Anna E. Dingwall, 43, of 83 Myrtle St. died at 3:35 a.m. Sunday (July 27, 1975) at her home. She had been ill for several weeks.

She was born in Batavia on Dec. 30, 1931, a daughter of Norman Dingwall of 83 Myrtle St. and the late Edna Dingwall. She was senior rehabilitation counselor at the Rochester office of the New York State Office of Vocational Rehabilitation and was president of the local chapter of the National Rehabilitation Assn.

Miss Dingwall graduated from LeRoy High School in 1950, from Boston University in 1954 and received a masters degree from the State University of New York at Buffalo in rehabilitation counseling.

She was a counselor at Childrens Hospital, Seattle, Wash., from 1955-1956 and at the State Rehabilitation Hospital at Haverstraw in 1957. From 1957 to 1962 she worked with the Monroe County Health Dept. and she was at her present position since 1964.

She was a member of the First Presbyterian Church and a charter member of the LeRoy Historical Society.

Surviving with her father are an uncle, Frank W. Bushville of Missouri, and several cousins.
