From Ted Cook: His ancestors Charles Coucke and Francisca De Meulemeester came from Flanders and settled in New Flanders, now Glen Hazel, Elk Co., Pa. The name Coucke was anglicized to Cook. Ted Cook is willing to help anyone with their research, he was kind enough to send us the very interesting following history of New Flanders and a list of Belgian people that appear in the 1850 U.S. Census of Elk Co., Pa.

Beer's History of Elk County 1890, (Film 824 400)  
 Page 679 New Flanders was once the settlement of a colony sent here by the Belgian Government. One Victor Deham conceived the idea of colonization in Elk County, and in 1846 he obtained a number of Belgian colonists by contract, and with Deham as leader, New Flanders was founded. But Deham had not carefully computed the cost of such an experiment, and in a brief period his money gave out, and the colonists, abandoning the enterprise, went to work elsewhere. Many descendants of these Belgians are still living in the county and are leading citizens. One old house, built in 1857, is all that remains of the old city of New Flanders.

Ted is planning a research trip this September, the trip will take him to Elk County. Best of luck to you Ted !

The Couckes arrived in New York the 20th of December 1849- the name of the ship was the Lorena.

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From Henry Verslype comes this very interesting account : " Travelling thru Wisconsin I noted a town named "Belgium" so made a slight change in my plans and visited it. I asked all the people I met; clerks, filling station attendants etc.. if they were Belgian or knew of any Belgians. None did. I then located the town clerk and asked him with no Belgians in town, how did it happen to be named " Belgium". He told me that when the city applied for a charter from the state they had requested the name Luxemburg, as most of the towns people were of Luxemburg descent and birth. However at just that same time another town asked for a charter and requested the name, Belgium, as most of its people were from Belgium or of Belgian descent. The State Secretary's office mixed up the two applications so that the town with the Belgian people is named Luxemburg and the town with the Luxemburgians is named Belgium.

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From Clifford Emmerling the following fascinating autobiographical notes that were prepared by his Grandfather Alois Joseph Janssens in 1966.

" Born in the town of Nieuwerkerken, province East Flanders, Belgium, June 21, 1866, I left the port of Antwerp, Belgium, 1893, arrived in Chicago, Ill. May 9, 1893, less than a month of 27 years old. Enlisted in the 15th U.S. Infantry (Regular Army) September 5th, 1893 as a bandsman and was stationed at Fort Sheridan, Illinois, for 3 1/2 years... took my discharge when the regiment moved to Ft. Baird, New Mexico, after taking a furlough for three months.

Worked as an attendant in the Iowa Institution for Mental delinquents at Clarinda until May 9th, 1897, then returned to Chicago where I enlisted in the 2nd National Guard of Illinois as a musician, made every Memorial parade as a Bandsman until June 19, 1917, after that with the 2nd Reg. National Guard veterans until I joined the American Legion, Logan Post 405, Chicago, and from then on made every Memorial day and was able to march in every parade from 1894 to 1963 (and will in 1964, too, I hope), every one on foot.

Mexican Border duty When President Wilson called the National Guard for duty, the 2nd Illinois, later the 132nd Inf, was immediately called and on June 21st, 1916 (my 50th Birthday) were sent to Springfield, Ill. to be sworn in the U.S. Federal Army for duty on the Mexican Border. I was with the band than as Assistant Bandmaster. We were mustered out of the Federal service and back to the U.S. National Guard, October 5, 1916 and I was discharged from the National Guard on account of dependent family April 30, 1917 ." To this Clifford adds that his grandfather died July 13, 1971 at the age of 105; he had 9 children, 31 grandchildren, 71 great grandchildren and 10 great-great-grandchildren; his grandfather received at various times Flemish language papers from Detroit, Mich. and Moline Ill. Clifford mentions that there was a large group of Belgians in Chicago, largely located around St. John Berchmans Church, which was considered a Belgian Parish. Another large group was in the Atkinson-Anawan farming area of western Illinois, with a large (around 1000 graves) cemetery in Atkinson.

