flanders and State Councilor. He was also the winner of many battles against the French and certainly a hero in the eyes of his countrymen. Nonetheless, he was executed on June 5, 1568 as one of the leaders of the Low Countries's rebellion against Philippe II of Spain. Eventually the Northern Provinces seceded from the rest of the Low Countries - this was the beginning of The Netherlands as an independent nation (1579). The rest of the Low Countries, (except for the supposed to be neutral/independent Liege Principality) were known as the Spanish Low Countries or Belgium, and remained under Spaniard tyranny. Lamoral, Count d'EGMOND and Prince of GRAVE's descentance is well known and has been thoroughly studied or was it really ?

WHO WAS ANTHONY VAN EGMONT ?

One of the most illusive ancestry to trace has been that of Anthony van EGMONT, Dorothy Helmer's ancestor. From family tradition much is known about his life prior his emigration to the U.S., but so far, regardless of the tremendous amount of research done, little has been documented. Among the family papers a copy of a baptismal record* was found, it reads: High and Free Lordship of Gavre. Born 10 March 1778, baptized 19 March 1778, Count Anthony James William Gisbert Lamoral son of John Arnold Lamoral, Count d'EGMOND and Lord of GAVRE, Colonel in the Venatorum (Venator ?) regiment in the service of this region and drost of the region between the Meuse River and the Waal River (Netherlands area bordering Belgium) and of Maria Josephina Ludovica BLOOM of HULZEN and JONKERSTEEN. Godparents: Henry, Count of BYLAND and Caroline, Baroness of NYVEMHEIM. Signed: J.H. Cassamajor, Predie Gavre. Copy issued in 1799 and signed:..WYGAND ? WIJGAND ?

NO INFORMATION regarding the people listed above has ever been found in the regions mentioned .

16 Another interesting paper is that of an initiation certificate of the Masonic lodge "Fortitude" in London, England, issued to an Anthony Jacob William Gisbert van EGMOND. Research indicates that the lodge of Fortitude was dismantled around 1833, but that many Dutch names were found on the rolls of said lodge.

Family tradition states that Anthony became a soldier in the Dutch army and in 1794 was conscripted into the French Forces of Napoleon. This is probable, but it hasn't been documented.

Again among the family papers: the marriage record of "French Imperial Captain, Mr. Lamoral, Count of EGMONT and GAVRE, who on 14 Jan. 1808 married in Schierstein Evangelical Church (Germany), Maria Suzanna Elizabeth DIETZ, daughter of the late Konrad DIETZ, magistrate of the courts. Permissions (to get married) were granted by the Regiment Commander and Mayor von WEISEMAN."

Dorothy was able to have this record confirmed by the Evangelical Church in Schierstein, she also found the birth record in Mainz, Germany of John Sietrich Constant Lewis van EGMONT, son of Anthony and wife. A daughter, Anne Marie Susanna Caroline was born in Germany on 1 May 1810. She married 30 April 1830 Andrew HELMER in Ontario, she died 15 Nov. 1861. Another son, John Charles Frederick Marius Edward was born in Schluctern, Germany on 24 May 1812. According to family tradition he was named after 5 of Napoleon's officers.

There is also that passport, dated 6 Feb. 1813, indicating that Lamoral EGMONT, Captain, was carrying secret documents from Magdaburg to Mainz, accompanied by his wife and 3 children.

According the the General State Archives, The Hague, Netherlands, in May 1814, an A.J.W. Gyben EGMOND asked for employment with the Dutch government, and in June 1814, a recommendation for a person named G. van EGMOND, Captain in the regiment de la Tour d'Auvergne, was received by the Dutch Prince from Marechal de Camp, DESPERRIERES, who on 16 June 1814, bestowed the "Ordre du Lys" created by the Duke of Berry on 2 of Anthony's children, Constant, 6, and Edouard, 2.

Family tradition says that Anthony van EGMONT fought at Waterloo on the Dutch side and that he was transferred to BLUCHER's army. On 13 July 1817, a third son was born in Neuwied, Germany. He was named Leopold Philip Otto William van EGMONT.

On 23 Sept. 1819, the van EGMONT family arrived in the U.S. on the Brig "Unity", they settled in Indiana Co., Pa. On 11 Oct. 1819, Anthony signed papers in Philadelphia, stating that he was born in Nijmegen, Holland in 1778.

Around 1828, Anthony and his family (8 children) settled in Waterloo Co., Ontario, Canada, where he was involved in building a section of the Huron road, opening new lands to settlers. He was paid in part for his work with land, but never received the cash promised by the Canada Company. Many settlers were also ill treated. Nevertheless, Anthony van EGMONT prospered, but was very unhappy with the politics of the time. In 1837 he joined the MaCKENZIE rebellion, was captured and imprisoned. He died 5 Jan. 1838.

