Waldoboro Loyalists

Commonly called Tories during the Revolution

Reprinted from the Lincoln County News, January 23, 1896, page 1

After Reverend Jacob Bailey, who, at the time of the war of the Revolution was Loyalist, or Tory, went to Halifax in 1779, among others to whom he wrote in a letter to General McLean, then commanding at Majabaggaduce (now Castine). The English then held Penobscot, and some of Bailey's friends were there. In this special letter, dated July 16, 1779, he says. "Since it was my fortune to be an itinerant missionary for nineteen year as on the eastern frontiers of New England, especially in the districts on the Kennebec River, I hope you will not esteem it altogether impertinent to address you in this manner. My employment gave me an opportunity of obtaining a knowledge of the country, and of the connections, and behavior of its inhabitants, and I humbly presume that your attention to the enclosed may conduce in some measure to promote his majesty's service."

Then follows a list of 160 names of prominent settlers along the coast and on the Kennebec River who were loyalists, besides many whom he does not mention by name. At Bristol and Broad Bay, he gives the following:

Benjamin Palmer, Nathaniel Palmer & son, Cornelius Rhodes & son, John Martin, Dr. Martin Shepard, Michael Sprague & 2 sons, Capt. David Vinal, Peter Cremor & 2 sons, George Cremor, George Young, George Light, Briggs Turner, Cornelius Turner, Robert Turner, Robert Turner, Alexander Turner, Jonas Fitch, Jonathan Jones, Rodolph Gier, Mr. Cyder?, Mr. Umberhind. And in general all the Dutch families in Broadbay except ten or twelve families.

Mr. Bailey made the very common error, then and now, of calling the German people Dutch. In addition to the above, he gives a list of those in Woolwich, Georgetown, Pownalboro, and in parts of Lincoln County then without the bounds of any town, of whom Capt. Waterman, St. Georges (now Thomaston) was one; and he encloses the letter by affirming that if Brigadier Charles Cushing, Justices James Howard, Joseph North, Jonathan Bowman, Nathaniel Thwing, and Colonels McCobb and Jones were removed or expelled the country " I am fully convinced there would be no opposition to British government in the county of Lincoln".

A CHRISTMAS PIE

Lincoln County News - December 27, 1923 (reprint)

Little "John Acorn" will never go back on The Pie Belt in which he was born:

He is known to have said ---

With a wag of his head ----

While eating one Christmas morn ---

"This is the best pie that was ever made by my mother or my grandmother!"

And here is what he was talking about ----

1 cup ground Boston Crackers, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup molasses, 1/3 cup vinegar and lemon juice equal parts, 1 cup water, 3/4 cup melted butter, 2 eggs, 1/4 teaspoon cloves, 3/4 teaspoon cassia, 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg, to taste, 1 cup whole raisins, soak over night in cup of cold water, then boil five minutes, (mix all together).

An innocent Yankee mince pie, one for either young or old, a pie unlike any other, one that in spite of the ground Boston Crackers wit which it begins, and because of the whole raisins with which it ends must take rank among the best very made.

For the crust _ 1 cup pastry flour, 1/3 cup shortening, 1/2 small teaspoon salt, 3 tablespoons of cold water - just enough to make a stiff dough.

Mince meat three fourths of an inch thick, with upper and under pastry very thin and yet, reliable, that each piece maybe picked up, turned over under side up and eaten end on while held in the hand. A Christmas pie should not be thin, for stinginess does not go with Christmas, and the pastry should not be thick, lest it upsurp the flavor of the mince meat. Do not mince the raisins that go into this pie, as each bite with a whole raisin in it leaves distinctive memories that, in after years, persist and taste almost as good as the pie did. I remember to this day the raisin that was in sight in MY piece of Christmas pie, when I was a boy.]

Serve a WHOLE PIE to each Christmas guest with a pitcher of rich milk, Why save anything else?

"May joy and kindly love abound

Whenever Christmas day comes round."

RIDDLE of the RITTALS

Joyce Ball Brown found this bit of Ritttal genealogy that may correct or add to what is in the "Broad Bay Pioneers" by W. Whitaker.

