Young Le Roy – 1834

Inasmuch as all Western New York was thrown open to settlement at practically one time, it was only natural that many neighboring settlements reached village status almost simultaneously.

Then, as now, this rapid organization brought problems to the hamlets involved. There were the same basic problems of sanitation, muddy streets, police and fire protection for these congested areas as today confront modern developments.

To meet these mounting demands, incorporation as a village offered the most intelligent, if not the only approach, and this, Le Roy achieved May 5, 1834. With commendable dispatch, the Board of Trustees set about to advance the desires of a proud and energetic citizenry. Of foremost importance was the establishment of adequate fire protection for the many fine homes, the numerous shops and the extensive industrial establishments that had so recently sprung up. Le Roy's citizens, at an early date, adopted measures for protection against the ravages of fire. For many years the custom of keeping fire buckets distributed conveniently about the Village was in vogue, and many incipient blaze was thereby quenched before it could make any considerable headway. In a volume containing the records of the annual meetings of the Village of Le Roy from the time of the incorporation of the village in 1834 until the year 1864, many interesting facts are recorded in connection with village affairs.

The first annual meeting was held in the home of Theodore Dwight on July 3, 1834. The officers of the village chosen at this time were as follows: Trustees, Joshua Lathrop, John Lent, Rufus Robertson, Theodore Dwight and Dannis Blakely; Clerk, Seth M. Gates; Treasurer, Heman J. Redfield; Assessors, Jacob Newman, Lewis M. Gates, Chester Barrows; Fire Wardens, Miles P. Lampson, Howard Bosworth, John Jackson, Alonzo Montcalm and Horatio N. Stanley.

On the 12th day of August, 1834, it was voted to raise by tax the sum of \$1,000 for the purchase of a fire engine and apparatus, hooks and ladders, and to procure a building in which to store them.

