Page 3:1 - DIED - In this Village August 4th of whooping cough, Harriet M., only daughter of Nelson & Lucy ROGERS, ae 1 yr & 5 mos.

- In Watervliet on the 5th inst., William LANSING, son of Abraham V.P. LANSING in the 21st year of his age. His end was peace.

- In Troy on the 9th inst George Henry LARCOM of the firm of LARCOM & TUCKER of this Village. (In the 27th year of his age)

- In this Village August 10th, Harriet, infant daughter of John & Martha PEWTRESS, of this place.

Page 2:5 - DIED - In Watervliet July 16th, Mrs. Margaret, wife of Garret I. LANSING, ae 45 yrs 9 mos.

- On the 4th of August Elizabeth, daughter of Garret I. LANSING in the 17th year of her age

Page 2:5 - DIED - In this Village on the 24th inst at 9 o'clock P.M. Mr. Calvin BOYNTON, age 63 years.

Page 2:2 - We are pained to learn that Mr. STEARNS of the 4th Ward in this Village was instantly killed at Green-bush on Friday evening the 25th. He was a ship's carpenter and had been employed several days in repairing a tow boat at that place. He in company with two other friends, spent an hour in the evening on board the boat with the Captain & his family, in cheerful conversation; and when they left, refusing a light that was offered them. Mr. S. led the way, and fell into the hatchway, which had stood open through the day. He was precipitated about 12 feet, and evidently struck head first against the bottom, and dislocated his neck.