The Erie Observer quoted William Lyon MaCKENZIE as saying that " Colonel VAN EGMOND, an old soldier of Napoleon's army, and the proprietor of 13,000 acres of land in the Huron tract, joined us back in Toronto, an hour before our last battle, was taken prisoner, starved into sickness, sent to the hospital half-dead and is now under the clod. The colonel was a native of Holland and my particular friend".

After Anthony's death, his property was confiscated by the government and never returned, eventhough he was eventually pardoned for his participation in the rebellion. His wife lived to be 87, all of his children did quite well in life, his oldest son founded Egmondville.

A document that Dorothy received from

the French Army Record Center in Vincennes, France, lists a "Lamoral d'EGMONT, son of Ferdinand and Marie Therese CHUCHER born 24 Jan. 1771 in Gavre, Hollande , as # 1384 on the Regiment de la Tour d'Auvergne, and gives the following physical description: 1m79, (abt. 6ft.) round face, low forehead, blue eyes, ordinary nose, medium size mouth, medium size chin, brown hair, brown eyebrows. Arrived at the Regiment on 19 Brumaire An 14, was in the 2nd Battalion, 4th Co., 2nd Lieutenant on 1 May 1806, resigned 1 Jan. 1808."

Was this Anthony van EGMONT ? the information doesn't agree with that of the baptismal record as to the date, and the names of the parents.

Church records of Gavre/Gavere, EF, and Zottegem (where the EGMONT family had a castle) have been searched without success, same applies to the Nijmegen church records.

So the question remains WHO WAS ANTHONY VAN EGMONT, WHERE WAS HE BORN ? was he really "COUNT D'EGMONT at DE GRAVE ? It's obvious that he was an educated man, he must have known 4 languages: Dutch, French, German and English, his actions on behalf of his friends showed that he had a certain nobility of character. Is he a descendant of the famous Lamoral d'EGMOND ? At Lieven GORISSEN's suggestion we contacted Count de LIEDEKERKE, author of a book about the HOUSE OF GAVRE, he kindly did some research for us but wasn't able to find any informations about Anthony. Many "big names" of Belgium's genealogical circle have also joined in the search for Anthony's ascendancy, but so far without success. Researchers in the Netherlands are also baffled. The Mayor of Zottegem wrote that the d'EGMOND castle at the time of Anthony's birth was occupied by a DE CONNINCK family.

we direct our research to Austria to find informations about the Venator/Venatorum regiment of which Anthony's father was colonel. You have noticed that Anthony's copy of his baptismal certificate was signed by "WYGAND", or it just so happened that the 1860 Iroquois County census records list a town by the name of WYGANDOT, we asked Denise CORKE to find out after whom this town was named, and she came out with a lot of informations tracing back the WYGANDT family (also spelled WIGAND and WEYGANDT) to a John WIGAND born in 1523 in Mansfeld, Saxony.

A few years back, Dorothy HELMER went to the Netherlands and Belgium where she visited the Zottegem chapel where the famous Lamoral d'EGMONT's remains are exposed along with that of his wife and 2 sons, from the pictures that she took of the skeletons, which show that Lamoral must have been a big and strong man.

"FAMILLES DU PAYS D'ARLON/FAMILJEN AUS DEM ARELERLAUND" by the late Georges SCHWEITZER. This author introduced his work by writing that "The content of the following genealogical charts comes mostly from notaries'archives, gathered, filed and housed by and at the Archives de l'Etat at Arlon. Wills, deeds, transactions, rents, land ownerships, marriage contracts make-up the bulk of these records. The 185 files of the first 28 notaries of Arlon have been researched, from notary Bock to Notary Molitor, (1617-1754).

It was a long and difficult research, but rewarding because of the numerous unpublished informations found regarding that period. Nonwithstanding, in dealing with that type of research, it often happens that because of the poor state of the papers, or because the handwriting is difficult to read, a key word is missed and an interesting record is overlooked. The 1754 date as a limit was imposed in order to keep the whole research coherent, beside it overlaps the parish records. Use was made of some Court of Justice and family records. Some charts have only notarial records as sources of informations, these charts can be completed by further research in the parish or town records. Very seldom do notary records give birth or death dates, however, marriage contracts are numerous and rich in genealogical details. It is clear thatresearch that could have been made in the other numerous available sources were not attempted, these would complete or correct what is presented here. Following the main charts, there is a number of charts pertaining to small isolated groups which haven't been identified as belonging to one of the 3 major groups, these were included as a help for future research. Rarely have the lines of women been traced down. Also one shouldn't forget that many precious informations are for ever lost, because numerous notarial archives were destroyed by fire or by neglect before taken into custody by the Archives de l'Etat a Arlon. "EYSCHEN FAMILIES IN THE ARLON AREA.

Extensive genealogical research has identified 3 family groups by the name of EYSCHEN who do not seem to be related to each other. Up until now, only one was known (the third one) and there was doubt about its origin. To be continued.
