Highlights from the August 9 meeting:

The Society and the Nevada Public Library have jointly funded a subscription to HeritageQuest Online on the Internet. This subscription gives us Internet access to the complete U.S. Federal Census, 1790-1930, page images. Many name-indexes are available and more are coming online each month. The census can be accessed from any computer at the Library. An icon for the Census Records has been placed on the Desktop of both computers in the Genealogy Room and a link to the website is also in the Favorites folder. You can browse any of census pages by location: select the census year, state, county, and township and view the pages one at a time. For the census years and states which have been name-indexed, enter as much information as is known in the search window (name, state, county, birthplace, age, census year, etc.); the search will return a list of "hits" which meet the criteria you entered; you can then look

at each of those census pages. There will probably be some glitches to get worked out, but this should prove to be a great benefit for *all* researchers in our area. Nancy Thompson will be at the Library a couple of times after Sep 15 to assist anyone who is having difficulty with their searches; please e-mail/phone her anytime after Sep 15 if you have tried to use the census search and would like to meet at the library for assistance.

Family Tree Maker Genealogy Software Version 10

It has been suggested that the Society purchase "how to" information for the Family Tree Maker Version 10 computer software program. Following is information from the company on both a book and a video which are available. They could be made available for checkout from the Library if the Society desires to purchase them.

Book: \$24.99 new (used from \$17.) "Family Tree Maker 10 Fast & Easy." With this book's step-by-step instructions, you can build your family tree in no time. From the basics of adding family members to creating your final report, this official guide is the perfect tool for preserving your family's history.

The Family Tree Maker Software and Video are available in a special package for \$29.99 (the software usually sells for \$29.99, and it could probably be loaded on the Library computers for demonstration purposes.)

Work continues on the new **Vernon County Cemetery Directory**. If you type, have Microsoft Access software, and would like to help input data, please contact Nancy Thompson (922-3596) or Neoma Foreman (465-2389). You can work at home, on your own computer, at your own pace. Microsoft Access is needed, and the "how to's" will be provided. This is a very large project and all researchers will benefit from the new directory.

People in Cedar County are working on a new cemetery directory also.

Vernon Co Probate Files The Society will attempt to obtain copies of the microfilmed probate files that are not presently available in the Genealogy Room at the Nevada Library. This involves an additional 49 rolls of microfilm, with files dating from 1933 to 1959. An initial inquiry about this at the courthouse court clerk's office brought the response that they would not approve of the film being removed from their office to be copied. I will follow up with a written inquiry to the clerk's office and will also contact the State Archives to inquire about obtaining a copy.

Nancy Thompson presently conducts research on behalf of the Society and also as a private researcher for hire. The Society has no written policy regarding research and fees, and Nancy recommended that a statement be drafted to ensure clarity of policy. She will submit a draft for consideration later in the year.

Civil War Navy Program: Eldon Steward presented the program on the Civil War Navy. Eldon served 4 years in the Navy in the early 1950s, and his time in service and continued interest has led him to conduct

extensive research on the Navy with special emphasis on the Civil War timeperiod. He has traveled to several museums and historic sites across the U.S. in pursuit of his research. Eldon explained that the Confederate Navy was primarily made up of a bunch

of farmers who fought for four years. However, they developed and built ships and a submarine beyond what most of us were aware. He displayed various Civil War era artifacts and gave information on several replicas of Navy ships from that timeperiod. Eldon also showed his Navy hat and explained several of the many uses for it—if in the water, the sailor can turn down the brim, capture air in it, and use it for a small flotation device to help stay afloat.

This was a very interesting program.

Nancy Thompson reminded members that she is willing to conduct **obit searches** while at the Missouri Newspaper Archives in Columbia in September. See our July newsletter for details. (The Newspaper Archives charge \$15 for an obit search and can take up to 3 months.)

- **Wisconsin Name Index.** The Wisconsin Historical Society has a new research tool to help research ancestors who lived and/or died in WI before 1970. This online database leads to more than 100,000 obituaries, personal sketches, and other short biographies of Wisconsin people. It is search-able by last name, first name, maiden name, time frame and various other details. Once

you locate a biographical sketch, article, or obit, you can order a photocopy of the text through the online research service. Fees apply (everything I checked was \$15 per item). For details go to www.wisconsinhistory.org/wni

- Kansas City Area Archives Fair, Sep 12-14. In the KC area, over 80 repositories store and maintain records that document our past, but for the most part are not reproduced on the Internet. KC area archivists will promote member institutions and answer document and photo preservation questions at the KC Area Archives Fair in the Central Court area of the Blue Ridge Mall, I-70 at Blue Ridge Blvd. The Jackson Co Genealogical Society will hold its used book sale in conjunction with the fair.
- The Old Fort Genealogical Society, Ft. Scott, KS, will meet Sep. 23, 7:30 p.m. at the Old Congregational Church on National. Sandy Wells will present the program, "Interpretation of Elizabeth Wilson," wife of Hiero T. Wilson, the first settler of Ft. Scott.
