Revolutionary War pension records in the Lincoln County vault

The Pension Act of March 18, 1818 provided for the payment of pensions to all persons who served in the Revolutionary War for a term of nine months or longer and who could prove ...by reason of his reduced circumstances in life, shall be in need of assistance from his Country for support,... The law was re-written in 1820 and many who were not deemed to be in need were removed from the pension rolls. During the summer of 1820, 179 men came to the Circuit Court of Common Pleas in Wiscasset to declare the value of their property. The names of these men are recorded in Common Pleas record book 1820 on page 184. The men came from all parts of Lincoln County.

In addition to Common Pleas record books, the archival vault in the Lincoln County Courthouse contains an archival box of original Revolutionary War pension records dating from 1820 to about 1823. When these documents were first examined, it was assumed that they were the forms filled out by the 179 men who were listed in the Common Pleas book. Further inspection of these documents proved this assumption was in error. There is some overlap between the documents and the pension list, but a closer inspection of the entire archival box will be needed to determine its exact contents and correlation to the pension list. A very preliminary search of the NARA Revolutionary War pension records (available on-line through Heritage Quest) indicates there are pension forms in Wiscasset which are not in the NARA database. This research continues.

Below is an alphabetical list of the 179 men listed in the Common Pleas 1820 record book. The list includes each man s number on the list, name, town of residence, and property value. Men with numbers 1-99 were present at the 20 June 1820 court session (number 100 was not assigned). Numbers 101-168 were in court 11 July; numbers 168-172 were in court 25 July; numbers 173-180 were in court 8 August.

An early version of this list was found in the archival box with the pension documents, but it was found to have spelling errors. The spelling of some names had been changed to match the current or more common form. This list corrects those errors. Also, the original list in the Common Pleas book does not include town of residence. That information appears on the pension documents. This would imply that every man on the list has at least one pension document somewhere in the file. It is not known who put the town names on the early version of the list.

Why documentation?

By now, all our members should be aware of our association s motto: To Search and to Share. In furtherance of this goal your leaders have enunciated several goals, one of which is to upgrade the focus of the organization from recreational at least to semi-professional. Thus the article reprinted on the next page is presented, not because the Blake family has anything to do with mid-coast Maine, but because it is a fine example of proper documentation.

It is fun and exciting to play detective and pursue the hunt for elusive ancestors. It is more like donkey work to cite your sources and write down carefully the data needed in order to authenticate your research. But it is essential to do so so that future investigators will not have to replicate your work.

When you submit the results of your research to OBBFHA s archives, please use Mr. Helliwell as a model. If you chose not to follow the Register Format of the New England Historical Genealogical Society, then use that approved by the National Genealogical Society. These are the only two formats approved by serious workers.

Ernest Hyde Helliwell, III

The identity of Hannah, the wife of John³ Blake of Dorchester, Massachusetts, has been a subject for speculation for some time. Although Clarence Almon Torrey recorded her maiden name as unknown, it is actually quite easily determined from readily available printed records. Here is Torrey's account of John Blake (he has no entry for Hopestill Humphrey[s] and Hannah):

BLAKE, John (1657-1718) & 1/wf? 2/wf Hannah___(1662-6 May 1729, in 67th y, 1722?, 1731?), nr/2 Hopestill HUMPHREYS 1719; by 1687, by 1693; Dorchester. [1]

Torrey's account indicates conflicting statements in his sources concerning the number of wives of John Blake^[2] and the death year of Hannah Humphrey, including speculation that she might even have survived her second husband.^[3] In fact, the date of death for Hannah Humphrey can be definitely determined. Her gravestone inscription in the First Burying Ground in Dorchester reads:

Here Lyes ye Body of/ Mrs Hannah Humfrey/ wife to Mr Hopestill/ Humfrey, who Died/ May ye 16th 1729/ in ye 67 Year of/ her age/ Note she was formal/ly [sic] ye wife of Dea/con John Blake. [4]

This inscription is given in an abbreviated form in the *Vital Records of the Town of Dorchester 1826-1849*,^[5] and her date of death is in agreement with the vital records^[6] and the church records.^[7] It is also supported by the 10 October 1728 will of Hopes:ill Humphrey, in which he refers to his wife Hannah as living:

Wife of John Blake of Dorchester

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Item. I give to my loving wife Hannah Humfrey Ten pounds, in Province Bills to supply her with mourning apparel as she shall see occasion. Also my silver speon marked two H.H. above and besides what I have promised and given by contract before marriage to her [8]

The entry in the church records also provides the following critical piece of information, which leads to Hannah's positive identification (underline added for emphasis):

[1729] May 16. mrs Humfry daughter of Deacon Capen dyed. Aged & P.ous. [9]

There was only one "Deacon Capen" of the right age to whom this could refer, namely, Deacon John² Capen of Dorchester. Therefore, Hannah³ Capen, born Dorchester 1 October 1662,^[10] daughter of Deacon John² (Bernara¹) and Mary (Bass) Capen,^[11] married first, before 26 April 1687,^[12] John³ Blake, born at Dorchester 16 March 1656/7,^[13] died there 2 March 1717/8 age 61,^[14] son of James² (William¹) and Elizabeth (Clapp) Blake,^[15]

Hannah (Capen) Blake married second at Dorchester 14 January 1719/20, ^[16] as his second wife, ^[17] Hopestill³ Humphrey, baptized at Dorchester 10 June 1649, ^[18] died there 22 March 1730/1 in his 82nd year, ^[19] son of James² (Jonas¹) and Mary (_____) Humphrey. ^[20] Hannah died at Dorchester 16 May 1729 in her 67th year.

² No evidence of a first wife has been found. John Blake had seven children, born at Dorchester between 1687 and 1700 with no evident breaks ([Twenty-First] Report of the Record Commissioners of the City of Beston Containing Dorchester Births, Marriages, and Deaths to the End of 1825 [Boston: Rockwell & Churchill, 1891], 32, 34, 35, 37, 40, 42, 44). The birth records show no mother for the first three children, but before 1691 the mother's name was rarely given in these records. The baptismal records for these children never give the mother's name (Records of the First Church at Dorchester in New England, 1636-1734 [Boston: George H. Ellis, 1891], 199, 200, 202, 205, 209, 211).

³ Her gravestone inscription is given in the *Register* at 5 (1851):235 with her year of death as 1722. Her second husband died in 1731.
