OBBFHA annual meeting and reunion report

The annual meeting and reunion of the Old Broad Bay Family History Association was held Saturday, August 1 at the University of Maine Cooperative Extension, Knox and Lincoln Counties Office in Waldoboro.

Some 25 members attended the meeting, including folks from Illinois and California. Family stories and information flowed throughout the day and a good time was had by all.

Our speaker this year was archeologist Timothy Dinsmore, who told us about his search for a late 17th century homestead on the river near Damariscotta and the archeological dig he conducted there.

Members agreed that money from the Jasper Stahl Memorial Fund should be donated to the Lincoln County Registry of Deeds for the restoration and preservation of the 1815 Robinson map of Waldoboro. [See separate article below.]

Dear Friends and Fellow Members:

The Old Broad Bay Family History Association held its annual meeting on Saturday, August 1st, 2009. This year's meeting was an outstanding success! Our guest speaker was Tim Dinsmore, a local archaeologist and historian, who gave an interesting presentation about his research and archaeological excavations on a 17th century homestead of the Damariscotta River. Our thanks to Tim for such a fine presentation!

In regard to association business, the current officers and Board of Directors were re-elected to another two year term. Treasurer Bill Conary submitted his annual financial report and the Association's financial health is rapidly improving thanks to Bill's capable management. As proposed last year, the Association has created the Jasper J. Stahl Memorial Fund. The fund will provide financial grants to support local projects in genealogical and historical preservation. [See the Summer 2009 newsletter for grant criteria & details.] Our first grant will be to fund the restoration and preservation of the 1815 Robinson map of Waldoboro held by the Registrar of Deeds in Wiscasset. This map is an invaluable resource for local historians because it shows in detail where the early settlers lived and the size of their plots. Bill Conary and I have compiled an index for the map.

The most important part of the annual meeting is the exchange of information and research that goes on between those folks attending the meeting. Once again this year, this was the most lively part of the meeting. We had folks attending from as far away as California, Texas, and Illinois. It was heartening to see such enthusiastic interest in Waldoboro history! I would also like to thank Helen Shaw, Ruth Riopell, June Hussiere, and Deirdre Putnam for their many efforts in making this year's meeting such a success.

In closing, let me extend to you a heartfelt invitation to next year's annual meeting. Preparations have already begun and we would love to see you there.

Waldoboro 1815 map restoration donations welcome

Information has been received from Rebecca Wotton regarding the cost for the restoration of the 1815 Robinson map. [See article about the map in the Spring 2009 issue of the OBBFHA Newsletter.] Estimates for two outcomes were provided. In both cases the cost includes removing all the modern tape, cleaning, flattening, de-acidifying, and backing the map with acid free Japanese tissue for support: (1) enclosure in a clear, 4 mil, archival envelope, \$1,575, (2) placement in an archival frame, \$2,250

Your Board of Directors has selected the restoration of this map as the first project for the Jasper J. Stahl Memorial Fund. There is presently \$400 pledged to the restoration. Members who would like to donate to the restoration project may send checks made out to OBBFHA to Treasurer William Conary (9 Hilltop Rd, Plaistow, NH 04865) with a note in the lower left corner that the money is for

map restoration. Please note that OBBFHA is not a 501c3 and thus donations are not tax deductible.

Family Surname Timelines on Google

Eastman s on-line Genealogy Newsletter, 13 October 2009

W. David Samuelsen told me of a neat trick that was news to me: you can find family surname timelines on Google. In fact, it only takes a second or two to find timelines of events involving your family name.

To find a timeline, go to http://www.google.com and enter the following: surname family history

The only thing is you have to substitute the surname of interest in place of the word "surname" in the above example. For instance, to find timelines of my family name, I had to enter: Eastman family history

Next, Google will display all sorts of "hits" and, if you scroll down a bit, you will see timelines. In my case, I had to scroll to the bottom of the first page to see anything about timelines and then I clicked on "More timeline results." Depending how popular your surname is, you may have to scroll down even further.

The timeline I saw shows all sorts of historical events involving people with the same surname as my own. A blue timeline shows how many "hits" occurred for certain years and then the events themselves are listed below the timeline in typical Google fashion.

In looking at the Eastman timeline, I found quite a few "events" in recent years from some fellow who writes a genealogy newsletter.

I then tried my mother's maiden name which is very rare: Deabay. The only people I have ever found of that name have always been close relatives. The timeline didn't have very many events but the listings below the timeline had lots of facts, many of which I had not seen before.

I was amazed to find a 1952 newspaper account of my uncle's being shot in the Korean War (he survived). I knew he was a combat veteran but didn't know he had been seriously wounded. I also read a few family obituaries as well as reports of several marriages, even those where a cousin served as bridesmaid or best man or usher.

This can be a great resource when you have exhausted other possibilities. Of course, you can search for the names on Google at anytime but the timelines add quite a bit of visual help.
