The Burgesses Corps were on duty to receive them with the usual military honors and they were escorted by that Corps to their Armory. An immense number of citizens had collected to witness the pageant. They remained at the Armory until this morning. Gen. BLANCHARD of Saratoga and the brother of Capt. BURKE are here to receive the remains and to take charge of them to Northumberland, Saratoga County, the place of his nativity and residence (from the Albany Argus)

Page 2:5 - A FUNERAL INSTEAD OF A BRIDAL CEREMONY - Miss Nancy BAILEY of Merrimac, formerly employed in the factories here, visited Nashua last week for the purchase of her wedding dress, bonnet and bridal cake &c preparatory for her marriage on Wednesday next. She had completed her purchases and was on her way to the depot Saturday evening when the cars left. She therefore returned to the house of a friend Mr. MITCHELL on Canal Street near the Jackson Corp. About half past three on Sunday afternoon as she sat at the window, she threw up both hands explaining, "Why there is Mr. DREW." (The name of the young man to whom she was to be married and who was a resident of Concord, Vermont). Mrs. M. went to another window but no one was in sight. At this
