**Member Profile:** Last year Rhonda, our Explorers' Tree editor, suggested that perhaps members might like to write an article containing their profile. Rhonda originally thought these profiles could go in the Newsletter but it was decided that they would be better placed in The Explorers' Tree as a filler and because usually there is not enough room in the Newsletter. Prior to our April meeting members may have received an email from Yvonne containing guide lines for anyone wishing to write their profile.

However, this Newsletter today is the exception to the rule, there being not enough information to fill the Newsletter, so I have decided to kick start Rhonda's idea by following her guide lines:

My name is Pauline Gibson. I was born Pauline Angus on the 29<sup>th</sup> July 1945 and at the time my family were living in Sydney.

I married Peter John Gibson in 1967 and we went to live in North Springwood (as it then was) in 1968 just before the devastating bush fires that same year.

I have been a member of the Blue Mountains Family History Society since 2000. At the time of joining the Society I was a legal secretary and worked for the local legal firm, John W. Hogan. I retired in 2005 and my research really took off then.

It was meeting a cousin down from Queensland in 2000 for the first time that I became interested in researching my family history. Jocelyn had come to Sydney to visit Leichhardt Council Chambers to research our grandfather who was on the first Council for Annandale. At the Council Archives we found records of the Minutes dating back to our grandfather's time on Annandale Council. We were also directed to the now defunct Annandale Council building and found two photos of him and other councillors hanging on the walls. From little things big things grow, that is how I became hooked on family history.

During the course of my research I have discovered that I have English, Scottish and Welsh ancestors and since my retirement I have been lucky enough to visit the places where they all lived. I have researched all my direct family lines their surnames being Brooks, Pithers, Horton, Fewings, McCloy, Hallam, Phillips, Grace, Dobbs, Grono, Angus and Horne.

My brick wall is my Gt Grandmother, Sarah Jane Horne from Tipperary. I cannot find her entry to Australia nor anything about her family back in Ireland. (Could her name be Horan and not Horne)

During my research I have discovered 4 convicts much to my older sister's disgust though I found it very exciting. None were first fleters. I have also discovered a cousin, Merrill Greenfield, who lives in England and whose father was my Gt Grandfather, George Angus's brother, we've met on a few occasions and regularly correspond.

Apart from family history I enjoy art, particularly working with pastels and I like making felt toys which I do on behalf of the charity, Operation Christmas Child.

**My family history tip:** Try locating a family history group in the areas where your ancestors lived. I have received wonderful help and information by doing this.
