Annual meeting and reunion

The annual meeting and reunion of the Old Broad Bay Family History Association will be held Saturday, August 6th in the basement of the University of Maine Cooperative Extension, Knox and Lincoln Counties Office, 377 Manktown Road in Waldoboro. Doors will open at 9:00 a.m.; coffee, juice, and muffins will be provided. Parking is available around the back of the building, allowing direct access to the meeting room. Those who do not need direct access may park up front and walk around the building or enter through the front door and proceed down the stairway to the right.

Lunch, to be served between noon and 1:30 p.m., will be a guided potluck. A sign up sheet for the lunch is printed on page 7 of this newsletter as part of the reunion registration form. The keynote speaker will be announced in the next newsletter.

Manktown Road is located on the Lincoln/Knox County & Waldoboro/Warren town line and makes a T intersection with Route 1. There is no street sign, but there is a new, very large sign for the Medomak Valley High School. There is a blue sign for the school along with a white

sign for the University of Maine Cooperative Extension Service on the right side of Route 1 about 500 feet before the intersection.

Fund raiser dance

This OBB fund raiser will be held at the University of Maine Cooperative Extension, Knox and Lincoln Counties Office and will be open to the public. Finding our Waldoboro ships

Most of our ancestors worked in the shipping industry in one form or another. Whether they were builders, joiners, riggers, or mariners, they contributed to the building of more than 500 ships. At one time there were as many as twelve shipyards in Waldoboro employing almost everyone in town.

Those ships sailed the high seas for decades, sometimes finding themselves as far from home as Australia. For example, on 16 October 1845 the schooner *Piedmont* (built in 1844) arrived at Corpus Christi, Texas with supplies in aid of Zachary Taylor s encampment. Also, many of our ships are recorded as bringing immigrants to Boston from such far-flung places as Ireland, France, and Germany.

The ships were built by our ancestors buying shares in the ship to finance the venture. When the ships delivered their cargo, everyone shared in the wealth; everyone also shared in the loss when the

ships were damaged or sunk. Many of the ships, at one time or another, were struck by lightening, burning the sails to the deck. I guess we can say we had some courageous mariners in our families. It is a heritage we can all be proud of.

Lincoln County newspaper list, an update

The editor is pleased to be able to give credit to Nancy Giles, County Clerk for Lincoln County, for preparing the original list of newspapers on microfilm which was reproduced in our last newsletter.

Randy Gross has inventoried the original paper newspapers in the vault. As expected, all the newspapers available on microfilm, are present in original form; however, due to their fragile condition, only the microfilms may be used.

Lincoln County archival vault update

The general inventory of the vault was completed in late January and copies of the two reports were given to Marcia Silva, Lincoln County Registrar of Deeds, in early February. The next phase of the project, the detailed inventory, will require several volunteers both in the vault and later at home to do data entry and to check it. Work on the vault inventory has been reported in the Lincoln County News (20 January 2005, p. 12 B), and the Lincoln County Weekly (27 January 2005) as part of the annual report by the Registry of Deeds, and in Marlene Groves genealogy column in the Rockland Courier-Gazette (3 February 2005). Editor Helen Shaw also presented information on the project as part of her talk on courthouse records at the 8th New England Regional Genealogical Conference in Portland on April 1st.

Waldoboro Day

There will be music, food, a petting zoo of farm animals, horse-drawn wagon rides, a parade, boating on the Medomak River, a jazz concert, and fireworks that night. Please type (or print very neatly) the information and use a highlighter to mark those surnames which are from Old Broad Bay. Documentation for the information on the chart(s) must be provided. It may be typed or printed on the back of the form using the number assigned to each person on the pedigree to link the documentation to the proper person or it may be generated by your software.