Joyce noted some differences between what is shown here and what W. W. Whitaker shows: place born and name of ship Francis RITTAL came in 1753. Also interesting to note that a' according to this new material, the Saint Andrew sailed up the Kennebec and dropped off people in Dresden before coming to Broad Bay. (Need to see what Stahl's book has to say about this, if anything.)

- 2. Francis RITTAL, son of James and Marie (DE LA COURTIE) RITTAL was born about 1723 to 1725 in Ulm, Duchy of Wurtenburg, Germany; Francis came to America to Massachusetts from Rotterdam. Holland on the ship ST. ANDREW, landing at Braintree, Massachusetts 19 September 1752. Before he embarked, he had been living in Stuttgart, Germany. Francis was a Lutheran and third generation German. His ancestors fled from France during a religious persecution. On 10 November 1752, he went with 46 other Germans to the Plymouth Company Lands on the Kennebec River to Pownalboro, Maine, now Dresden. Francis was a soldier in the Revolutionary War. He died in 1795.

In 1755 Francis married Lucielle HOUDLLETTE, daughter of Charles Estienn HOUDLLETTE and his wife

Marie Louise GALLOIS.

He married 07 November 1789 Margaret GOUD, daughter of James/Jacques and Margaret (BON-HOTEL) GOUD. Margaret was born 12 March 1767 at Pownalboro, Maine. John died at sea in 1801 and his body was not recovered.

III. James RITTAL, son of John H. and Margaret (GOUD) RITTAL was born 18 March 1794 at Dresden, Maine (Pownalboro). He married in

Wiscasset, 24 November 1825, Elizabeth W. PORTER, daughter of Frederick and Mary (CAIN-WEST) PORTER. Elizabeth was born in Wiscasset in 1804. James was a farmer. He died 14 February 1882 in Dresden. Elizabeth died 27 May 1891.

IV. Nathan Stephen RITTAL, son of James and Elizabeth (PORTER) RITTAL was born in Dresden 05 July 1823. He married in Dresden (first marriage) 01 January 1842, Sarah Elizabeth STEWART, daughter of Edmund and Jane (BLAIR) STEWART. She died 29 May 1885 at Dresden, aged 42. Nathan died 18 December 1912.

V. John Alonzo RITTAL, son of Nathan S. and Sarah E. (STEWART) RITTAL was born in Dresden, Maine 09 April 1869. He married 07 December 1891, Susan Augusta CHATTER-LEY-PATTERSON, daughter of Col. Henry B. CHATTERLEY and Augusta Nancy HIGGINS. Her mother had placed her in an orphanage in Bath and she was brought up by a family named PATTERSON. John died 03 July 1949 in Columbus, Ohio. Susie died 21 September 1949 in Dresden, Maine.

VI. John Alonzo RITTAL, Jr., son of John Alonzo and Susie (CHATTERLEY-PATTERSON) RITTAL was born in Dresden 01 February 1896. He married November 17, 1917 Amelia/Millie BROWN, daughter of Sereno and Adeline BROWN. John drowned in the Eastern River 24 March 1933. Millie died 27 February 1977.

VII. Chetley Alonzo RITTAL, son of John Alonzo Jr. and Amelia (BROWN) RITTAL was born in Dresden, Maine, after the death of his father. He came to Boothbay Harbor while young with his mother who joined her parents, Sereno and Adeline BROWN. Chetley married Joan BARTER, daughter of Percy and Ora Belle (STOVER) BARTER of Boothbay.

A Divorce Action from Lincoln County Court of Common Pleas October Term 1921 - page 52, Vol. 37.

#26 MANK Libt. vs. MANK

Mabel Mank of Waldoboro in the County of Lincoln and State of Maine, Libellant against William E. MANK, of said Waldoboro, Libelee.

The Libelee is summoned to answer unto the said Libelant: In a plea of Libel for Divorce inserted in a writ of Attachment and Summons, as follows. Mabel MANK, of said Waldoboro. In a libel of divorce in which she respectfully represents & gives this Honorable Court to be informed that she was lawfully married to the said William E. MANK at Union, Maine, February 09, 1891 by Reverend J. Dana Payson; that your libellant has always conducted herself towards her said husband as a faithful, true, and affectionate wife; that the said William E. MANK has been guilty of cruel and abusive treatment and extreme cruelty toward your libellant; that he is guilty of gross and confirmed habits of intoxication; that being able to labor and provide for her he has grossly, wantonly, and cruelly refused and neglected to provide a suitable maintainence for her; and your libellant further avers that during the last week of August, 1916, the said William E. MANK utterly deserted her and has continued desertion for three consecutive years next prior to filing on this libel;

Wherefore your libellant prays that the bonds of matrimony now existing between her and her said husband be dissolved by divorce; and that she may be decreed suitable alimony, both temporary and permanent.

