Le Roy, New York

Le Roy is an incorporated village, located in the eastern part of Genesee county, twenty-six miles southwest of Rochester, ten miles east of Batavia, the county seat, and forty-nine miles east of Buffalo. It had a population of 4,203 in the census of 1920. At the time of the publication of this directory the census figures for 1925 are not available, but the population is estimated at about 4,750.

Situated in the center of the "granite spot of Western New York," than which there is no finer agricultural section in the world, Le Roy affords the happy combination of successful farming life with very substantial industrial activity, and is a community of contentment and happiness to an unusual degree.

While Le Roy has about twenty manufacturing and industries employing from ten up to two hundred and fifty laborers, the atmosphere of a factory town is entirely lacking. This is due to the wide diversity of the industries coupled with the fact that a large percentage of the employees are home owners, and as such are substantial units of the community, interested in and supporting quite every project of village improvement because they are a part of it.

Le Roy does not crave excessive industrial growth and has no city aspirations. A healthy, normal growth is encouraged, and the aim is to make the community a genuinely good, wholesome, clean, neat and attractive country village.

In transportation, Le Roy has three railroads running through the village, the Buffalo, Rochester & Pittsburgh, the Canandaigua branch of the New York Central and the Attica-Avon branch of the Erie. The main line of

the Lehigh Valley railroad is two miles to the north, with a station at North Le Roy, and the main line of the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western three miles to the south, with a station at the junction of this road with the Buffalo, Rochester & Pittsburgh. In addition to this there is daily automobile passenger service between Le Roy and Batavia and Le Roy and Rochester.

Le Roy has a total assessed valuation of \$3,760,000 as the basis of its taxation. All streets are macadamized and a program of uniform curbing and terracing is now under way. Public parks are being developed under the jurisdiction of a park commission. In public utilities Le Roy is served with electricity for lighting and power by the Western New York Utilities Company, by natural gas for domestic purposes by the Pavilion Natural Gas company, and to wire service by the Western Union Telegraph Company and the Rochester Telephone Company.

The public school system represents an investment of over half a million dollars in high school and grammar school buildings, and Le Roy owns a gravity water system, approximating in value to the community another half million. It has a volunteer fire department of ninety men, with modern motorized apparatus and an electric fire alarm system. An attractive brick municipal building houses the village offices and the fire apparatus, and is also the home of the American Red Cross Chapter. There are seven churches, and many fraternal lodges and clubs.

Le Roy has two banks with deposits upwards of \$3,000,000, and a goodly number of successful and substantial merchandising institutions.

At present there is one hotel, but in the near future an English tavern is to be built by the Jell-O Company. Days come and go in Le Roy as in every other community. The whole atmosphere breathes the thought "It is good to be alive; indeed, it is good to be alive in Le Roy."
