### A brief history of the OBBFHA

The origin of the Old Broad Bay Family History Association was the Broad Bay Roots Project which was announced in January 1992 by W. W. "Will" Whitaker and Gary Horlacher as an effort to research the origins of "the nearly 150 families that made up the German emigrants to Waldo's Patent at Old Broad Bay (Waldoboro)."

On 27 August 1992 Richard L. Castner called together a group of descendants of the German settlers and others interested in Waldoboro history at the Friendship Community Center with the goal of holding a "convention/seminar/reunion" the first weekend in August 1993. Some of the people present at this meeting were: Richard L. Castner, Michael Uhl, David L. Achorn, Mark A. Benner, Kitty Fassett, Ann & Hollis Flewelling, Rev. Helmut Lehmann, Renee A. Seiders, Diane Overlock Sewell, Jac. R. Shaw, Virginia V. Sides, William O. Travers, and Richard D. Warner. On 2 November 1992 a press release was sent out announcing the "Broad Bay Family History Project Launched" and the first two projects to be undertaken: (1) a registry of Broad Bay families and (2) to organize events for a gathering in August 1993.

The first official meeting of the new organization was held on 1 August 1993 at the Old German Church in Waldoboro. The following officers were elected to serve one-year terms:

A list of charter members was published in the July-September 1994 (vol. 3, No. 3) issue of *Bund und Blatt* with an updated list in the October-December issue. Charter members were those who joined the project (and paid dues) up to and including the 1994 reunion; they numbered 154. A second updated list was published in the January-March *Bund und Blatt*. This issue is the first to have the banner "The Official Publication of the Old Broad Bay Family History Association" though no article has been found in any issue as to when the name of the organization changed from "Project" to "Association."

The official publication of the Project/Association, Broad Bay Bund und Blatt, was published from

1992 to mid-year 2000. The first issue (January 1992) included a list of the surnames of early German settlers. This list of names has been printed in various forms and with a wide variety of names on many a back page of *Bund und Blatt* and the later OBBFHA newsletter. While this list now appears on the OBBFHA web page, it has not been published in the newsletter for several years. At the August 2000 annual meeting, a vote of the members changed the name of the publication to *Old Broad Bay Family History Association Newsletter*. Ann Hart was hired to be the editor. By Spring 2003 the search had begun for a new editor. Helen Shaw took up the baton and published the Fall 2003 newsletter using material left in the editorial file. Due to irregularities in the newsletter numbering system and format, it was decided to start over again with a New Series. The new format was eight pages published quarterly; the first issue was Winter [January] 2004 (NS volume 1, No. 1) with Spring [April], Summer [July], and Fall [October] issues to follow. Additionally, each Winter edition included an every name index to the previous year. As time went on these annual indexes were combined into one master index which can now be accessed on the Association's website. The master index is updated every spring. New to the website this summer is a table of contents index to *Broad Bay Bund und Blatt*. It is hoped that an every name index will came by the end of the year.

#### On the evaluation of sources

Some members might be concerned that this editor has published a manuscript that lacks detailed sources for each bit of information and in truth one would like to be able to publish only family history that is so documented. However, a couple of years ago Dick Eastman, and more recently *On Board, the Newsletter of the Board for Certification of Genealogists* (May 2012), published articles on the usefulness of undocumented (or poorly documented) information. The two articles in *On* 

*Board* are particularly informative and should be read by those interested in gaining access to all possible clues about their ancestors' history. These articles are: "Perils of Source Snobbery," by Thomas W. Jones, PhD, CG, CGL (pp. 9,10,15) and "Data Analysis" by Stefani Evans, CG (pp. 12-13).

Balthasar "Wilabus" **Kastner** and wife Augustine "Justine" -?-.

