#### 2018 Annual Conference - Bateman's Bay

As most members are aware our Secretary, Colin Brest was appointed as the Society's delegate as he had planned to attend the Conference. Set out below is Colin's report.

"The Conference was held at the Soldiers Club in Batemans Bay – September 14-16 September 2018, and it was the 34<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference. The venue was in an ideal position, overlooking the Clyde River and the Bay. The facilities are very modern and the place was very new looking, and very welcoming.

**Day one** – Friday Family History Fair Program. There was a full program – Starting with Welcome by Chris Rowan MC. There were 12 events: Aboriginal Research; FamilySearch Updates; Mapping Your Ancestors; Ryerson Index; Looking for Gold & Finding Gems in the Archives; Do you need that Certificate; DNA Techniques; Sydney Heritage Fleet; Local History Society Resources; Your Estate Papers; Association Forum; then at 6.30pm Meet and Greet. Some of the topics were concurrent, being held in different rooms. One had to be selective.

I was asked to introduce Robert Atkins – Ryerson Index. Bob serves on the Ryerson Committee of Management. He is currently the indexer for the Central Coast Advocate and Muswellbrook Chronicle from its inception in 1898, as well as working through the 1946 funeral notices of the Sydney Morning Herald.

Dedicated Volunteers are always needed. So members can help out if they so wish.

There was plenty of time to circulate amongst the 47 Trade Tables; and many vendors had quite a supply of various publications to whet one's appetite and wallet.

**Day two** – Saturday Conference Program: 8.30am to 9am – Official Opening, Welcome to Country; Welcome to Conference; Welcome to Eurobodalla Shire by the Mayor.

Some excellent speakers made the presentations. Topics were:

Sailing into History - What will I leave in my Wake -Cora Num; Updates from NSW BDM - Amanda Lanna; Thinking Outside the Square - Terry & Wendy Nun; Ancestry updates DNA - Jason Reeves.

After Lunch at 2pm, John Can gave a presentation on A Closer look at Marriage; marriage records in NSW State Archive.

Peter Smith from the Braidwood Historical Society told us about The Clarke Brothers, and showed a video presentation of the capture of the Clarke Brothers.

After afternoon Tea, the Association AGM was held. The same Committee members were elected.

### Dating photographs identifying 19<sup>th</sup> Century Photograph Types:

Numerous types of photographs appeared and then went out of favour throughout the 1800s. So, the first step in narrowing the possible date for your old photograph is to be able to identify 19th century photographs to determine what type you have. The information provided here can turn you into a proficient photo detective. The vast majority of antique photographs taken in the 19th century was one of the following types:

#### The Daguerreotype – 1840-1860

Daguerreotypes are typically small with the most common size being 2 3/4 x 3 1/2 inches and housed in a case. The photographic process makes the photographs appear to float

#### The Ambrotype – 1854-1868

Like the daguerreotypes, ambrotypes are in small hinged cases. The difference is the ambrotype does not have that reflective "floating" type quality.

#### The Tintype – 1856-1878

Tintypes were popular for more than 30 years. Instead of glass, the image was on an iron plate. Early tintypes were in small, hinged cases like the daguerreotypes and the ambrotypes. However, the cases were soon replaced by paper sleeves.

#### The Carte de Visite – 1859-1889

Carte des Visites (CDV) were introduced in 1859. Measuring 2 1/2" by 4", the photographs were mounted on a thick paper and used much as the calling card was used in the 1850s.

#### The Cabinet Cards – 1866-1903

Cabinet cards and carte des visites (CDV) are often confused. Like the CDV, the cabinet card was also an albumen print on thin paper and mounted on thicker paper. The primary difference is the size. The cabinet card is larger and may have a photographer's logo on the reverse side. The cabinet card reached its peak popularity in the 1880s but was used into the early 1900s.
