A Call to Arms: Volunteer Researchers Needed by John Albertini

One wonderful outcome of doing genealogy is the joy of finding a long-sought connection to the past. We have all experienced the elation when our own research proves fruitful. It is almost as rewarding to help other people make similar connections in their family trees. It is one of my primary goals, as PCGS Research Director, to establish and maintain a network of volunteers willing to help others, sort of an extension of Random Acts of Genealogy Kindness (RAOGK).

RAOGK volunteers are asked to do no more than one lookup per month, to reply in a timely fashion to the requester, letting them know you have received the request, and give him/her a time frame within which you feel you can accomplish this deed. As a RAOGK volunteer myself, I receive between 0 and 5 requests per month with 2 to 3 a good average. PCGS seems to be getting quite a few queries, perhaps 6-10 each month. This is more than I can comfortably handle by myself, so if you are willing and able to help and are familiar with or have easy access to nearby town or city records, local cemeteries, or have access to public records of any kind, please let me know. Please supply your:

- Name
- Contact info (e-mail is best, but phone number and/or mailing address can also work)
- Public records to which you can have access
- Surnames of which you have particular in depth knowledge

I will create a database of volunteers, filter & sort the queries and spread the load among the group.

It is permissible to charge only for postage & reimbursement of video, photograph or photocopying expenses. No charges may be made for your time or mileage. In most cases, where expenses are small and incidental, they are provided gratis.

Due to copyright issues lookup request from published works is not considered proper RAOGK etiquette, but I feel it would not be improper to offer reference (title, publisher, page number) to published works where information can be found.

As always, I am open to your ideas on what a Research "Director" (I prefer "Coordinator" should do and how we can make the most of our collective efforts.

Maine Vital Records now available in Penobscot County

In a move to make vital record information more available to researchers, the Maine State Archives has recently distributed microfilms of the first 2 sets of vital records (which cover years 1892-1922) to various locations around the state, one being Fogler Library at the University of Maine in Orono. The microfilms are available in the microform department and therefore are available whenever the library is open. So not only are the records closer, but are available evenings and weekends! As if that is not good enough, the microfilms are new copies produced from the original records, thus may be in better condition than the films so many of us have used in Augusta.

Congratulations goes out to Nancy Battick who recently had her article "A Tale of Two Freemans: Two Cousins of Cape Cod and the Province of Maine" published in the November, 2003, issue of The Maine Genealogist.

The Maine Genealogist is the quarterly publication of our parent group, the Maine Genealogical Society. The journal often has articles about families that touch Penobscot County. In reviewing the November issue, two of the articles contain info of interest. Nancy Battick's article briefly discusses Freeman Knowles, one of Hampden's early settlers. There is also an article on the Joy family of Clinton and Orono. Paul Aldrich's "The Joys of Good Deeds—Using Circumstantial Evidence to Prove the Parents of Eliza H.