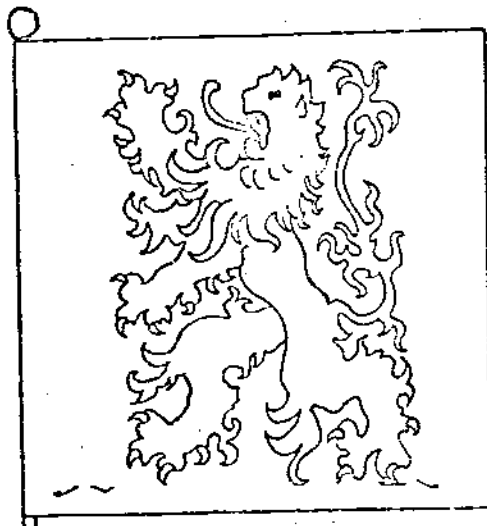

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Joan Siegert sent us an article written by Prof. Roland Breton and published in the FLAG QUARTERLY, Vol. 9, page 21.; This article is about the German-Speaking Areas of Belgium; the article states that German is spoken by about 58,000 inhabitants of Belgium, in the area called "Cantons Redimes" (redeemed districts) allotted to Belgium by the Treaty of Versailles. The Cantons Redimes include Malmedy and surrounding area which are mostly French speaking and the towns of Eupen and St. Vith which are German speaking. All the German-speaking towns are, under the 1962 laws which divided Belgium on the basis of language, considered as having French facilities, while the French-speaking towns have German facilities; this allows people the possibility of using their native tongue in court, etc. German is also spoken in the region of La Calamine. This German speaking area of Belgium is located in the Province of Liege. Actually Joan sent us 2 articles; the second one by the same author describes the Flemish Flag, emblem of the Flemish (or Dutch) speaking people, and the Walloon Flag emblem of the French and Walloon speaking people. (Does the French speaking people of the region of Brussels also have the Walloon Flag as an emblem ?)  
The Flemish people has for long used the Lion of Flanders as its emblem; it's a black lion with red tongue and claws on a golden field and it's exactly the opposite of the arms of Belgium : a golden lion with red

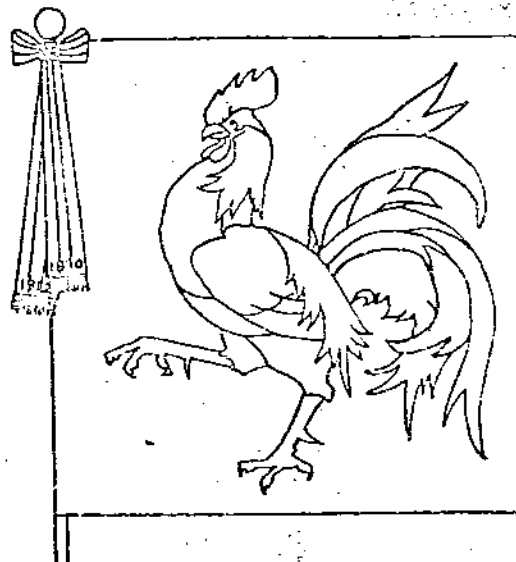
Attributes on a black field. We find the Flemish Lion in many Belgian city arms. (Ghent, Bruges, Nieuport, Veurne, Ouden/aerde and many more) The Wallons also felt the need for a distinctive emblem, and in 1913, adopted as their flag the red cock on a golden field, red and yellow being the colors of Liege, the capital of Wallonia, It's not exactly the French or Gallic Cock- which is singing head up and beak open, it's rather the bold cock (coq hardi) whose right foot is raised.

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PROVINCE OF LIEGE

Many thanks to Margot Hykes who has written the following account of her grandmother's early life in Liege.

