It's never too early to plan your genealogy vacations. Starting off 2013 will be the Maine Genealogical Society spring workshop on **Saturday, April 13**, at the Augusta Civic Center. The speaker will be Helen Shaw, CGsm who will present four talks on US census records.

Followed quickly is the New England Regional Genealogical Consortium (NERGC) Conference in Manchester, NH, **April 17 to 21**. Helen Shaw, CGsm will present a talk on German settlers in Maine as the sponsored speaker for the Maine Genealogical Society.

Later in the year, on **Saturday, September 21**, will be the Maine Genealogical Society annual conference at Jeff's Catering in Brewer. The featured speaker will be Laura Prescott. Her keynote

address will be "How the Internet Makes Us Sloppy Genealogists." The full schedule will appear in a later newsletter.

Furthering your genealogical skills

Conferences like the ones listed above are a good way to learn about new technology and research methods as well as tried & true techniques for your genealogy research, but if you can afford the time and cost, there are now four week-long institutes for advancing your genealogical education. The opportunities to network with genealogists across the country are a bonus to the class work.

- 1. National Institute on Genealogical Research (NIGR): This institute is held at the National Archives in Washington and College Park, MD and focuses on federal records.

2. Institute of Genealogy and Historical Research (IGHR): This institute is held at Samford University in Birmingham, Alabama.

Registration is via timed intervals on the internet; registration for 2013 classes opens on Tuesday, January 22, at 11:00 a.m. Eastern time. Most of these classes fill up in minutes; you must be prepared ahead of time to complete the (very long) registration form as quickly as possible. [You can print off a copy of the application form ahead of time so you have the necessary information ready on registration day, but be aware that the form may not match exactly the final one you have to fill out!] While you can send in a check after your registration is accepted, putting the fee(s) on your credit card is a reassurance that all is taken care of. There are wait lists for each class if you

don't succeed during the registration interval.