February 22, 1891 Mabel MANK

This libel was inserted in a writ of attachment and summons dated February twenty-second A.D. 1921, and was legally swerved upon the said libelee on the twenty-fourth day of February 1921, by an attachment of all his Real Estate in the said County of Lincoln and by giving him in hand a summons, together with a copy of this writ, for his appearance at court. The same was duly entered at the April Term 1921, when and where the said Libelee appeared and defended, The same was continued to the present term where, on the third day hereof, the Court having fully heard and considered the evidence adduced in support of the libel, are of the opinion that the allegations of Cruel and Abusive treatment are fully and satisfactorily proved.

It is THEREFORE on this first day of November A.D. 1921, being the seventh day of this term, ORDERED AND DECREED by the Court, that the bonds of matrimony hereforeto existing between the said Mabel MANK and the said William E. MANK, be and the same are hereby dissolved for the cause above named.

And further ORDERED AND

DECREED, that the Libelee pay the sum of three hundred dollars in lieu of alimony.

Divorce decreed November 1st, A.D. 1921.

Of which all persons interested are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

(Editor's Note: No Descendants.)

George LIGHT, Jr. died in 1786 and she is probably the widow LIGHT in 1790 Census, 1-4-3. 1800 - She and her family are gone from Waldoboro. They went to Washington as did John Joseph OVERLOCK soon after.

2. I strongly doubt that John Joseph's (b. 1748) 1st wife is a Jane JAME-SON. His 2nd wife (my ancestress) is Mrs. Kristiana () ALSTINE (perhaps German for "ELSTLEIN" and certainly not the daughter of Andreas and Veronica ELFEIN.)

Joseph OVERLOCK (Will's 36 under John Joseph) is the son of Frank/Francis and Catherine Elizabeth (WINCHENBACH) OVERLOCK and lived near the Goshen area of Waldoboro near his father. Joseph, the son of John Joseph, married Sally NELSON and lived in Washington.

Sally OVERLOCK (Will's #8) m. Charles ESANCY, son of the Hessian Henry ESANCY which is well documented.

- 3. "Frank Henry OVERLOCK" born 20 June 1765 should be 2 sons: Frank and Henry. Frank resided in the Goshen area and Henry at Winslow Mills area. I believe Will has their children mixed up.
- 4. Anna Elisabeth OBERLACH (born

1750 in Germany) was not recorded in this country as were the other living children. I believe she died and did not marry a CLAUS.

- 5. John OVERLOCK (b. 1756) did not m. Augusta LAGENAUER. If you look on page 239 of Will's book in the memoir of Sophia (KASTNER) LAGENAUER she says "Here [Broad Bay] her daughter Augusta was born who died as a child." I have found absolutely no further record of this John.
- 6. Of children Will attributes to this John: Jacob (recorded as George) and John are sons of Henry. Joseph is son of John Joseph. Catherine (born c. 1791) is the daughter of Charles and she m. 2nd John CREAMER. The John enumerated in the 1790 Waldoboro census is John-Joseph. You will notice that John-Joseph has the same neighbor, John William KALER, in 1790 and 1800.

WHAT DOES THIS MEAN?

Topic: Going in Circles

Doing German research can lead to new uses of otherwise familiar words. For example, the word "circle". Besides the usual Maine meanings we all now accept: (1) a nicely curved line that completes a 360 degree turn and connects back to where it started and (2) a Massachusetts traffic control method that probably makes out of staters behave the way they do. Circle was used at some time in the past to describe coalitions among geographical areas in what we now call Germany. Remember, the modern country of Germany did not even come into existence until the late 1800's when the nine principal circles confederated under the leadership of the Prussian King.