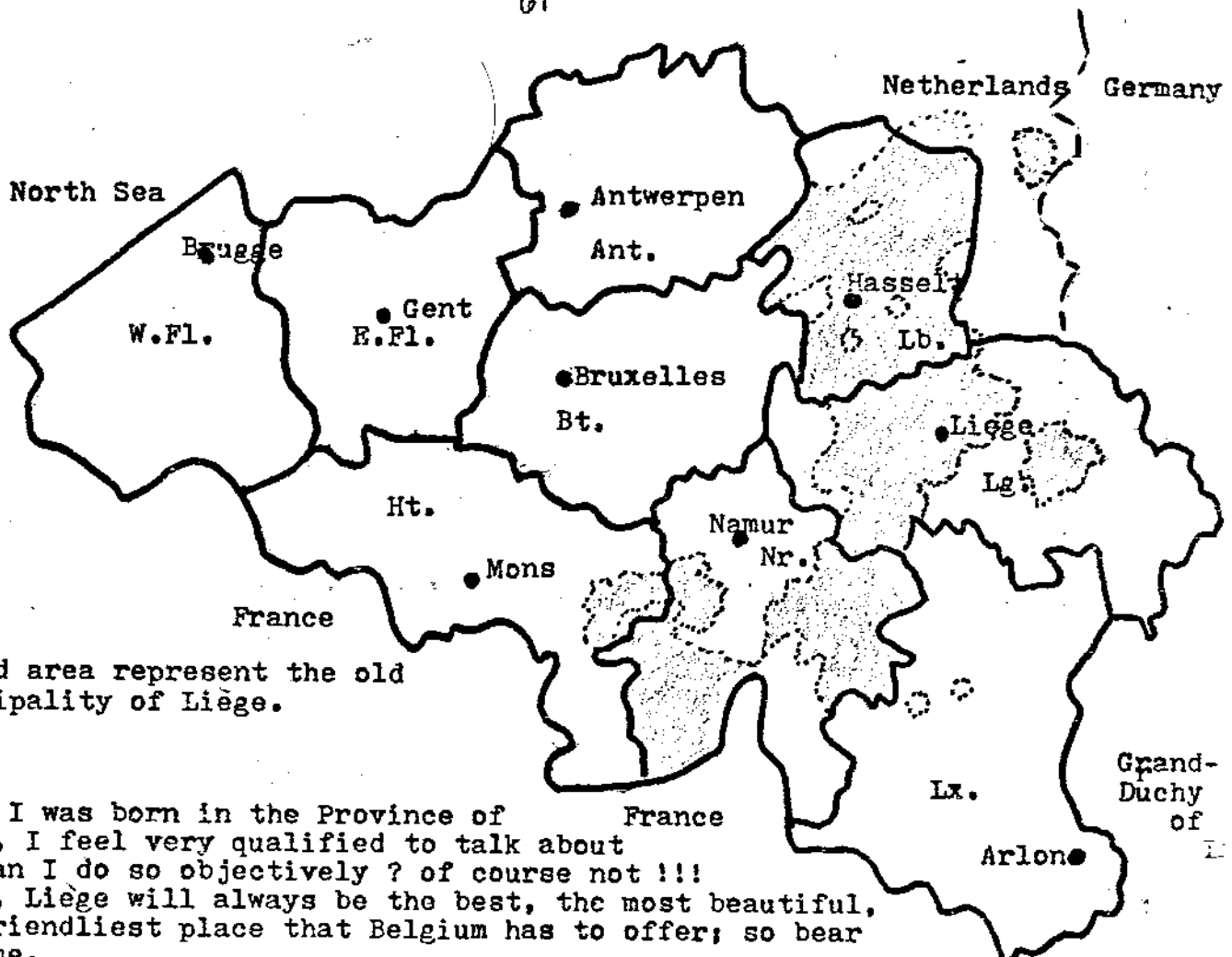
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My maternal grandmother, Marguerite Renoz, was born in Liege on 4 November 1856, the daughter of Ernest and Celine (Borgnet) Renoz. Her home, on the Rue du Pot d'Or at the corner of the Rue Tete-de-Boeuf, was located on part of the side of a ruined convent, part of the chapel of which was still identifiable in the cellar of the house. There was a rumor that, at some time of crisis, the nuns had buried valuables and then been forced to flee. This tale of "buried treasure" lent an aura of glamor to the property, and seems to have been frequently discussed, but no search was made, so whether this rumor was correct was never determined.

My grandmother, with the five brothers and sisters who survived infancy, seems to have had an enjoyable and interesting childhood, of which she used to tell us many stories. Two of her life-long interests were animals and music, and her childhood and girlhood featured much of both; a great variety of pets, and much music in the home. The family spent their summers in the suburbs of Liege; first at Embourg, and later at a property they owned at Angleur. There was much entertaining, and many relatives around, and her recollections of them very interesting and informative.

