Page 2:3 - Asher YOUNG one of the Superintending Agents on the Rensselaer & Saratoga Railroad was accidentally run over by the Up Train and instantly killed. On the evening of the 10th instant, while riding in a little hand car, a short distance below Ballston Spa, he was proceeding from Noxon's Corners towards Ballston Spa between 8 & 9 o'clock thinking that the train would not overtake him until he reached the latter place. The night was dark, and he was not seen by the approaching train until his little car was run over. No blame is attached to the persons having charge of the train. He was a very industrious useful man and leaves a family and a circle of friends to mourn his death. (from the Republican)

Page 2:5 - DIED - In Albany on Wednesday morning last at 8-1/2 o'clock in the 16th year of his age, Andrew BRAND, a native of Kentucky. The deceased came to the City about four weeks since for the purpose of attending the State Fair accompanied by his brother and two friends, and not being in good health was immediately after his arrival prostrated by an attack of intermittent fever, from which he never recovered. In size he was probably the most extraordinary person in hhe world. His advertised weight previous to his demise, being 537 pounds. Of a kind and generous disposition, he was beloved by all with whom he became acquainted. To his distant relatives and friends it will be a source of great consolation to know that every care and attention was taken of him during hisprotracted and painful illness.