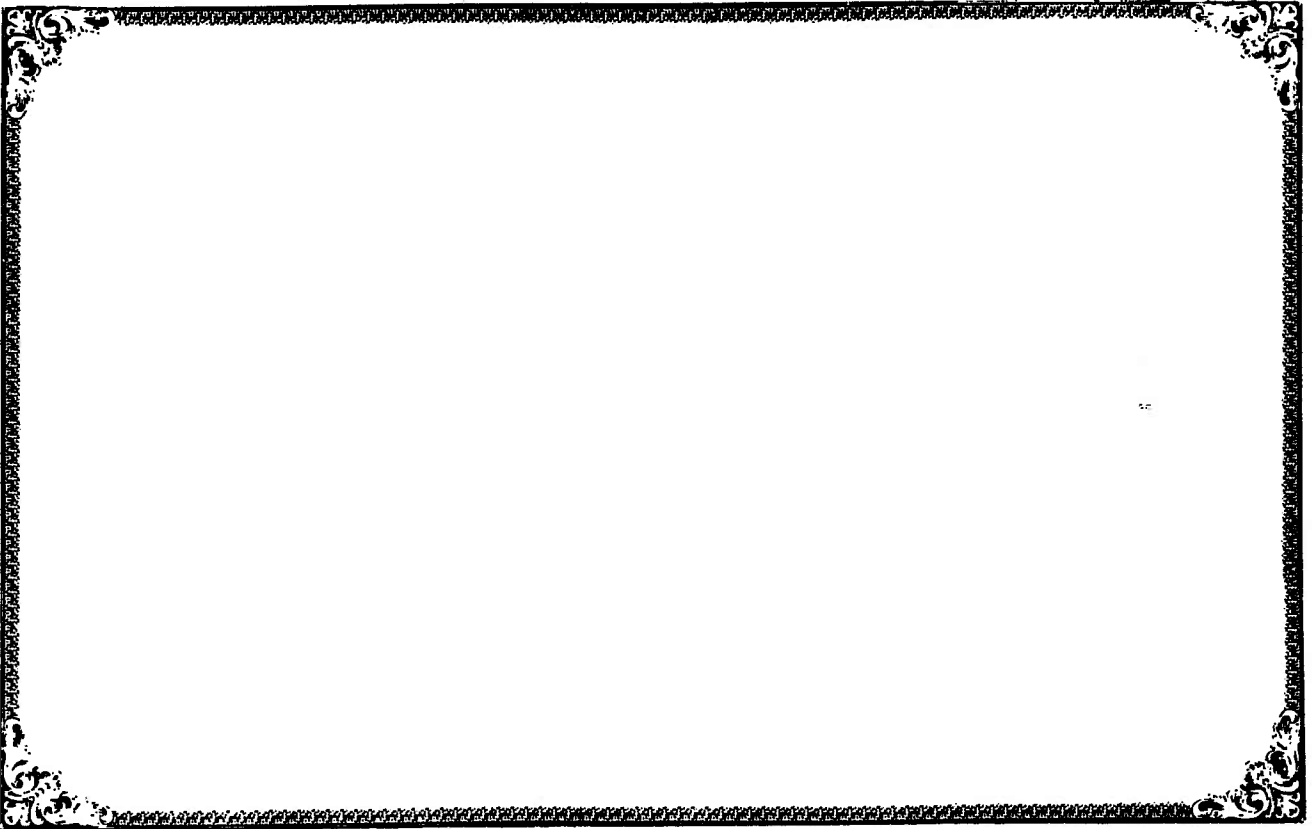
Fire Fighting – 1834 Style

In the early days of Le Roy, much attention was paid to guarding against fire and several ordinances were put into effect bearing on this question. It was the duty of the fire wardens to attend every fire and direct the persons there how to fight the same. Any fire warden found guilty of the neglect of his duty was subject to a fine of \$2.00. Any member of the bucket or hose or hook and ladder company who failed to report for duty was subject to a fine of \$5. Any person who burned refuse within 30 feet of any building was punished by a similar fine.

No lighted candle, torch, lamp, lighted cigar or pipe was allowed in any barn, stable or barnyard in the Village under penalty of \$5.

Section 13 of the village ordinances prescribed the following: "The bell ringer or bell ringers of every bell in said village, shall immediately on the cry or alarm of fire, severally ring or cause to be rung their respective bell for the space of at least 20 minutes unless the fire shall be sooner extinguished. Any bell ringer offending against the provisions of this section shall forfeit and pay to the trustees the sum of \$3, and a premium of \$1 shall be given to the ringer of any church bell who shall give the first alarm."

The members of each fire company were required to meet on the first Saturday of each month for practice and drill with the fire engine, and every member who was absent was obliged to pay a fine of one dollar. Every member of each company was required to provide himself with a white leather cap on which was marked with black paint the number of the company to which he belonged, under penalty of \$2 and 50¢ a month thereafter which should pass without providing himself with such cap. In September 1834 the fine of firemen was reduced from \$2 to 50 cents.

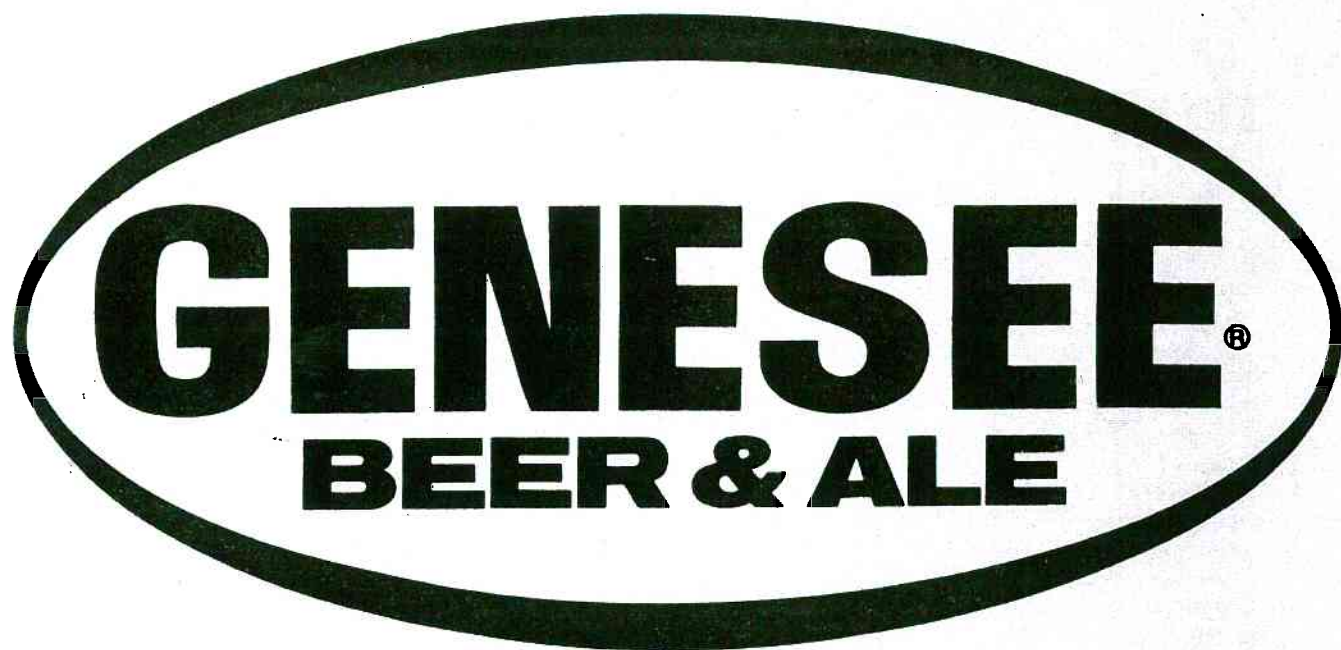