When Marguerite was about 20 years old, her father had financial reverses and the family moved away from Liege. She attended the " Conservatoire" in Brussels, with a view to going on the stage, but gave that up to marry Paul Hagemans in 1880. He was a career consul in the Belgian Consular Service, and consequently most of their married life was spent outside of Belgium. They were stationed in Russia for several years, and were transferred to the United States in about 1890, She died here in 1939.

Since I was born in the Province of Liège, I feel very qualified to talk about it; can I do so objectively ? of course not !!! To me, Liège will always be the best, the most beautiful, the friendliest place that Belgium has to offer; so bear with me.

When I reminisce about my youth in Belgium, it seems that we were pretty much an average working class family, neither rich nor poor; we always had food, clothing, shelter, and above all, and if I may quote President Spencer W. Kimball, " we always had everything that money couldn't buy" meaning love, attention, and of course, discipline. Many people have influenced my life, none more than my maternal grandparents; they were typical Liégeois (inhabitants of the Province of Liège), hard working, good hearted, with a keen sens of humor (especially my grandmother) and hardheadedness ( especially my grandfather). You know what ? it may sound silly, but here I am, almost 38, and still missing my grandparents !!! Does the feeling ever go away ?

Prior to the annexation of the Low Countries by France (1795) Liège had a different shape and a different name; it wasn't a Province, it was a Principality with an elongated body which followed pretty much the Meuse river bed. It was governed temporally and spiritually by a Prince-Bishop of the Roman Catholic Church. The first Bishop with the title of Prince was Notger (980), an energetic man, he saw to the prosperity of the region and soon it became a center of learning. Unfortunately many of his successors were less caring about Liège and sought only to fulfill their own selfish ambitions of power, unlimited power. That's when the troubles would begin, you see, the Liégeois, (inhabitants of the Principality) had democratic (al?) ideas in a feudal world; their impassioned quest for freedom would often pit them against their Prince-Bishops who they felt should be selected by the people or its representatives and not by some German Emperor or some French Duke. So, the history of Liège is full of the struggles and clashes between some of the Prince-Bishops and their supporters (powerful Houses of Europe) and the people and their supporters (the majority of the local nobility and clergy would actively support the people).

Rennequin Sualem, born in Jemeppe-sur-Meuse, Liège (1645-1708) invented and built the waterworks of Versailles, France.



Most of all the church and civil records of Liege are on microfilms; the genealogies of Nobility and important families of Liege are also on microfilms, see " Collections Lefort" (up until 17s.?) The military records are also on microfilms, I had good intentions to survey them, but because of a mistake I made I didn't receive the microfilm on time.

We hope that the descriptions of the records on the following pages will be of some help to someone. The one on this page " POPULATION REGISTERS " give many good informations on ancestors; I am not saying that they all look like this, or that they are always accurate; but that on all the Population Registers the same type of informations appear. This type of population registers started in 1846. The family here are actually my ancestors; since "all the records of Hermee had been destroyed " (it wasn't true) and that the townclerk waited 2 years before answering my letters; out of desperation, I checked the population registers of Heure-le-Romain, one town next to Hermee, and sure enough, my ancestors had lived there for 6 mos. and were recorded in the population registers, along with their place of birth and dates. I wrote to Arlon, (Lux.) which was the place of birth of my greatgrand-mother, in turn they send me photocopies of their population registers records pertaining to my ancestors. Of course the records are either in Flemish or in French, the titles are printed, the information is handwritten.

Some sad news from Belgium; those cone shaped containers full of french fries so dear to the Belgians, cost now 30 Belgian Francs, only a few years ago, they were 6 frs. Using ketchup on your fries ? why not try the Belgian way , a little bit of mayonnaise on the side of your plate ? or mustard, or gravy; and you may never go back to ketchup !!! Good french fries are cooked twice, 1) until tender, 2) in very hot oil until golden brown, (actually melted beef suet gives the best taste).

bold letters and are easy to read, the same cannot be said of the rest of the information; should you wish to check these types of records, arm yourselves with patience and good magnifying glasses. In these early years of Belgium's history as an independent nation and in that regiment, the soldiers from Luxembourg (for that time-period the Grand-Duchy would be included) are in majority; was it because of the poor economy of the time? are they so numerous among the other regiments?