- (1) Sophia Salome **Kastner** (b 1734, Germany). Her 1<sup>st</sup> husband Johann Georg **Lachenauer** (d 1757, Broad Bay). Her 2<sup>nd</sup> husband Johann Friedrich **Küüntzel** (b 1737, Germany). John, Sophia, and their two sons left Broad Bay and arrived at the Moravian settlement in Friedland in 1770.
  - (a) Elisabeth Küüntzel b 1759, Broad Bay; husband Philip Kroehn b 1755
  - (b) Anna Maria "Mollie" **Küüntzel** b 1761, Broad Bay; husband Georg Michael **Vogler** b 1759, Broad Bay
  - (c) Charles Christopher Küüntzel b January 27, 1765, Broad Bay
- (2) Johann Anton **Kastner** b 1743, Germany. His 1<sup>st</sup> wife was Gottliebe **Isel** bc 1746, Germany, d 1773, Friedland. His 2<sup>nd</sup> wife was Maria **Spach** (no Broad Bay affiliation). His 3<sup>rd</sup> wife was Jacobina **Schneider** b 1782, Broad Bay. The Moravian diaries reported that Anton and Gottliebe (**Isle**) **Kastner** arrived in North Carolina in 1769 with their young son, Johann Anton. Gottliebe died in childbirth in April 1773, apparently losing her baby as well. In 1777, following the death of Anton **Kastner**'s second wife, Maria **Spach**, her parents Adam and Elisabeth **Spach** took the two children into their care, named in the Moravian diaries as Maria Gottliebe and Christina **Kastner**. Friedrich **Kuenzel** and his wife took the son Heinrich Gottlieb **Kastner**.

Johann and Jacobina were married in October 1778 in North Carolina. Jacobina was a daughter of Melchior and Jacobina (**Doerfler / Doerflinger**) Schneider who were also Broad Bay settlers who had gone to North Carolina. [see entry below]

Johann Jacob **Lauer** b September 23, 1721, Germany; wife Eva –?– bc 1730, Germany. Johann, Eva, and daughter moved from Broad Bay to Friedland in 1770.

Johann Georg **Reid** b Germany and wife Mary Magdalena **Eichorn** of Landensteinbach b Germany. Johann, Magdalena, and son Jacob came to Broad Bay from Germany in 1752.

(1) Jacob **Reid** b December 6, 1735, Germany. His wife was Elizabeth Barbara **Rominger**, b October 13, 1741. Jacob and Elizabeth were married at Broad Bay about 1760. They left Broad Bay and arrived in the Moravian settlement at Friedland on December 31, 1770. Jacob was one of the signers of the Brotherly Agreement that formed the Friedland Society in 1771. Most of

their children died young in Friedland.

Melchior **Schneider** b April 12, 1717, Germany (to Friedland). His wife was Jacobina **Doerfler** / **Doerflinger** b March 31, 1723, Germany (to Friedland). Melchior and Jacobina were married on the *Lydia* in 1742 enroute to Broad Bay. Jacobina was traveling with her parents, Johannes and Rosina **Doerflinger**, and her two sisters. Melchior and Jacobina and their family left Broad Bay for the Moravian settlement in North Carolina in 1770.

### 2012 Jasper J Stahl Award

At the meeting of the Association's executive board on Saturday, June 16th, Cynthia Wallace of Waldoboro was presented with a check from the Jasper J. Stahl Memorial Fund and a certificate of recognition. The event was held at the Waldoboro Public Library.

Ms Wallace was honored for the teaching of history and genealogy in her third grade class at Friendship Village School. Ms Wallace began teaching in Friendship in 1985 and has been the third grade teacher at that school since 1995. She has expanded her students' horizons by encouraging in depth studies of their family history and the history of their town. Her efforts have resulted in a continued interest in history by many of her students. One has gone on to place first in the state in the American History Essay Contest sponsored by the Daughters of the American Revolution and several others have placed first in the state essay contest sponsored by the Society of Mayflower Descendants in the State of Maine.

Whenever there are Waldoboro students in her class, Ms. Wallace encourages them to investigate the history of Waldoboro. Until July 10, two projects by Ms Wallace's students are on display at the Waldoboro Public Library. Both of these projects are from former students who live in Waldoboro.

## **Membership**

The Old Broad Bay Family History Association is a group of people interested in studying and maintaining the history of the founding families, and in particular the founding German families, of what is now Waldoboro, Lincoln County, Maine.

There are three types of membership: individual, family, and library. An individual membership confers the right to one vote at OBBFHA meetings. A family membership confers the right to two votes. A library membership is solely for the purpose of allowing distribution of the newsletter to libraries and historical societies and confers no right to vote.

The membership year is July 1 to June 30. The newsletter is issued three times a year, in April (Spring), July (Summer), and October (Fall) with a fourth (January / Winter) issue when there is enough material.