Before then, there were German kingdoms, principalities, duchies, mar-

gravates, provinces, administrative districts, city states, independent or Imperial cities, even the remnant of the Holy Roman Empire with its capitol at Vienna. Church-owned properties also confused matters, as some of them stretched over a number of borders, and had varying degrees of autonomy among the civil jurisdictions they overlapped. Marriages and other shifts in loyalties resulted in continual flux and change in political boundaries and coalitions.

Likewise, the spelling of place names evolved over time. It would be correct to equate the spellings "Suabia" and "Swabia", but impossible to exactly locate its boundaries. They changed over time.

At the home of a friend, Joyce found an Eastern Continent Gazetteer published in 1808. Ancient gazetteers are the best place to look for place names as they existed back before our families left their Deutchischen places of origin. If you are not afraid of "German Old Script", all the Family History Centers run by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints have on microfiche copies of "Meyers-Ortts" (or something like that) gazetteer of Germany before its confederation.

The old 1808 gazetteer shows "Suabia", a circle of Germany, bounded on the North by Franconia and the circle of the Lower Rhine, on the West by that circle and Alsace, on the South by Switzerland, and on the East by Bavaria. It contains [you need to read that as it contained at the time this gazetteer was published in 1808] the duchy of Wirtenburg (sometimes spelled Wuerrtemburg), the margravate of Baden, the principalities of HoenZollern, Oetingen, and Mindelheim, the bishoprics of Augsburg, Constance, and Coire, with several abbeys and imperial towns".

What makes a person German?

Romans coined the term Germanic, in reference to wild tribes to the north, partially and only temporarily quelled by the famous Germanicus. The Germans were not totally impressed by him, but history was written by the Romans. In a few centuries though, the Germans will swallow up the Holy Roman Empire and move its capitol to Vienna.

The Germanic Tribes included Franks, Bavarians, Helvetians, Saxons, Goths, Swabians, and hundreds of others. As classical Rome declined and fell, the Germans were united briefly by Karlomann, whom we English speakers call Charlemange, whose domains extended all over western Europe, from Rome to Brussels.

Upheavals drove many Gaulic people across the English Channel, in a wave of migration that overwhelmed the prior inhabitants whose tribes went by such names as Jutes, Picts, and Angles. Even now, although they were later swamped by waves of Saxons and Normans, the influence of these Gaulic tribes lingers, though the spelling in now Gaelic.

throughout aal of Western Europe for a time. That klanguage was called Deutsch. After Karlomann died, his empire broke down into parts. Franconians had displaced many Gaullics in western regions destined eventually to become France. The eastern section was fragmented. Borders fluctuated. The "deutsch" language, though, persisted, and the term "Deutschesland" arose. Many "Deutsch" speaking regions escaped inclusion when Germany eventually was formed. Inhabitants of Holland, or the Netherlands, the nearest "Deutsch" speakers to England, were called Dutch by the English.

For various political reasons, Germanic people were encouraged to migrate into eastern areas. Transylvania (then part of Hungary) was settled by people from along the Rhine and Moselle. It is not entirely clear why they were called Saxons, but hey, we have been called worse. Similar migrations took us into places like Schlesian (now Silesia divided into Czhech Republic and Poland), Bessarabia (in the part of Romania broken off as Moldova) and onwards into Ukraine, Slovakia, and southern Russia.

Hundreds of years later these "German colonists" would be pawns in wars known as WWI and WWII. How fortunate we were to escape from the

the fatherland when we did. One motivating factor for our having left was devastation of our homes and military conscriptions related to the almost continual warfare among the Germans and between them and the French in the area of the lower Rhine.

When "Deutsch" speaking people arrived in this country, they were called Dutch. They did not mind. They were from a place called Deutschesland in their language. The first New Yorkers, back when it was New Holland, were Dutch people from what is now the Netherlands. Pennsylvania Dutch are more likely to have originated in what is now Germany. My mother often said she had a Dutch grandmother, actually a great great grandmother, Annie Vannah (Werner), whose German ancestry traces back to the lower Rhine area in the principality of Nassua-Dillenberg, roughly between Baden and Bavaria

Deutsch is correctly translated as German. And Deutschesland can roughly be translated as Germany. Hitler based expansionist claims to surrounding areas based on the people being part of the greater German-speaking race. Many Austrians now speak other languages.
