Page 2:5 - DIED - In Troy on the 5th inst., P.W. BARINGER, Thomsonian physician, in the 41st year of his age.

JULY 18, 1849

Page 2:3 - DEATH BY HEAT - An inquest was held on the 12th inst. by J. HASTINGS, Coroner at the house of J.B. JERMAIN, Esq. of Watervliet on the body of Michael DUNN who died suddenly about 2 o'clock.

It appeared in evidence before the jury, that Mr. DUNN & Mr. R. BROWN had been two or three days at work haying for Mr. JERMAIN - that at 10 or 11 o'clock, they sent a boy for drink, who returned with sweetened ginger & water, with ice to cool it, the thermometer standing at 94 or 95 degrees in the shade. Mr. DUNN complained very much of the heat; and at about half past twelve, Mr. BROWN thought Mr. DUNN unwell, and set down with him in the shade; but perceiving that he was little conscious of anything, he raised him and led him to the house, at no great distance, and placed him on his bed. Mrs. JERMAIN got him camphor, which he was unable to swallow; they then sent for a doctor and in the meantime rubbed and bathed him with camphor, using every exertion in their power to restore him, but in vain, in about an hour, before the doctor arrived, he breathed his last - evidently from the effect of heat and the ice water. The jury gave a verdict accordingly.

Mr. DUNN was about 55 years old, a native of Ireland; of correct habits and respectable character, had one son in Schenectady and one in Lansingburgh, both with families, and a young son at Troy. Mr. JERMAIN sent immediately to Lansingburgh, and he & his lady rendered him every assistance in their power while living, furnished decent respectable grave clothes, and his funeral was attended on the 13th from Mrs. WARRENS Church Troy.
